

## How Australians

Canadian Commissioner Reports on Methods in the Antipodes Staff in Each State

Ottawa, Mar. 15—D. H. Ross, Canadian Trade Commissioner in Australia,
has forwarded details of the Australian
methods of fixing prices of foodstuffs and other necessary commodities. In the view of the agitation in the subject in ed office at 364 Main street, North End. this country his report is of interest.

A commissioner has been appointed at the capital of each Australian state to administer the regulations, and a federal commissioner co-ordinates the work and is directly in touch with the minister in control of this section of commonwealth activity. The staff in each state consists of a commissioner, an inquiry officer and two elegical assistants. The cost of the control two clerical assistants. The cost of the

commonwealth scheme is estimated to approximately £2,000 in each state, independent of the expenditure of the federal commissioner and his staff.

The principle has been laid down that existing channels of distribution, commissions or allowances for same, are to be recognized as long as such charges are not unreasonable.

While the wholesale and retail prices have been fixed on certain lines in some of the states, the determinations so far arrived at are not very comprehensive, nor, in quite a number of instances, do they cover all the states. The various commissioners, however, are constantly engaged in making investigations, and hence the number of articles, governed by fixed prices, is being augmented from week to week.

This proposal was accepted.





Prussian Methods Prevent Fuller Expression of Real Sentiments

of Many of the People

Many attempts have been made by King Constantine to enlist sympathy on this continent on the plea that he is being persecuted by the Entente Allies.
Statements carefully concocted have been scattered broadcast, with Teuton skill, to make it appear that the British and French have oppressed Greece as Germany oppressed Belgium. The Venizelos provisional government, however, has attended to the campaign of calumny by sending representatives to Europe and America to explain the situation from a real Greek point of rich. uation from a real Greek point of view. Alexander Diomede, former Greek minister of finance, is one of the emissaries, and has made a statement in which are many facts not previously published. He says that M. Venizelos resolved to separate from the king as soon as he saw the pro-German policy of the latter, being convinced that the future of Greece was dependent upon the continued friendship of Britain and France. He is

resolutely following the policy of trying to lead Greece in this path of friendship,

Proof of the Treachery M. Diomede writes: "The most striking proof of the understanding between the Athens government and that of Berlin, an understanding which almost became an alliance, is to be found in the surrounder of the Greek profes in eastern render of the Greek forts in eastern Macedonia, of a whole corps d'armee which was sent off to Germany, and of which was sent off to Germany, and of 240 heavy guns, together with large supplies of grain, munitions and petroleum. A large portion of the grain found its way into Germany, where it served, of course, to supplement the defective food supply. It took some time to realize that the Athens government was ruled by a military staff which was absolutely devoted to German interests, and ly devoted to German interests and which took its orders from the German which took its orders from the German attache, Falkenhausen, who was permanently installed at the headquarters of the Greek army. The object of the government was to help on the domination of Germany in the east, with a view to destroying British influence there. The time came when M. Venizelos became convined that the was recessery to the converge that the convergence that the conver convinced that it was necessary to put an end to this policy and to ally himself with the powers of the Entente, notably France and England. He wished to give a practical proof of the faith that was in him, and therefore he set about organizing an army to fight for the common cause.

Sympathy With Protecting Powers "As a statesman he clearly perceived that it was to the interest of the Greek people that they should side with the protecting powers which for a century past have not only manifested their symuthy toward the Greeks, but have lent them effective aid in times of need. The authority of M. Venizelos extends over the greater part of the Hellenie kingdom. the greater part of the Hellenic kingdom. Those provinces which acknowledge his government are wealthier and have a larger population than those over which the king still rules. The total population of Greece is 5,200,000 inhabitants. tion of Greece is 5,200,000 inhabitants. The number who have spontaneously deserted the government of Athens and rallied round M. Venizelos by way of showing that they are faithful to the traditional friendship with the protecting powers and that they disapprove of the treason of the government of Athens toward its allies of Serbia is 2,800,000. It follows that the number of those who still acknowledge the rule of King Constantine is 2,400,000, but it must not be supposed by any means that even these are really in favor of the royal policy. The government of Athens is an oligarchy, which, with the help of money obtained from the Germans, succeeds in ained from the Germans, succeeds in keeping down the people and preventing them from giving expression to the national sentiment. It is a system of ter-rorism that does not shrink even from murder and pillage, the object of which is to try to make the world believe that

Other dogs which deserve medals for their work are Marquis, which carried a message around his neck to a far-off detachment, arriving breathless and panting at his destination, only to die; Stop, of the Fifteenth Army Corps, which saved many lives by his activities, and Flora, of the Twelfth Alpine Chasseurs, which did linking work for two days, running under a rain of shell fire.

The French war department has on record a letter from the father of a framily, who wrote saying:—"I already have three sons and a son-in-law with the colors; now I give my dog, and 'Vive la France." France."

Dogs on both sides do sentry duty at night, carrying messages back to the line with more security than man and give notice of he advance of the enemy by barking. These dogs are trained to bark whenever a stranger approaches within 200 yards, and surprise attacks have often been frustrated by this advance knowledge.

phone.


The use of dogs in war is merely history repeating itself. In earlier times the use of the dog was far more extensive. Both Greeks and Romans used them as actual fighters, arming them with coats of mail and fearsome spiked

collars.

In the border wars between England and Scotland both sides employed dogs to track fugitives, and Wallace and Bruce had narrow escapes from English bloodhounds, old chronicles testify. 

### DOGS AND THEIR WAYS

Magistrate Ritchie Defines Law and Wains Owners What Constitutes Nuisance

In the police court yesterday after-noon, Magistrate Ritchie laid down the law in the matter of the proper looking after of dogs so that they could not beome either a danger or a nuisance t the neighbors. The matter was brought up on the complaint of a West \$t. John woman that a neighbor's dog was in the habit of annoying her on the street and in her yard. The animal never attempted to bite her, she said, but she was never certain that it would not. The defendant said that it was pretty hard to keep a dog tied up, and that, moreover, the animal was perfectly harmless.
His honor said that he knew of a case recently where a Leinster street lady was so annoyed by a dog jumping at her on the street that she had nervous prostration and he also recalled a case where a family had found it necessary to moye simply because dogs in a neighboring barn barked and yelped all day so that the strain became intolerable on the lady of the house. He himself had had experience in such case and while he was not afraid of a dog, it was only reasonable to suppose that many ladies would be. It was a matter to which too little attention is paid and it would be well for all citizens to know just what the law says on the matter. The city by-law, as
