TWO FREDERICTON CASUALTIES Fredericton, N. B., Nov. 25.—According to word received by Mrs. H. Atherton has again been wounded. He was admitted on November 17 to the 149th Field Ambulance a gunshot wound in the right thigh.

WAR NOTES

It is reported that Maximilian Harden has been permitted to republish his newspaper, Die Zukunft and will be allowed to continue his pictures, forbidden a month ago.

The Tribunal, of Berlin, prints a despatch from Zurich to the effect that a meeting of the foreign affairs committee of the Bundsrath on next Tuesday presumably has been called because of the Russian armistice proposals.

Dr. Ami Jacques Magnin, chief surgeon of the American hospital at Neuilly, died suddenly last night.

ATTACK IN ALBANIA

Rome, Nov. 24.—The Austrians have renewed their attacks on the Italian lines in southern Albania, but met with a repulse at the defenders' hands, the war office announced today.

THE OFFICIAL STATEMENT reads: "In Albania on Thursday night the enemy attacked our lines between the Yozun and Osum rivers. He was repulsed. A few local enemy detachments were annihilated by our counter-attacks."

Berlin Report. Berlin, Nov. 24, via London.—The text of the evening official statement today regarding operations on the Italian front reads: "West of the Brenna and between the Brenna and the Piave, Italian attacks failed."

Hungarian Traitor Captured. London, Nov. 25.—A despatch from Ward Price at Italian headquarters, Nov. 23, says: "The fortune of war has brought a dramatic incident near Lake Garda. It is that of a Hungarian who denounced Cesare Battisti, Italian Irredentist deputy at Trent Austrian Parliament, when he was captured by his enemies fighting as a soldier in the Italian army. Battisti's execution has made the impression in Italy, comparable to that in England caused by the shooting of Edith Cavell."

The Hungarian soldier who identified Battisti among the prisoners was half Italian and wears a gold medal given him by the emperor for this service. He was seriously wounded when he fell into Italian hands.

Hockey Plans Materialize Montreal, Nov. 25.—The new senior professional hockey body to take the place of the National Hockey Association, will come officially into existence this afternoon with a four-club schedule of two matches a week. The Star says: "The new national hockey league will be composed of the Ottawa, Canadiens, Wanderers and Toronto."

Barlow, transport officials, arrived in the city at noon today in a private car attached to the Montreal train. The car was cut off at Fairville and taken around to West St. John where the officials inspected docks and other facilities which will be used during the winter season. H. C. Groat, general superintendent of the C. P. R., New Brunswick division, accompanied the visitors on their inspection trip.

LOCAL NEWS

Hon. F. B. Carvell addressed a big meeting at Debec on Friday night and was well received.

New Brunswick gave \$50,000.84 to the British Red Cross. C. B. Allan, provincial treasurer of the British Red Cross, has submitted a detailed report.

The river steamer Majestic, which left Fredericton on Saturday morning for St. John, was unable to make her destination because of heavy ice. She was obliged to stop at Jemseg.

In St. John the Baptist church yesterday the pastor, Rev. F. J. McQuay, made feeling references to three young men, formerly of his parish, who had been killed in action, Privates Lennihan, Vaughan and Leonard.

Two men who claimed Toronto as their place of residence, were caught in one house. They told Captain Savard that they would break him and his assistants in the discharge of their duties.

From 7.30 p. m. until 8.30 a. m. the patrol wagon plied its way from house to station and back again over the same route, each load being the capture of a different house. The police, under Inspector Belanger and Captain Savard, with a squad of men, removed from fourteen houses eighty-five women and forty-four men taken during the raid.

Several of the houses netted only women prisoners. Of the fourteen houses raided only two were not proved to be disorderly places and the alleged keepers of these two pleaded not guilty and charges of conducting such resorts. For the other places of guilty were entered and fines ranging from \$50 to \$200 imposed by Recorder Geoffrion. In cases where the men found in the houses were served by solicitors the recorder fined the prisoner lightly, but the keepers were severely dealt with.

The "red light" in Montreal continues to pay for its rays. On Friday morning 117 more men and women caught in raids made, appeared before Recorder Geoffrion, and were fined in all \$2,774.48. This is a record for the city, although on Thursday over \$2,000 worth collected in fines for similar offences. Two alleged keepers pleaded not guilty. One house paid in fines \$200.

**1030 German
Planes Down**

**CANADIAN COLONEL
KILLED IN DUG-OUT**
T. C. Irving, of Toronto, father of the
late Lieut. Col. Tom Irving, who was re-
cently killed in action, says the Toron-
to Telegram, has received the following
letter from Major-General D. Watson,
commanding the 4th Canadian Division
in France, describing how the officer met
his death when a German aeroplane
dropped bombs on Col. Irving's dugout.
"I might say in the first place how
dearly we sympathize with you all in
this great loss. His death was a sad
blow to everyone in this division, as his
sterling character and commanding per-
sonality endeared him to everyone with
whom he came in contact in this divi-
sion, and outside of it. His work during
our period on this front was one of the
greatest satisfaction to us all, as the
situation was such that demanded the
supervision of the very best man possible
to create proper order out of the chaos
and confusion that existed when we took
over. Of course, in this I refer to the
part of the work requiring engineering
attention, and necessitated so by the
fearful weather conditions and other
details.
Yesterday afternoon Col. Irving came
in as usual to my headquarters, and we
went over the programme of work to-
gether, going into the different phases of
the work already done, and mapping
out the most urgent requirements for
further consideration and action. He had
tea with us between 5 and 6.30 p. m.,
and afterwards a German aeroplane
came over and scattered the usual
nightly supply of bombs all over the
area. One of these struck immediately
at the door of his dugout, and as he was
unfortunately sitting at the only place
in the dugout, opposite the door, he was
hit by a piece of the shell in the chest
and died almost instantly. He was bur-
ied this afternoon, at a little military
cemetery some distance in our rear, and
his grave will be properly looked after
and carefully marked.
I would take this early opportunity
of again expressing on behalf of all in
this division our very sincere sympathy
with you all in this your great bereave-
ment, it is at such times and under such
a loss, that it is difficult to find proper
words for expressing the depth of one's
feelings."

FELL AT HEAD OF PLATOON
Late Lieut. George K. Holland Killed
in Action By Rifle Bullet.

not empowered to sign a treaty for an armistice, but only to negotiate it. He declared that Russia did not contemplate a separate peace with Germany; that the belief that an armistice on the Russian front would make it possible for Germany to throw a large force on the French front was groundless; that the Russian government before signing a treaty for an armistice would communicate with the allies and make certain proposals to "the imperialist governments of France and England, rejection of which would place them in open opposition to the wishes of their own peoples."

There is dissension in the ranks of the Bolshevik camp, the conflict between the social revolutionists and the council of the national commissioners is ripening.

An Army Call

Petrograd, Nov. 25, via London, Nov. 25—(British Admiralty, per wireless Press)—A proclamation, signed "Spiridonov, chairman of the assembly," has been addressed to all delegates from the armies at the front and division and district deputies. It says: "An extraordinary assembly has been opened. Comrades are requested to come immediately to a conference of the all-Russian peasant deputies. One should be sent from each district and each division."

Ensign Krylonko, the new commander-in-chief of the army, asked by an interviewer why the German army had failed to take advantage of Russia's troubles, is reported as having replied:—"The German proletariat is hand in hand with us and will not allow official Germany to hamper the fulfillment of a great cause."

The military revolutionary committee has ordered the dissolution of the committee for the salvation of the country and revolution, the despatch adds, because the latter committee urged the employees of the state bank not to deliver funds to the Maximalists.

Haig Reviews Gains; Thanks Men of Army

London, Nov. 25.—The following order of the day was issued by Field Marshal Haig on Sunday:

"The capture of the important Bourlon position yesterday crowns a most successful operation and opens the way to the further exploitation of advantages already gained. In the operations of the third army during the past four days the troops engaged were called on to advance under conditions different from anything ever attempted before. The manner in which they adapted themselves to the new conditions was in all respects admirable and the results gained by their efforts are of far-reaching importance. Although practically all the divisions employed have already been engaged in severe and prolonged fighting this year, all arms and ser-

VICES have met these fresh calls on them in a manner worthy the highest traditions of the British army. "In this battle the tanks for the first time have been afforded an opportunity of working in large numbers and of showing their special value under conditions suitable to them. Without them the complete surprise gained would not have been possible, could not even have been attempted. Their performances have entirely justified the trust placed in them.

"The infantry, artillery and aircraft have co-operated with efficiency and complete devotion to duty, in which they never fail. The cavalry has co-operated with the other arms with excellent results. The royal engineers, the signal services, transportation services, army service corps and the various administrative services concerned each performed most valuable work.

"To General Sir Julian Byng and his staff, to the commanders and staffs under him and to all arms and services engaged in these operations my thanks and warmest congratu-

lations are due for the manner in which they prepared and carried through the operations and on the splendid results achieved.

"I also express my obligation to all ranks at general headquarters for the success with which they met the severe strain imposed by the arrangements for these operations, in addition to the sudden movement of troops to Italy, the operations on the Flanders front and the many other movements and reliefs which had to be carried out simultaneously.

"The operations on the third army front would in all probability have miscarried if the enemy had gained timely warning of our intentions and a most satisfactory feature in connection with these operations, is the

THE BOSTON BOATS. A. C. Carie, local agent of the Eastern Steamship Company, will leave this evening for Boston, where he will consult with the officials of the company as to the outlook for the service between St. John and Boston.

TWELVE EXEMPTED. Exemption tribunal No. 88 heard twenty-three cases this morning. Seven were postponed. Four applications for exemption were disallowed and twelve allowed.

ACCIDENT. Mr. McHugh, an employe of Grant & Horne, was hurt this morning at the New Brunswick Power Company when a heavy piece of iron fell on his foot, fracturing one toe. He was taken to the General Public Hospital and, after treatment there, was sent to his home in East St. John.

COACHMEN'S CASES. Frank Donnelly and Maurice Garrin, two coachmen who did not appear in court on Saturday when charged with stepping in front of the railing at the Union depot on Nov. 24 to solicit passengers, were heard this morning. CHICKENPOX AND SMALLPOX. The chief health officer desires to call attention of the public to the very close resemblance there is between chickenpox and smallpox, especially in the early stages of the latter. Though chickenpox is not one of the diseases that must be reported to the board of health, he is informed that a good many cases of it are occurring in the city at present, and that in some of these instances no medical man is called in. He would therefore earnestly advise that the family physician be called whenever supposed chickenpox occurs, in order to guard against the danger of a case of smallpox being mistaken for that of the milder and vastly less important complaint.

FOR ST. JAMES STREET HOSPITAL. On Saturday afternoon seven little Fairville girls held a bazaar in the school to provide funds for the St. James Street Convalescent Hospital for wounded soldiers. Some of the girls were from Union Point school and others from the Upper school and all worked together with a will to make the affair a success. LIEUT. KNOWLTON TO GET THIRD STAR

Word was received at military headquarters this morning to the effect that the appointment of Lieutenant C. D. Knowlton, a returned officer of the 29th Battalion, to the position of adjutant of the New Brunswick Depot Battalion, had been approved. Lieutenant Knowlton is to be promoted to the rank of captain.

THE CROIX DE GUERRE FOR GENERAL CURRIE

Paris, Nov. 24—(via Reuter's Ottawa Agency)—Lieut. General Sir Arthur Currie, commanding the Canadian corps in France, was privately dined here today by the commission which recently visited the United States. Premier Clemenceau instructed General Viduan to send General Currie the Croix De Guerre in the name of France. The Canadian commander was the recipient also of many congratulations. M. Henokux, recalled that the great British effort in Flanders was assisted by Canadian troops. General Currie thanked M. Henokux, and expressed his own and the Canadian army's pride in fighting for the triumph of liberty along side the French army on French soil.

RALLY MARKS THE MARKET OPENING

New York, Nov. 26—(Wall Street)—The stock market opened with a general rally from last Saturday's moderate depression. War shares, shippings and specialties gained one to one and a half points, and Union Pacific featured the irregular rally, advancing one and a quarter points. General Electric was reactionary, however, on the new financing of the company, yielding more than two points. General Motors and Pullman were included among other heavy issues.

AT CITY HALL

Some Bills Dealt With—The Grain Conveyor—People Want Land Again for Planting

At a common council committee meeting this morning Commissioner Russell said that he had received a communication asking for permission to go on with the replacing of a section of the grain conveyor which was destroyed when No. 5 shed collapsed last year. He explained that Engineer Hatfield was looking after the work and would see that it was carried out according to specifications and that the city's rights would be protected.

Commissioner Wigmore said that as a matter of courtesy plans should be submitted to the common council for approval.

Commissioner Russell also presented a letter from the freight handlers in which they expressed themselves as thoroughly satisfied with improvements made to flooring in sections of the freight wharf in West St. John, and thanking the council for having the work done.

Commissioner Russell recommended that W. E. Brown's bill for repairing No. 1 shed be paid. He read a letter from the city's solicitor in which he recommended that the bill be paid. The bill had been held up owing to the fact that the city was asked to pay \$4 a day to men employed by the contractor.

Commissioner Wigmore said that he felt that the bill should be paid and the matter settled. While the proceedings should have been presented to the council for sanction, he said, he felt now that the work had been done the only thing to do was to pay the bill.

Commissioner Fisher said there was no doubt that the bill would have to be paid, but he was not in favor of voting to pay a bill when the figures were not available.

Mayor Hayes said that the matter could not be definitely settled until the meeting tomorrow and suggested that Commissioner Russell have the amounts, etc., ready to place before the council. He said that all agreed to pay the bill if the amounts were right.

Commissioner Russell moved that Edward A. Farren's bill of \$204.48 for blanketing sheds No. 1, 2 and 6 be paid. This was let by contract and the motion was seconded by Commissioner Wigmore and unanimously carried.

The sum of \$558.05 was recommended to be paid to E. G. Howard by Commissioner Russell for repairing South Rodney wharf and No. 6 trestle. This bill as well as the preceding one had been certified to by Engineer Russell.

Commissioner Russell said that he had received about sixty applications from people, who had been granted city land on the Manawagonish road for planting purposes, for a renewal of that privilege next summer. He moved that this be provided that no application for sales of this property be received. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Wigmore and passed unanimously.

ANOTHER COTTAGE BROKEN INTO; RIFLE IS TAKEN

Still another summer cottage has been broken into and the suburbanites are feeling very strongly that some action be put an end to the breaks should be taken. On visiting his cottage at Morna station last week end, F. C. Jackson found that a shutter had been torn off and an entrance forced in the back of his house, facing the railway. Inside, everything was chaos. The only article of importance, however, which had been taken was a rifle.

POLICE COURT

L. M. Johnston was reported for driving his motor car up Mill street while under the influence of liquor, endangering the lives of pedestrians and at last crashing into an auto belonging to the Imperial Tobacco Company in front of their office in Mill street. The damage is said to be \$150. The case was postponed until this afternoon. The defendant is out on a \$200 deposit.
