





"Although practically all the divi-sions employed have already been engaged in severe and prolonged fighting this year, all arms and ser-

"In this battle the tanks for the first time have been afforded an opportunity of working in large num-bers and of showing their special value under conditions suitable to them. Without them the complete surprise gained would not have been possible, could not even have been attempted. Their performances have entirely justified the trust placed in

them.

"The infantry, artillery and aircraft have co-operated with efficiency and complete devotion to duty, in which they never fail. The cavalry has co-operated with the other arms with excellent results. The royal engineers, the signal services, transportation services, army "service corps and the various administrative services concerned each performed most valuable work.




