RED CROSS ENDORSATION

By Head Office at Toronto—Letter to St. John From Mrs. Dewey Tells of Gratitude For Help and of the Great Need For Aid

After quoting from one of Mrs. Dewey's letters, the Red Cross headquarters at Toronto advise the following: An Urgent Appeal.

This is a letter from a lady who, situated as she is, is seeing the real and true realities of war. It cannot fall to very deeply impress all who read it and will perhaps be the means of inspiring many in this country to do their share on behalf of the brave men who are doing their work so nobly and suffering so greatly. We cannot begin to realize the horrors of this terrible war until we are near the scene of fighting and see day and night the constant stream of wounded and maimed men, many of them in the prime of life, being brought in from the trenches after a hard fought fight.

These men are fighting to keep inviolate our homes and liberties and our very national existence. It will not be enough to thank them and cheer them when they return but the time to assist is now when they are bearing the privations and misery of this dreadful conflict without a murmur and always with a smile. They are doing much for us; they are giving all they have, their very lives, that we may rest secure and free from this world war greater than ever. What are we doing for them? Can we do too much?

This country has risen splendidly to the occasion and in every part of the Dominion our women are making great sacrifices for the soldier men, in high positions and with great responsibilities, are devoting their time to the work of the Red Cross and patriotic associations as well as giving of their wealth. The work may be carried on with greater energy as the war continues and as our Canadian troops take their place in the battle line. He that gives now, gives twice.

(It may be asked by our readers how the socks from Nova Scotia reached the front. Probably in this way, the Nova Scotia branch sent them to the Canadian Red Cross in London. From there they were sent to the British Red Cross and from there to the British depot. From Paris they probably went to the Chateau d'Amblet (now Allies' Hospital) recognized under the British Red Cross.)

In a letter received by Mrs. Carill, referring to the tea to be given by the ladies of the French club in aid of the Allies' Hospital, Mrs. Dewey says:

"I was so pleased to receive your letter and I cannot tell you how it touched me and how good I think you and your friends are to send me anything but money. I assure you we need it, although the Americans have been wonderful, sending supplies in huge quantities; still the expenses of equipping and running this place are awfully heavy, and we need money more than anything. We keep a list of the money received and the donors will be told just what was done with the amount sent by them. We have been working very hard and have had about 400 fearful cases, for they send us none but those who are so frightfully wounded that they cannot be taken farther, and the death rate has been under 20 per cent. The life is tragic and exhausting, but I would not be without for worlds. "Some day I hope to write a few memoirs which will give you a little idea of what we are living through here. As I write, the cannon are booming away, but we are quite used to it. I cannot tell you how small appreciations any help St. John will give. Excuse this brief letter, my correspondence is simply enormous, but I just had to write you in, myself. Address letters as usual. I cannot head this because of Censor."

Money may be sent to the Allies' Hospital Fund, Morgan & Grenfell, London, England, and supplies to the American Relief Clearing House, Paris.

"These are voices which are eating our life out," declared Rev. W. A. Cameron. "It is the frantic shamelessness of a race for wealth which will traffic in the blood of Canadian sons. These fumes which have reached us from the capital city are nauseous, and should cause every high-minded Canadian to blush for shame."

UNITED STATES REPLY TO BERNSTOFF'S PROTEST

Secretary Bryan has forwarded the United States reply to Ambassador Bernstoff's protest against the sale of munitions and other war supplies to the Allies, as a breach of neutrality. The reply said that the U. S. government does not intend to place any embargo on the exportation of arms, but to buy who wish, and to refuse to sell to England and her allies would be a breach of neutrality.

TWO MILLION TONS OF INDIAN WHEAT

Encourages Quality For Export Under Government Arrangements

London, April 22—Under arrangements by the Imperial government for controlling the sale of Indian wheat, exports to the enormous amount of two million tons will be sold under government auspices. This is probably the largest quantity of the kind on record. The first cargo has been sold at 67 shillings a quarter. Assuming that an average price of 65 shillings is obtained, the whole amount involved will reach about \$145,000,000.

The firms engaged in the trade are made government agents and the maximum price is fixed and will be gradually reduced as the season advances. Any profits accruing on the sale will benefit the Indian revenue.

ST. JOHN BILLS PASSED BY THE LEGISLATURE

Fredericton, April 21.—Several St. John bills were agreed to and passed in the legislature today.

At the afternoon session the bill to provide for the appointment of an assessment commission was agreed to. The bill requiring a vote on consolidation versus the ward system of civic government at the next election, in 1916, as recommended by the committee, was adopted without debate.

When the bill to consolidate and amend the liquor license act was taken up Mr. Stewart, Northumberland, suggested that the section providing that any member of a municipal council convicted under the act should forfeit his seat, should be made to apply to members of the legislature also. Mr. Lockhart supported the suggestion and the section was stood over.

Mr. Baxter introduced a bill to consolidate and amend the succession duties act. The bill providing for the plebiscite on the St. John civic form of government gives instructions that, at the civic primary elections in April, 1916, the ballots shall bear the words "For Consolidation" and "For the Ward System," the voter to signify his wishes by striking out the system not wanted. If the majority of the electors approve of the ward system it shall be the duty of the common council to prepare a plan of representation by the ward system and submit it to the legislature at the next session.

The bill abolishing the office of recorder was agreed to also.

QUEEN'S FAN BRINGS \$1,650 TO WAR FUND

Red Cross Auction at Christie's in London Totals \$31,085 in Two Days.

The feature of the second day of the Red Cross auction sale at Christie's, London, was the sale of a tortoise shell fan donated by Queen Mary, set with Her Majesty's monogram in diamonds and surrounded by a gold crown. The bidding went from \$60 to \$800, when it was knocked down to a woman who immediately offered it for further auction, expressing the hope that it would bring more than she had given for it.

The second bidding began at \$500, but went no higher than \$700, the total total on the fan thus being \$1,650.

An Italian fan, with mother of pearl spots, overlaid with leaves in gold which was presented by Mrs. Lewis Harcourt, brought \$200. A brilliant brooch, with star and crescent in brilliant, given by Sultan Abdul Hamid to the late Lad-Gienek, was sold for \$200.

The total for the two days' sale is \$31,085.

ANOTHER CASE OF SIAMESE TWINS

Surgeon to Separate Little Texas Sisters

BOSTON OPERATION FEASIBLE

Mother, However, Demands Guarantee That Life of Neither Shall be Lost and Doctors Still Study Conditions

Houston, Tex., April 22.—Two happy, smiling little girls, twins and absolutely inseparable, have been sent to Rochester, Minn., where at an institution they are likely to be parted for the first time since their birth, two and a half years ago. The little ones are the Hinojosa twins, Guadalupe and Josephina, who are bound together in a manner similar to the Siamese twins.

The children were born in Havana, Cuba, and the family has recently been in Mexico. They are of Spanish blood. The binding connection of flesh joins the children in front at almost the centre of the stomach, and is thirteen inches in circumference. They can walk forward with facility and ease, each putting a little arm about the other's waist. The hand of flesh is elastic enough to permit them to change sides as they walk.

One of the children can lie on the edge of a bed and the other can stand beside it, their bodies making an X, so resilient is the connection. Medicine given to one has no effect upon the other. One child may be laughing and the other crying at the same time. All bodily functions seem to be independent in every way.

The babies are very fond of each other and kiss and hug at times in a loving, dithering way. But, like other children, they sometimes "fall out" and then there is a merry little "scrap."

At birth the babies weighed twelve pounds, and at the present time weigh forty-five. They look very much like, and prettier, brighter youngsters are seldom found.

FOUND CAPTIVES WELL CARED FOR

Report of a Swiss on German Prisoner Camps

LITTLE CHANCE OF ESCAPE

Barracks Well Heated and Lighted and the Food Good—Work Given to the Prisoners

Berne, February 24.—One great thing that makes Switzerland unique, that sets it apart as a nation by itself, is that so soon as a crying need is felt, it is well aired in the papers and discussed in the homes, a committee for its relief springs up goes about the business of relieving with great deliberation and method, and ends up by wiping the crying need from the face of the earth.

From the first when the prisoners of war began to write heart-rending letters that crept into print and were copied by the Swiss press, about the hardships of prison camp life, I knew that it would be Switzerland's lot to grid up her loins, form a committee, and get the truth of the matter. Sure enough, the moment came. We could look on quietly, no longer, and a committee was formed. Lieutenant de Marval, of Neuchâtel, was dispatched to France to inspect the prisoners' camps there. Mr. Naville, of Geneva, went to England, and a member of the Swiss parliament, Mr. Eugster, went to Germany. The two former have sent some categorical contradictions of all the horrors reported to exist in France and her colonies and in England, and now the third Mr. Eugster, has returned from Germany with a favorable account of the prison camps there that will make many a French and English soldier draw a long breath of relief. It is with his report that I will chiefly concern myself in this article.

The arrangement of the camps is purely Prussian and sturdy rules of law and order. In Berlin, where Mr. Eugster and his two companions, a member of the Red Cross and the Spanish minister to Germany, began their tour, they were shown a complete list of the 60,000 British, Russian and French prisoners who were divided among the sixty German camps. Of these 60,000 Mr. Eugster saw but 67,000 French and 19,000 British and Russian.

Says Camps Are Models. The prisoners' camps as described by Mr. Eugster, are certainly models. They are usually placed on large parks grounds and take in all the surrounding empty buildings, such as armories, stables, etc. On the parks around them are double, the space between being filled in with "pebble" so that they very successfully keep out the cold. Added to this, each barrack has a stove, each man a sack filled with straw that is changed at stated intervals and everyone has the right to two blankets. When I said that

The food of the ordinary German soldier costs his government about fifteen cents a day, and exactly the same amount is expended for the food of the prisoners. In the morning they get milk-coffee. FEWER CHECKS BEING ISSUED

An Effect of the War Tax—Mail Not Used so Freely

The new war taxes have had some in-teresting results. A one or two cent stamp is not an expensive luxury, but enough of them will make a hole in any one's cash and the public does not seem to want to indulge in them any more than is necessary.

One of the most noticeable results is the sudden dropping off in the number of checks handled by the banks. This is especially noticeable in the savings accounts, which many patrons have been using for the payment of bills, small and large, on the same scale as a current account. It may mean that the banks will lose some deposits but what they lose in this way is likely to be more than compensated for by the saving in bookkeeping on small transactions.

The extra copper which it costs to mail a letter has had the effect of re-duc-ing the volume of mail matters, also. Business houses are devoting some at-tention to the systematization of their cor-respondence, in some cases doing away with casual letters which can be easily dispensed with and in other cases com-bining their letters in the same envelope to save the extra stamps. Large cor-porations with branches in various places, such as the banks, will be using their own messengers more and the mail less for the local distribution of correspondence and documents, and other offices are finding that it pays them again to use a messenger boy for much of this work which has been turned over to the post office since the one cent local rate was established.
