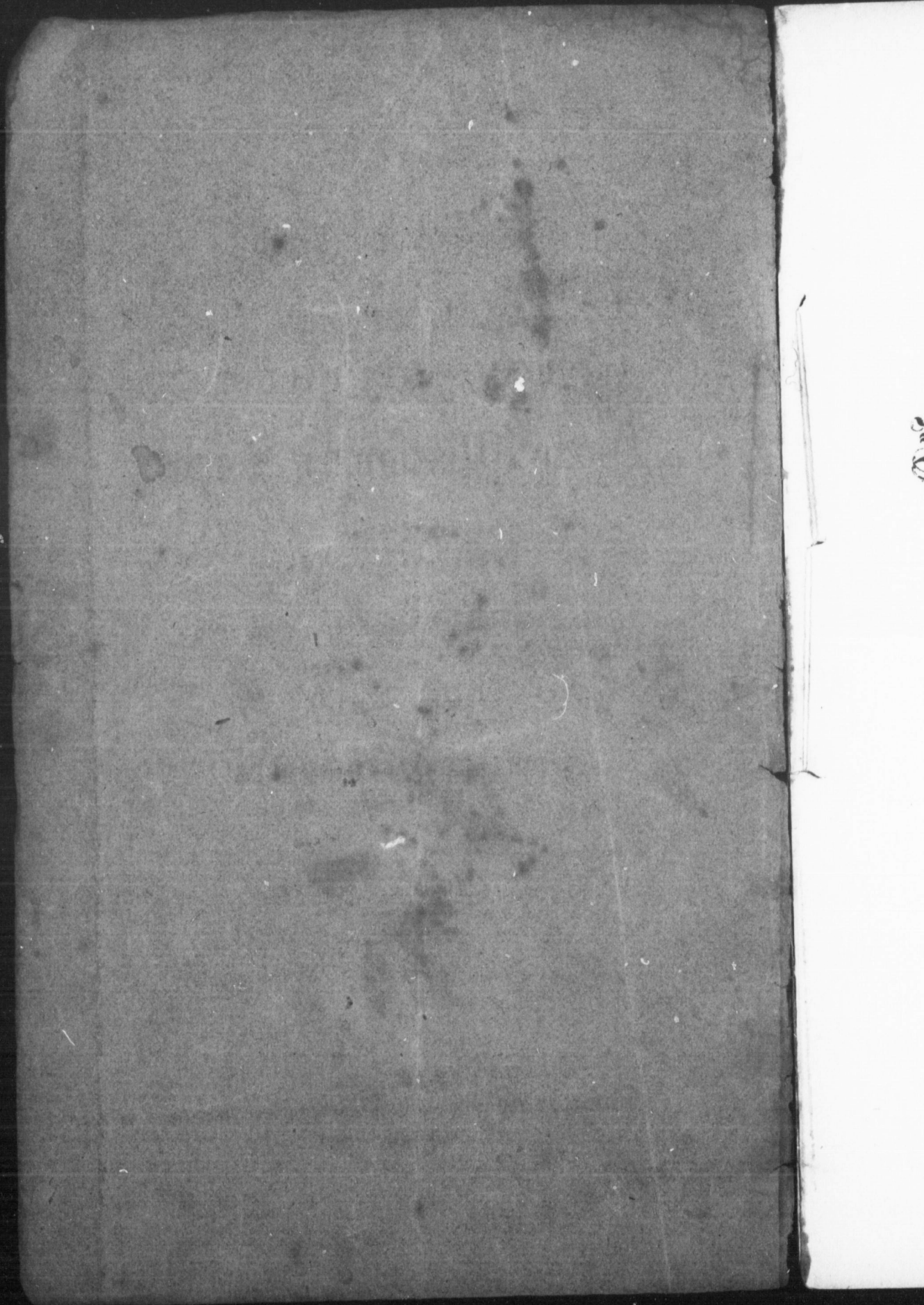

CONSTITUTION
OF THE
NOVA SCOTIA BAPTIST
HOME MISSIONARY SOCIETY.

I. This Society shall be called "The Nova Scotia Baptist Home Missionary Society."

II. The object of this Society shall be the preaching of the Gospel throughout Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, and Newfoundland, the assistance of feeble Churches, and the planting of new ones.

III. Any person may become a member of this Society by contributing five shillings and upwards, annually, to its funds. Any person contributing five pounds at one time, shall be a Life member. Any person contributing twenty pounds at one time, or whose contributions shall amount to that sum, shall be a Life Director. Every Association or Auxiliary, which contributes annually to this Society, shall be entitled to be represented by one Delegate for every five pounds so contributed; and every Baptist Church contributing annually to the funds of the Society, shall also have the privilege of sending a Delegate. Should the funds so contributed exceed five pounds, such church shall be entitled to send one delegate for every five pounds contributed.—*Provided*: That no Association, Auxiliary, or Church, shall be entitled to send more than five Delegates at one time.

IV. The officers of this Society shall be a President, Vice-Presidents, Secretary, Treasurer, and Auditor, who shall be annually appointed by the Society from among its members.

V. The Society shall annually appoint a Board of Management, consisting of twenty-four members, seven of whom shall reside in the place designated, from year to year, as the location of the Board, or in its neighborhood, and seven shall constitute a quorum. The officers above named shall be *ex-officio* members of the Board. The following shall be the duties of the Board, viz :—To meet from time to time for the despatch of business, due notice of such meeting being given ; to appoint Missionaries, and assign their respective spheres of labor ; to expend the funds for the objects of the Society, provided that all amounts contributed for any specific purpose shall be faithfully applied, as far as possible, in accordance with the wishes of the donors ; to employ agents for the collection of funds, and for the general advancement of the interests of the Society ; and to furnish a report of the proceedings of the past year at the Annual meeting.

VI. Every Auxiliary Society which shall agree to commit all its funds to the direction of this Society, shall be entitled to receive Missionary labor in such field as it may designate, to an amount at least equal to its contribution ; provided that such designation be intimated at the time of payment.

VII. The members of Auxiliary Societies shall be members of this Society. Life Directors shall be entitled to attend and vote at meetings of the Board.

VIII. The Annual meeting of the Society shall be held at such time and place as shall be determined upon at a previous Annual meeting. At that meeting, the officers of the Society for the ensuing year shall be appointed, and such other business transacted as the members then present shall deem expedient.

IX. No alteration of this Constitution shall be made without an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members present at an Annual meeting.

After which the meeting adjourned to meet with the Eastern Baptist Association, July, 1861.

REPORT.

At the commencement of the year just now closed, your Board deemed it advisable to employ our much esteemed Brother and fellow-labourer Rev. S. N. Bentley as Home Mission Agent. He entered upon and pursued his work with unabated zeal, until about the first of October last; when it pleased the Lord to lay the hand of affliction upon him, and subsequently to remove him from the toils of his earthly pilgrimage, to his long and happy home. His whole soul was in the work; and he remained the tried and unwavering friend of the Home Mission, till the termination of his earthly career; and it may be said of him truly that

“He fell like a soldier—he died at his post.”

We have deeply felt his loss; but we are comforted by the thought that he has gone to “be with Christ which is far better.”

The Secretary's office, thus becoming vacant, was filled by our worthy Chairman, Rev. R. McLearn, until about the last of January, 1860, when we secured the services of Brother I. J. Skinner as Secretary and Agent.

The business which has come before us during the year has been regularly attended to; and in presenting this our third annual report, we beg leave to direct your attention to the following labours and results.

HALIFAX COUNTY.

Bro. A. D. Steele, licentiate, by appointment of June 25, 1859, performed 4 weeks Missionary labour at Jeddore. He reports 8 sermons preached; 4 other meetings attended and 53 family visits for religious conversation and prayer. He speaks of the desirableness of stated preaching, as the church is feeble. Some prospect of additions to the church at the next visit of an ordained minister.

Bro. S. Bell, licentiate, by appointment of Dec. 21, 1859, spent 8 weeks at Jeddore; and some time previous to this 5 weeks at Margarets Bay and vicinity. In the former place he preached 49 times; held 8 prayer and conference meetings; visited 65 families and distributed 720 pages tracts. During

the past winter and Spring 39 persons have been baptized and added to the church at Jeddore.

Thus the labourers have not toiled in vain.

Bro. I. J. Skinner by appointment, September, 1859, laboured 8 weeks at Margarets Bay and Indian Harbour. Visited Black Point, Mason's Point, Hubly Settlement, Indian Harbour and Peggy's Cove. Preached 43 Sermons; attended 12 prayer and Conference Meetings; made 35 family visits and baptized 42 persons. Thus the hands of the Brethren are greatly strengthened. Paul may plant and Apollos water, but God alone gives the increase.

LUNENBURG COUNTY.

Bro. S. Bell, licentiate, spent 3 weeks in the service of the Board on the Island of Tancook. Meetings were frequent and well attended. Rev J. C. Hurd of Chester paid them a visit at that time; preached several times and baptized 23 persons. May the Great Head of the church keep them from wandering away from the fold of Christ.

Rev. D. G. Shaw, of Falmouth by appointment Nov. 2, 1859, laboured 3 weeks and 5 days on Tancook Island. He preached 9 sermons; held 5 other meetings; distributed 25 copies of the Baptist church Articles and visited most of the families on the Island besides making a visit to Iron-bound. He writes:—Our meetings continued to increase in interest till the last. I sincerely hope our labour was not in vain in the Lord. Much remains there to be done in establishing the church in the order, ordinances and laws of God's house, of which things many have but an imperfect view.

Bro. W. H. DeWolf licentiate, spent 3 or 4 weeks at Sherbrook. He states that the field is an interesting one for Missionary labour. He reports 18 sermons; 4 prayer and conference meetings; 1 Temperance meeting; 1 candidate received for baptism and others stand waiting. "The harvest truly is great but the labourers are few."

HANTS COUNTY.

Bro. D. F. Higgins, by appointment June, 1859, laboured 8 weeks at Walton and the Shore Eastward. Preached 35 sermons and made upwards of 80 family visits. His Mission was interesting to himself and we trust profitable to the people with whom he laboured.

Rev. B. Scott laboured 2 weeks in the service of the Board at Walton, during which time a Bazaar was held to aid in finishing the meeting house in course of erection. He regards Walton as the "rallying point of a growing Missionary field;" and recommends the establishment of a permanent Mission Station there, holding out a very strong probability, that in a short time it would be self-sustaining.

Rev. James Spencer of Granville spent 4 weeks last Autumn at Falmouth and Chester Road. The people gave him a warm-hearted reception and listened with marked attention to the "story of the Cross." He writes:—"On Chester Road I found the cause of religion somewhat depressed. During the past year they had lacked an under shepherd to break unto them the bread of life, and the disciples had become faint and weary. But He who sent out his disciples whither he himself would come, condescended to be with us to refresh and comfort." Preached 28 sermons; visited 36 families; attended 2 conferences and baptized 2 persons.

Rev. William Burton, of Hantsport, by appointment of August 1, 1859, laboured 7 weeks in Newport and vicinity. His labours were greatly blessed. He preached 33 sermons; attended 6 church meetings; made 67 family visits and attended several special prayer and enquiry meetings. During the winter and spring 61 persons were baptized. Brethren George Dimock, D. G. Shaw and Hibbert Longelle laboured with him in the good work.

CUMBERLAND COUNTY.

Rev. Nelson Baker spent 12 weeks in the service of the Board at Parrsboro and vicinity. He baptized 6 persons and organized a Sabbath School. He speaks of the field as one loudly calling for Missionary labour.

Rev. Thomas Keillor was pledged the sum of \$48 August 1, 1859, as remuneration for labour in Parrsboro and vicinity. He baptized 4 persons and "the prospect," he says, "is still encouraging."

COLCHESTER COUNTY.

Bro. C. H. Cory, licentiate, laboured 4 weeks and 2 days at Five Islands and the neighbouring places. He writes:—"I regret very much being obliged to leave so soon. I have seldom seen a better prospect of an extensive work." Preach-

ed 22 sermons ; attended 8 other meetings ; visited more than 90 families and distributed upwards of 1500 pages of tracts ; 4 persons were baptized.

Bro. M. P. Freeman, Licentiate, fulfilled a mission of 4 weeks at River John, Little River, Glenville and River Philip. He writes :—“ A church with ten members was organized at the first mentioned place in 1846 which subsequently increased to 21 under the watchcare of Rev. Obed Parker, of whom they still speak in terms of commendation and love. For some time past the church has been without the preaching of the word, and has lost its visibility. The brethren here think they have been neglected, we suppose not without just cause.” He reports 18 sermons, 57 visits, and 2,100 pages tracts circulated.

GUYSBORO COUNTY.

Rev. A. F. Porter during the year has labored 14 weeks in the service of the Board at Antigonish, &c. He travelled over 1,000 miles, preached 56 sermons, held 21 other religious meetings, and baptized 10 persons. Bro. Porter is now engaged with the Church at Guysboro. He has been much encouraged here as well as elsewhere.

Bro. B. Spencer, Lic. spent 5 weeks at Guysboro. He reports that the meetings were generally interesting.

CAPE BRETON.

Rev. Hugh Ross has been labouring in the service of the Board during the year now closed. He has preached at Bedeque, St. Anns, Salmon River, and Schooner Pond, with encouraging results. Under date Oct. 27, 1859, he writes : “ A small part of what I have desired has been accomplished, yet something has been done. Our meetings are well attended and interesting.” Again,—April, 1860. “ The Lord has not forgotten us here among the billows. Some drops of mercy have fallen upon us, and we hope a more plenteous rain is at hand.” He reports 190 sermons, 503 visits, 7 baptized, and 3,000 miles travelled. Prospects are still encouraging.

Rev. P. A. Shiels by appointment August, 1859, fulfilled 6 weeks mission, visited Grant Anns, Cape North, and Bay of St. Lawrence. In speaking of the difficulties encountered, he says : “ As it was utterly impracticable to take a horse in any way, I walked a distance of 30 miles to Grant Anns. We

had to climb high mountains on the way and cross exceedingly soft barrens, yielding in many places a foot and more. Here I preached the Word of the Lord to very attentive hearers until Sept 8th, when I resolved to visit the regions beyond.—The people everywhere seemed to be awake to the great matter of their soul's salvation. The Grant Anns people travelled all one night with torches to be in time for the sermon on Lord's day morning. . . . My own soul was refreshed and made happy among them. One person professed faith in Christ and asked for baptism; but it was deferred on account of ill health.

Rev. D. P. McQuillan in the service of the Board has visited Hillsville, Grand Mira, Forchou, Gaberouse, and Bedeque, travelled 300 miles, baptized 7 persons, preached 100 sermons besides attending prayer and conference meetings, and visiting extensively. He speaks of those places as important fields for Baptist labourers.

Rev. D. McKeen by appointment visited Strait of Canso, Port Hood, and Mabou. Preached 12 sermons, and visited a number of families. Good congregations and solemn attention paid.

Bro. B. Spencer, Lic., spent 4 weeks at Strait of Canso.—He preached 18 times and visited as many families as he could. Some were inquiring the way to Zion and expressed their desire to follow the Lord in baptism.

Rev. Ronald McDonald spent 6 weeks missionary labours on the Island of Boularderie. The people were more interested in the gospel than formerly. Good, we hope has been done.

PRINCE EDWARD'S ISLAND.

Rev. John Shaw reports (in the C. M.,) a mission of 8 weeks performed. He writes, "I left home on the 29th August, 1859, and preached at Uigg, Belfast, Dog River, Long Creek, Canal Cove, St. Peter's Bay, and Grand River. . . . Congregations, all things considered, large and attentive, and on the increase—during my stay among them. Withersoever I went I was gladly received, and my mission liberally supported. A self-sustained mission." He preached 31 sermons, visited 28 families, and baptized 1 individual.

Rev. Malcolm Ross performed 8 weeks labour on the Island. He writes:—"I never met with warmer reception than while engaged in this missionary tour." He reports 32 sermons, a number of other meetings attended, more than 50 families

visited,—the Lord's supper administered 3 times, and 11 persons baptized.

Rev. J. Davis has continued his labours at Charlottetown, according to previous arrangement. Under date June 12, 1860. He writes:—"I have no great progress to report for the year. It is hard for Baptists to make headway in this Island and in this city. If we do not lose any ground, that is something. Our congregations though small, are steady: and our country congregations are generally good. I have just baptized a brother in town, who we hope will prove useful.— And thus we move forward.

About my labours I would just say that I generally preach 4 times in the course of the week and sometimes 5, besides attending prayer meetings and bible classes and engagements of which I keep no account."

We exceedingly regret that we are not in possession of a full report of our lamented Bro. Bentley's Agency. All the information we have is gathered from two letters to the Chairman, penned hastily while on the eastward. These letters breathe throughout an earnest solicitude for the prosperity of the mission. Under date Antigonish, Sept 30, 1859, he writes:—"Auxiliaries have been formed at Canso, Guysboro, Manchester, and Antigonish, from which I hope considerable. Two or three Life Memberships are expected."

"My time has thus far been devoted to preaching. I baptized 4 on the 18th inst., and Bro. Porter 5 last Sabbath."

The present Agent has been engaged from the 23rd of January, 1860, to the present time, June 15, except 2 weeks at the opening of spring. Has visited the churches in the Counties of Lunenburg, Hants, King's, Colchester, and Cumberland. Travelled upwards of 1,500 miles,—held upwards of 60 preaching and missionary meetings,—associated in the formation of auxiliaries, and collected \$264.35½. Sabbaths mostly spent in destitute places.

SUMMARY.

No. of missionaries employed 22, of whom 7 were Licentiates. No. of weeks reported 185. No of sermons reported by 11 missionaries 578. Prayer and Conference meetings reported by 10, 75. Family visits 1036. Miles travelled by 3 of these 4550. Tracts distributed by 4 of these 4345.—Baptisms reported by 14 missionaries 222. Several missions are now in course of fulfillment.

It will be seen by the above summary that the amount of labours performed is considerably less than last year, and yet the number added to the Churches is in advance of any previous year. While therefore, we regret that the labour has been diminished, we can but rejoice that so much good has been done. To God alone be all the glory.

In conclusion, Dear Brethren and Sisters, your Board would express their unfeigned thanks to Almighty God for His blessing during the past year; and to you for your hearty co-operation in this great and glorious work. And moreover, we would bespeak your continued aid by giving us your sympathies, counsels, contributions, and prayers.

Your Board are convinced of the utility of the establishment of more permanent missions. Much time and means have been apparently lost by Missionaries being obliged to leave in the midst of a good work, and in many instances when their work has just commenced.

Your Board deeply regret the necessity of circumscribing their operations in any degree, when so many extensive fields invite—nay urgently demand—missionary labour.

Instead of narrowing our field, we ought to enlarge it.—Newfoundland has been thought of as a mission field and something has been said but nothing done. Almost nothing has been done for the coloured population, and many of them very justly complain that they are sadly neglected.

Never perhaps dear brethren, were we more loudly called upon to be “up and doing” than at the present time.

A voice from the camp of the enemy who has declared perpetual war against the Christian Church, calls upon us to equip ourselves and take the field. A voice from multitudes of our fellow-countrymen, wallowing in sin and pollution under the galling chains of the worst of slavery, calls upon us for their emancipation. A voice from many feeble and declining churches without Pastors, planted amid the toils and tears of the sainted Fathers, calls upon us to give them the ministrations of God's Word and Ordinances.

The voice of the sainted Bentley who fought bravely and fell on the field, and who "though dead yet speaketh," calls loudly upon us—not to rear a splendid monument over his quiet resting place—not to enroll his name on the pillar of earthly fame,—but to fill up the vacancy occasioned by his fall and press on to victory. A voice is heard from the dark mansions of the departed, and in deep sepulchral tones, warns us that "there is no work, nor device, nor knowledge in the grave," whither we are all hastening. And above all is heard the voice of the Great Head of the Church in all its richness, bursting forth from a soul full of compassion for a lost world. It is heard in the midnight pleadings—in the agonizing prayer in the garden—in the groans of Calvary. It is heard in the great commission, "Go teach all nations baptizing in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." Let nothing short of the fulfilment of that great commission be our aim.
