Further Gains in West and East For The Allies

HAIG'S MEN PUSHING AHEAD EVERY DAY

Appreciable Gain Is Made Near Courcellette

FRENCH DRIVING ON

Heavy Losses Inflicted on the Enemy in Yesterday's Fighting—Denicourt is Now Encircled and There Have Been Gains Elsewhere

London, Sept. 18.—In small operations on the Somme front last night the British gained further ground. The war office announced today that the general situation continues unchanged south of the Ancre, where improved position north of Martinpuich. East of Courcelette a minor attack made last night upon elements of enemy trenches was entirely successful. Our line has been advanced appreciably at this point.

French Victorious

Paris, Sept. 18.—(Noon)—The Germans lost heavily in several counter-attacks north and south of the Somme last night, the war office announced today. The French maintained the ground recently won and made further progress near Clercy and Berry and on the eastern edge of Denicourt. The French 1200 prisoners and ten machine guns, the statement says. The town of Denicourt is now completely encircled by the French. The number of prisoners counted up to the present time reaches 1200. Also ten machine guns of the enemy are now our possession.

Russian Report

Petrograd, Sept. 18.—Attempts by the Turks to make an attack in the region of the village of Adria, on the Caucasian front, were frustrated by our fire, says the official announcement issued here today.

BRITISH RAID GERMAN AERODROMES

London, Sept. 18 (Noon)—The War Office announced: "Yesterday afternoon a squadron of our naval aeroplanes carried out a further attack on enemy aerodromes at St. Denis and Westreham. A large number of bombs were dropped with successful result. One of our machines was obliged to make a forced landing in Holland and the pilot has been interned."

RIVER GIVES UP ONE VICTIM OF THE BRIDGE DISASTER

Quebec, Sept. 18.—The first body to be recovered in the Quebec bridge disaster was found floating at noon off the pier at St. Romuald, a mile from the bridge site. It was that of Cyrille Bernier of Lewis, who was last seen jumping from the south shore cantilever arm, when the centre span crashed down into the river. The body was mangled and could be identified only by the trousers. A Lewis tailor recognized them as those he made for Bernier some time ago. The coroner's inquest will be opened tomorrow, Tuesday morning, at ten-thirty, in St. Romuald. The inquest will be held in the Quebec court house.

NOTIFY POLICE CHIEF

Chief Simpson has a letter from the Canadian Courier office in Toronto with an interesting bit of information. It states that complaints have reached them from the maritime provinces regarding a man who has been representing himself as an authorized agent of the Canadian Courier periodical. The man is said to have been here not very long ago. It is said he engaged an agent with the Courier's name some three years ago, but was given his release.

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MAJOR PERCY McAVITY

Major Percy Douglas McAvity was admitted to No. 7 Stationary Hospital at Boulogne on September 17, suffering from a gunshot wound in the chest.

During all the time he has been at the front he has escaped being wounded and has not even had a day's sickness until the present casualty. His many friends are hoping that the wound is not a serious one.

Lieut. J. M. Humphrey

Lieutenant James McGovern Humphrey of this city, who was overseas with the Montreal Grenadier Guards battalion, the 87th, in last May, is reported wounded on September 18. The official message reached his father, William H. Humphrey of J. M. Humphrey & Co. Ltd., yesterday and contained no information beyond the bare fact that he had been wounded. Before joining the overseas force Lieutenant Humphrey was a member of the staff of the Bank of Nova Scotia here.

That Corporal Andrew Coutts of this city had been wounded and admitted to the war hospital at Guilford, is the word received by Mrs. Coutts of 68 Wall street.

Corporal Coutts and his brother James went overseas with the 12th battalion, Cornwall. Coutts was transferred to another, while his brother was transferred to the Princess Pats and was killed in the heavy fighting on Hill 60 in April, 1916.

That Corporal Coutts was very efficient in his work was marked by the fact that when he arrived in France he was appointed to the position as instructor in a bombing school, after which he was made bombing instructor in a divisional school. He is twenty-eight years old and was a carpenter by trade. His wife and two small children reside in Wall street.

DESTROY EIGHT SEAPLANES

Giant Russian Aeroplanes Drop Bomb on German Station London, Sept. 18.—A Reuter despatch from Petrograd says that four giant Russian aeroplanes bombed a German seaplane station on Lake Angeren in the Gulf of Riga, where seventeen seaplanes of various sizes and models were dispersed. The Russian planes were described as being of a type which could be used for bombing and air fight not fewer than eight German machines were destroyed or put out of action. The Russian aeroplanes returned safely notwithstanding they were shelled by anti-aircraft guns.

GERMANS SAY THEY WILL BUILD SHIPS

Berlin, Sept. 18.—Hamburg is emulating the example set by England. German shipping men have formed a "national" shipbuilding company which will immediately begin the construction of a series of 5,000 ton steamers for Germany's freight carrying trade after the war. The Hamburg-American Line is behind the movement, and Albert Lalin, director-general of that line, will be chairman of the directorate.

NEVER PUBLISH THEIR "BAG" Royal Flying Corps Men Do Not Believe in Glorifying Over Hostile Airmen, Writes Capt. Goodrich.

Hallowell, Me., Sept. 18.—Frank E. Goodrich, of this city, who is now in France with the Royal Flying Corps on the Somme battle front, has just been promoted to the rank of captain and has been given charge of a company of 60 men.

He writes his mother, Mrs. A. F. Goodrich, that he has had several encounters in the air in the last two months and that he has been getting many miles over the enemy country, and beyond getting a few hours in his machine he has had his usual good luck.

"The Royal Flying Corps, unlike the French and German flying corps, makes it a rule never to publish the number of machines brought down by individual pilots," writes Capt. Goodrich. "And it is quite right, too, we think. It is an unpleasant thing to have to shoot a man down and perhaps see him fall in flames, hardy the thing to boast over like a horse race. I am sure I have no desire to be held up as a man who has shot down his 'sup-tenth enemy machine, though it had been my unpleasant duty to bring him down a few more."

"You wanted to know how Immetmann was finally brought down. He tried his old game of diving on one of our machines while it was being engaged by several others. Unfortunately for Immetmann, another of our machines was behind watching for such a move. Before he could get away he was shot down and killed. We were sorry to learn that he had been killed, for we had hoped to bring him down alive on our side and make him a prisoner, as he had admitted his ability as a pilot."

"I had the honor to drop a wreath for him from the members of our squadron. We subscribed for it, attached a card inscribed: 'To Lieut. Immetmann, a brave and able opponent, from the R. F. C., and I took it over one afternoon and dropped it by parachute on one of the aerodromes. They shelled me all the way over and back, but did no damage. I was acknowledged later in the German papers. Several other squadrons also dropped wreaths."

LABOR AND WAGES To the Editor of the Times: Sir—I notice in your paper of Sept. 16 an article which says labor is scarce in St. John. It speaks of a scarcity of mechanics as well as laborers. I doubt that, and would like to know what wages are offered. If laborers can get \$2.50 a day (are they getting it), I presume mechanics would get more. What sort of a job was it, and what were the wages, when fifteen men left it one afternoon to get better jobs? I believe \$1.75 a day for unskilled and \$2.25 a day for skilled labor is about the average in St. John the year round. I believe if employers would advertise the kind of work and the wages paid, could get men, if the wages were right.





Jack's Baseball Knowledge Has Helped Make Brooklyn Club a Winner; Pays Tribute To Connie Mack

With the end of the season less than a month away and the Brooklyn and Philadelphia clubs fighting neck and neck down the stretch it is to the level-headed veterans of the team that Uncle Wilbert Robinson looks to carry the Robins under the wire. Of these there is none more dependable than Jack Coombs. With the experience of ten years in the major leagues as a foundation, Coombs has built up a wonderful knowledge of baseball, which makes him invaluable as a lieutenant to Robins, and he is in no small measure responsible for the success of the Brooklyn team. NO HOSPITAL ROOM FOR CASE OF WHOOPING COUGH

That is Situation in Saint John Today

What if Epidemic Broke Out?—Children's Home in Elliot Row Quarantined and Society's Work Seriously Handicapped

The Children's Home in Elliott row is now a children's hospital, and will be such for two months or more. No matter how urgent the case, no child can be taken within its doors for that period.

Nor can any children be taken out of their foster homes, unless those taking them are willing to run the risk of whooping cough.

The Children's Aid Society is halted in its work, and the cost of maintaining the Home is increased. If the police should raid a house and gather in little children, they could not be placed in the Home.

All this is due to the fact that there is no children's hospital in St. John, nor room in the public or epidemic hospital for a child with whooping cough. Two children recently taken to the Home after their mother's arrest, were found to be suffering with whooping cough. Application was made for their admission to the hospital. The reply was that there was no accommodation. The matron of the Children's Home therefore placed the two in a room by themselves, and did the best she could; but last week another child, taken from the Home to the children's ward in the hospital to be treated for another serious trouble was at once sent back because it had developed whooping cough.

There are thirteen children in the Home, some were about to be sent out to foster homes and others were to be brought in. Now the house is quarantined and the matron will probably have to deal with thirteen cases of whooping cough among children, nearly all of whom were ill-nourished when they entered the Home. To continue taking in children would be to come each new-comer with a probable attack of whooping cough, and make a special nurse a necessity. It is, however, worthy of note that proper care in the Home unquestionably saved the life of one of the children that had whooping cough when taken there.

Of course the most serious result of the present condition of affairs is the interference with the society's work, which as yet has only touched the fringe of the problem of child welfare in St. John; but there is another consideration. If there is no hospital accommodation in St. John for one case of whooping cough, what would happen if there should be even a small epidemic of diphtheria, scarlet fever or measles?

A BIG WINTER SEASON AHEAD

Commissioner Russell Brings Cheery Report

ALL WE CAN HANDLE

C. P. R. to Have Extra Passenger Sailing Each Week—Hudson Bay Company May Send Fleet—Hon. Rob't Rogers Here Soon

Glowing reports of the prospects for a big winter business in St. John have been brought back from Montreal by James V. Russell, commissioner of harbors, who returned on Saturday after attending a conference of harbor authorities.

The C. P. R. officials in Montreal gave the commissioner the assurance that their service from St. John would be on the same scale as last year, with the addition of an extra passenger steamer each week, making two passenger steamers instead of one as last year. It is his expectation that the arrangement of freight offering at St. John will be limited only by the extent of the harbor facilities and the number of steamers which can be docked here.

Another announcement of great interest is a possibility that the Hudson Bay Company may send its fleet of steamers to St. John this winter. The company now has ten steamers of its own and, with other craft under charter, has understood that it is dispatching a fleet each day from Montreal for France. It is understood that they are willing to come to St. John provided that a warehouse of sufficient size can be found for them.

Owing to the contention which is already being felt seriously in Montreal it has been necessary to divert some freight to Quebec and to load the steamers there. Under the circumstances it is expected that the winter season will open in St. John much earlier than usual and the commissioner has been laying the advantages of this port before the proper authorities.

The allotment of 112 berths for winter use has been partly completed and it is expected that the arrangement will be about the same as last winter.

Before going to Montreal, the commissioner visited Halifax and looked over the harbor works there. He was much impressed with the amount which has been accomplished on the \$7,000,000 harbor contract. One big pier is nearing completion and at least one berth is promised for the first of the year.

Hon. Robert Rogers, minister of public works for the dominion, is expected to visit St. John in about ten days' time and when he arrives it is the intention of the city commissioners to have a further conference with him regarding harbor matters. One of the most pressing claims which will be laid before him is the need for the extension of the Negro Point breakwater to Partridge Island to protect the West Side berths. This work was promised and the contract let, but it since had been held up nominally on account of the war, although the work at other ports is proceeding without interruption.

Dr. Dyas Enlists

Dr. Douglas Dyas of St. Stephen, formerly of Eastport, has enlisted for service overseas, and expects soon to be transferred to France. Dr. Dyas has been trying for some time to get work in the hospitals at the front.

BECOMES THE NEW BRUNSWICK DISTRICT

New Name For Atlantic Division of the C. P. R.

A change in the designation of districts on the C. P. R. will become effective with the change of the fall timetable on October 1. The Atlantic Division, which includes all lines east of Megantic, both in Maine and New Brunswick, will be known as the New Brunswick district.

There will be two sub-districts, No. 1 including from Megantic to St. John, the Fredericton branch, and the Shore Line. No. 2 will include all branch lines north and south of Megantic.

Similar changes have been made all over Canada. The Eastern division will in future be known as the Quebec district, the Ontario division as the Ontario district, and the Lake Superior as the Algoma district. In the west the name division will be changed to district.

ARE FLOODING CARLETON COUNTY WITH LIQUOR

Carleton county is being flooded with liquor by way of Victoria county. It is reported that liquor is being distributed through Carleton, to uphold the cause of Hon. B. Frank Smith and Mayor Sifton, who refused to agree to a joint committee to prevent the use of money and rum.

NO CITY ACTION RE THE PRICE OF COAL

Speaking today of the suggestion which was made in council a short time ago that the city should interest itself in the price of coal, Mayor Hayes said that a short investigation showed that coal prices have been forced upwards by the same circumstances which have had the same effect on almost every commodity. The difference in the freight rates now and before the war are enough in themselves to explain most of the increase in price. As the trouble is general and not local there is nothing that the city can do about the matter.

Yesterday the telephone at police headquarters had a busy day and the policeman who answered it also had a busy time. It was, however, as like every Sunday, only with a few more rings. Sunday complaints were pouring in about "such and such a one selling milk, groceries, etc." on the Sabbath.
