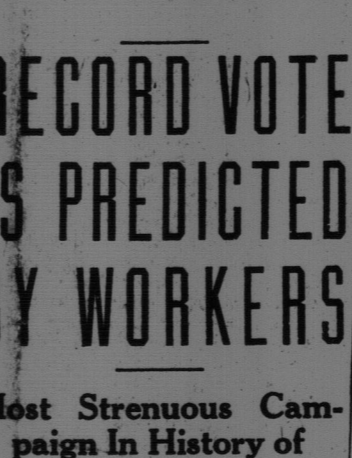

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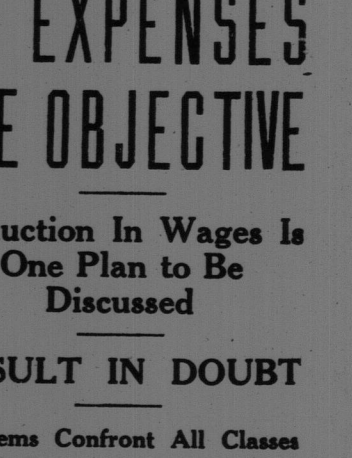

POLLING DAY IN NOVA SCOTIA.

Nova Scotia votes to-day, and the reports indicate that the electors are in an unusually thoughtful mood.

The contest has been lively and highly controversial. On the eve of election the prophets on both sides profess to see sweeping victory, in eight, and within a few hours the public will know which particular set of soothsayers is right.

THE VOCATIONAL SCHOOL.

The completion of the Saint John Vocational High School in Douglas Avenue, the cornerstone of which was laid yesterday, will mark a great step forward in educational achievement in this community.

Thus New Brunswick is acting rapidly upon the conviction that education along cultural lines is not sufficient, and is now undertaking to care for the educational requirements of a great majority of the young people who do not go to college, and too many of whom leave school in the earlier grades, without training to fit them for any particular occupation.

HARBOR DEVELOPMENT.

There was considerable discussion in the House of Commons over the additional provision in the supplementary estimates for Saint John harbor improvements.

This amount is required for improvements in Saint John harbor. It is intended to complete the dredging of a channel from the main channel in Saint John harbor to the basin in front of the drydock, a distance of about 7,200 feet in length by 500 feet wide, to a uniform depth of 32 feet and to complete the dredging of the basin in front of the drydock to a depth of 22 feet, as well as dredging a channel 250 feet wide from the basin to the drydock.

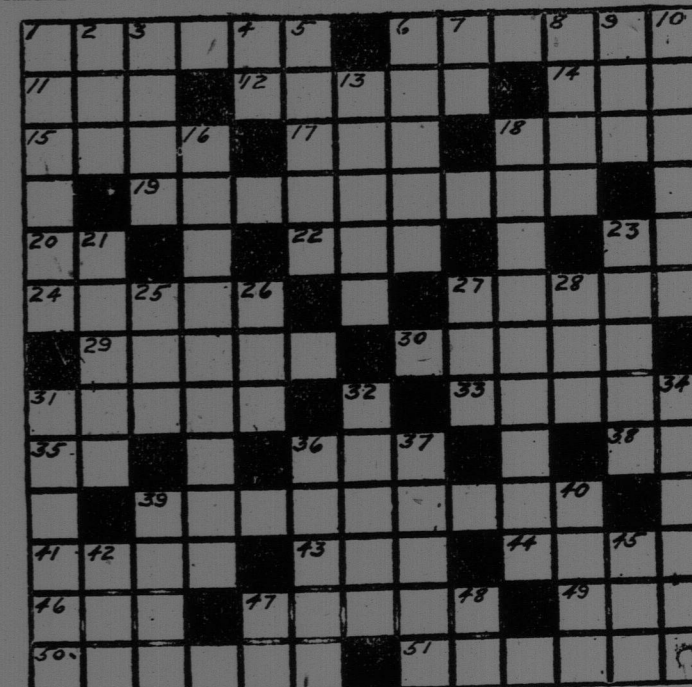

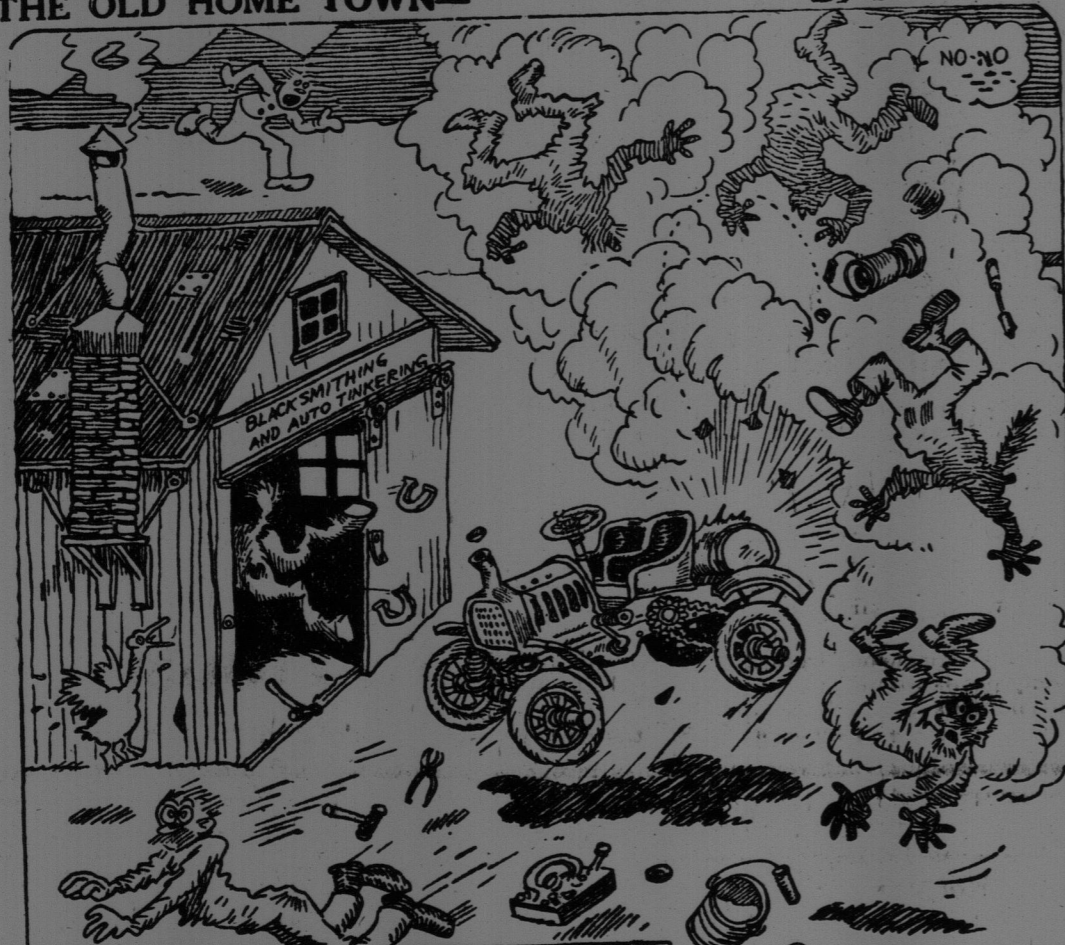

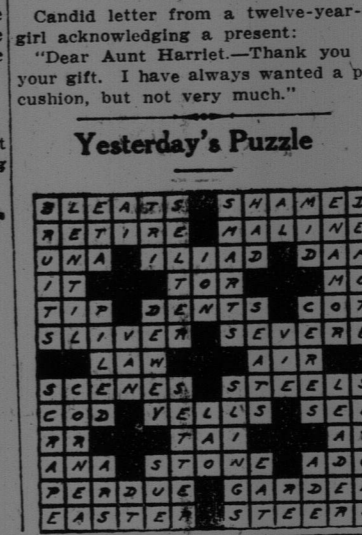

Cooking School Recipes

At the cooking school, at N. B. Power Company headquarters, on Thursday, Miss Mason gave out the following recipes:

BAKED HALIBUT, WITH DRESSING—Sprinkle fish with salt and pepper, place on baking sheet. Make dressing of the following: cover fish with dressing, and put remainder in side of roaster.

Savory Dressing:—4 cups bread crumbs, 1 medium size onion (diced), 1 egg, 1 cup tomatoes and juice, 1 teaspoonful salt, 1 teaspoonful pepper, 1 teaspoonful sage (if desired).

Cover fish with the dressing, then place strips of bacon and thin slices of cheese over the whole. Put in oven slightly hotter than moderate. Allow 20 minutes to the pound for the fish and 25 minutes to the oven. If tomato sauce is desired, use one can of tomato soup and one-fourth can of boiling water in the roaster. Be sure to place fish on rack of roaster rather than on the bottom of the vessel.

FRITTERS (PLAIN)—One cup flour, ½ teaspoonful salt, 2 eggs, 1 tablespoonful melted fat, ½ cup milk, 1 teaspoonful baking powder. Sift dry ingredients. Add eggs with melted fat and milk and stir until well mixed. Drop by spoonfuls into hot fat and cook until golden brown.

APPLE FRITTERS—Add ¼ cup sugar, ½ cup chopped apples and ½ teaspoon cinnamon to recipe for plain fritters, and serve.

BANANA FRITTERS—Three bananas, 1 tablespoonful sugar, 2 teaspoonfuls grated orange rind, 2 teaspoonfuls lemon juice. Remove skins from bananas. Cut into halves lengthwise, and cut halves across. Sprinkle with sugar lemon juice and orange rind. Cover and let stand 30 minutes. Dip in plain fritter batter and fry in deep, hot fat. Serve with lemon sauce.

LEMON SAUCE—Half cup sugar, 2 tablespoonfuls corn starch, 1 cup boiling water, juice and grated rind of one lemon. Mix sugar and corn starch. Pour boiling water over mixture; blend well; let cook until thick and clear. Add juice and grated rind of lemon just before removing from fire.

FISH CHOWDER—One lb. fish, 4 medium-sized potatoes, 4 cups milk, 4 strips bacon (ground fine), 1 onion, 2 cups water, 2 teaspoonfuls salt, 2 tablespoonfuls butter. Cut fish into small pieces. Pare and dice potatoes. Mince onion. Add ground bacon and put mixture on to cook in water. Cook until tender, about 20 minutes. Add milk and bring to boil. Add salt and butter, and serve.

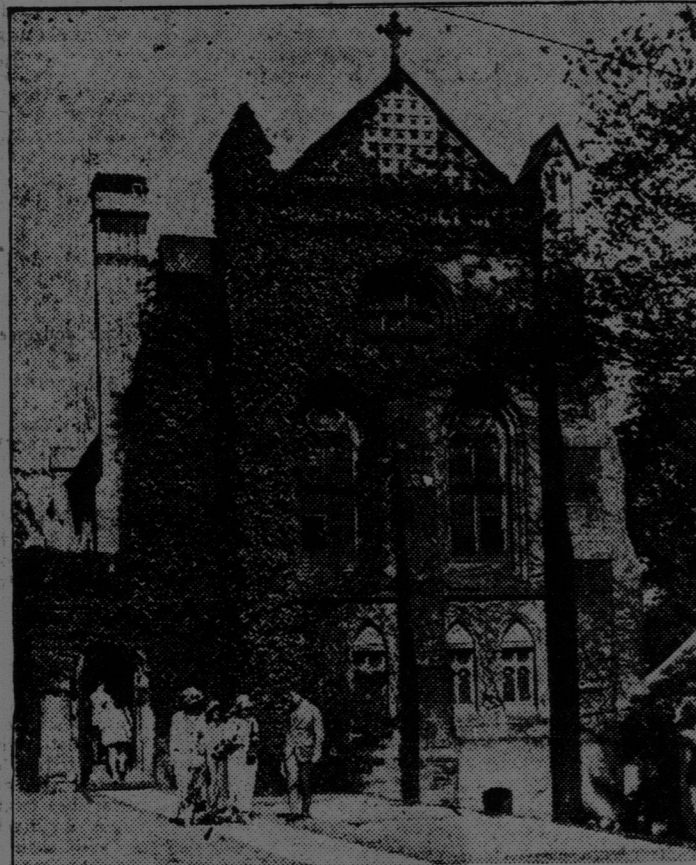

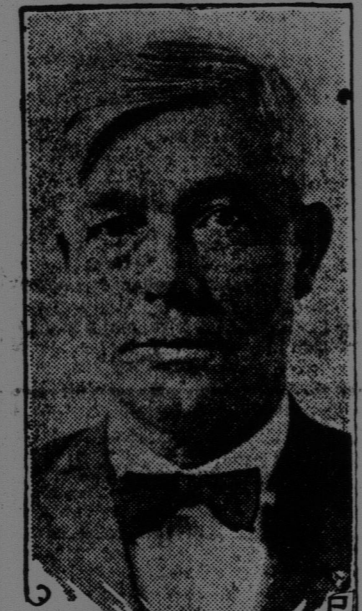

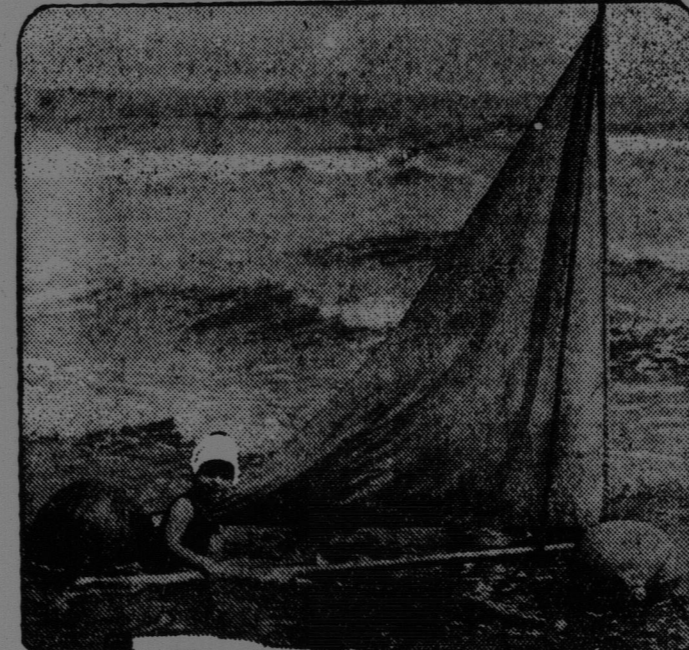

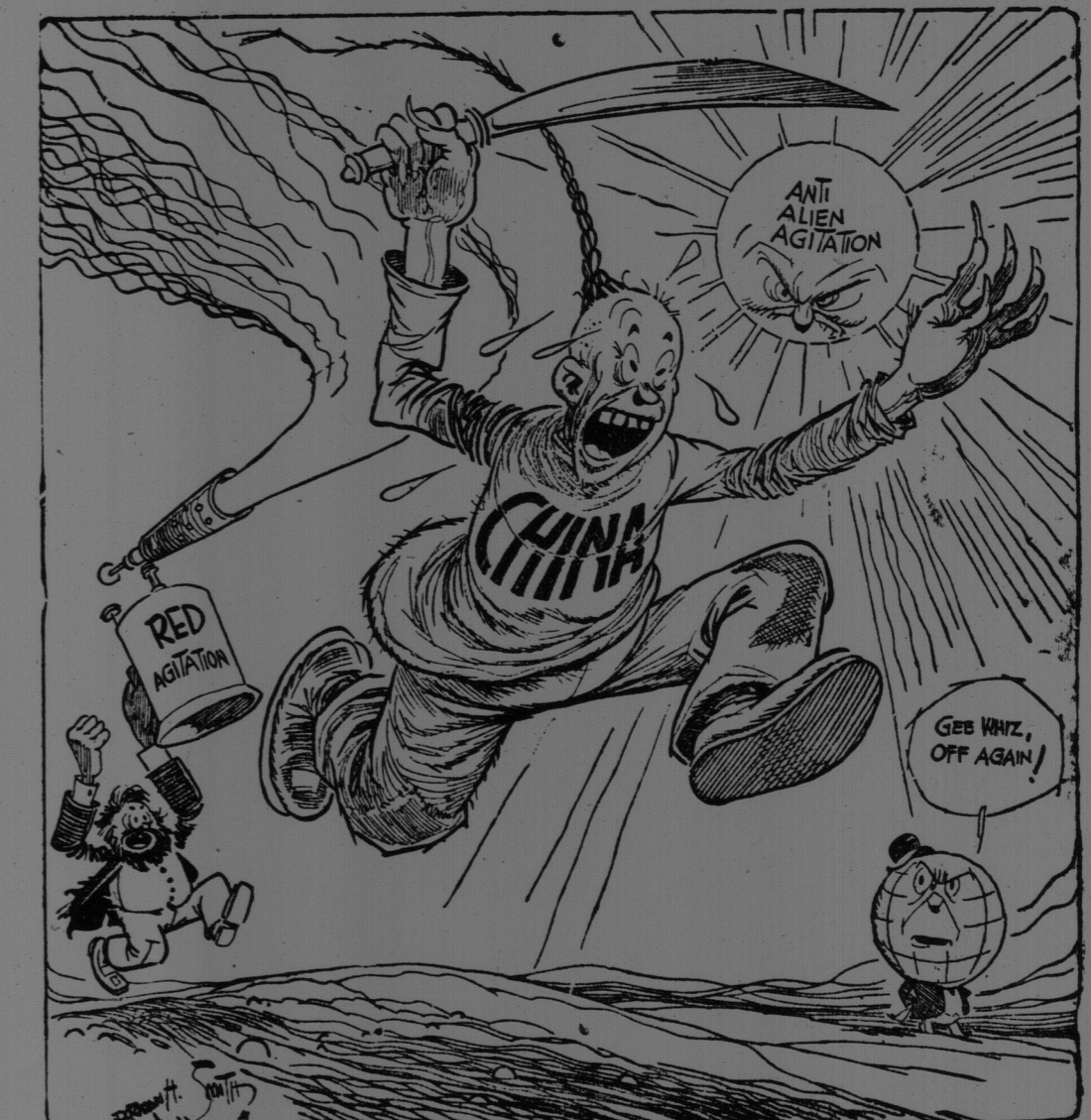

A., was unanimously chosen as the Opposition candidate for the new constituency of St. Stephen-Milltown in the coming provincial election held here today. Immediately following this convention another for Charlotte county was held which selected as Opposition candidates Dr. H. I. Taylor, M. L. A., St. George, Scott D. Guphill, M. L. A., Grand Manan, and James S. Lord, of St. Stephen, a new man.

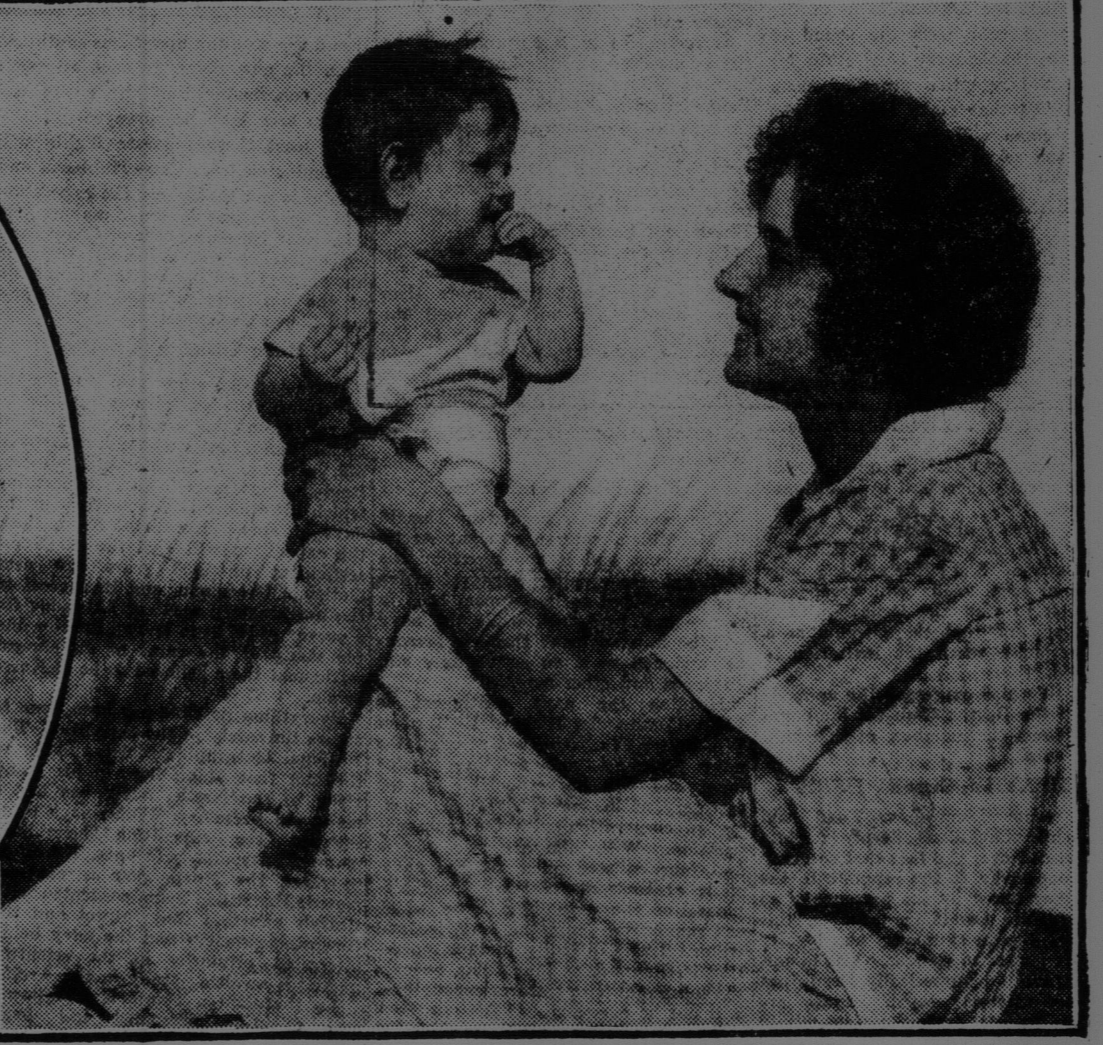

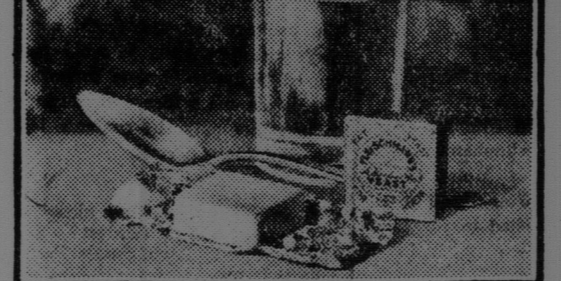

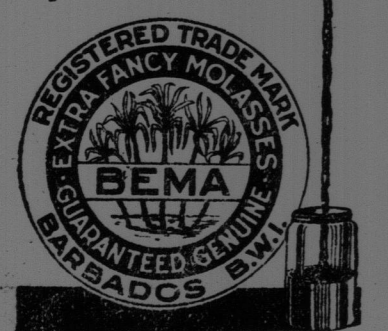

M. P. CONDEMNS TRAINING OF BOYS

Agnes MacPhail Opposes Grant for Instructing School Cadets

Progressives Join With Her in Vote Against \$400,000 Appropriation

OTTAWA, June 24—Defence estimates led to sharp debating in the House tonight. Miss Agnes MacPhail, in a speech which brought some lively replies, declared that in our method of handling international disputes we were entirely pagan. She warmly criticized cadet training in schools. The boys were doing what was nothing but a strutting, silly pompous, bombastic performance by military men and those who backed them.

Miss MacPhail spoke of "silly" war memorials erected all over the country, which were memorials of war rather than of those who had paid the supreme sacrifice.

There was a vote of \$400,000 for cadet training before the House and Miss MacPhail moved that it be reduced to one dollar.

Hon. E. M. MacDonald, Minister of Defence, in reply, regretted that war could not be stopped by eloquent addresses. He declared that cadet training was almost entirely physical training.

On division, Miss MacPhail's amendment was defeated by 64 votes to 27. Three Liberals—A. R. MacMaster, J. J. Denis and P. Lancelot, voted with the Progressive opponents to amendments. The committee proceeded rapidly to pass estimates for engineering works (\$800,000) and the non-permanent active militia (\$1,610,000).

Special sessions were also held on Saturday and Sunday morning the Association sermon was delivered by Rev. W. S. Smith, of Paradise, N.S., taking as his subject "National Life."

The meeting closed its session on Monday and the delegates left for their homes by train and automobile.

Volt, according to the evidence submitted at the preliminary examination, became enraged at Orband's interference and attacked him with an axe. Orband suffered extensive injuries at the hands of the accused, including a slashed scalp, broken ribs, injured arms and legs in addition to a distinct shock.

ST. JEAN BAPTISTE DAY IS OBSERVED

200,000 People See Parade at Montreal Fete—High Mass Here

MONTREAL, June 24—Two hundred thousand persons, it was estimated, gathered in Montreal's downtown streets this afternoon to witness the St. Jean Baptiste day procession.

In the parade were 35 floats which retold the folklore, history, and progress of arts and crafts in French Canada, and represented patriotic and religious aspects of Quebec life. Numerous bands and choirs provided music.

This morning at the foot of Mount Royal large crowds of worshippers gathered for open air mass.

High mass was celebrated in the church at St. John the Baptist in Broad street yesterday at 7.30 a. m. in honor of the festival of the patron saint of the church. Rev. Arthur Kinsella, acting parish priest, was the celebrant.

Rev. J. J. McDermott, priest of the parish, is on his way back to Canada after attending the pilgrimage to Home and is in the same party with His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc. No definite word of the date of the return of the party to Saint John has been received and a wireless message will be despatched to the ship today. The party will land in Quebec and come on to New Brunswick by rail and it is expected that they will be here by Saturday.

MEETING NOT HELD

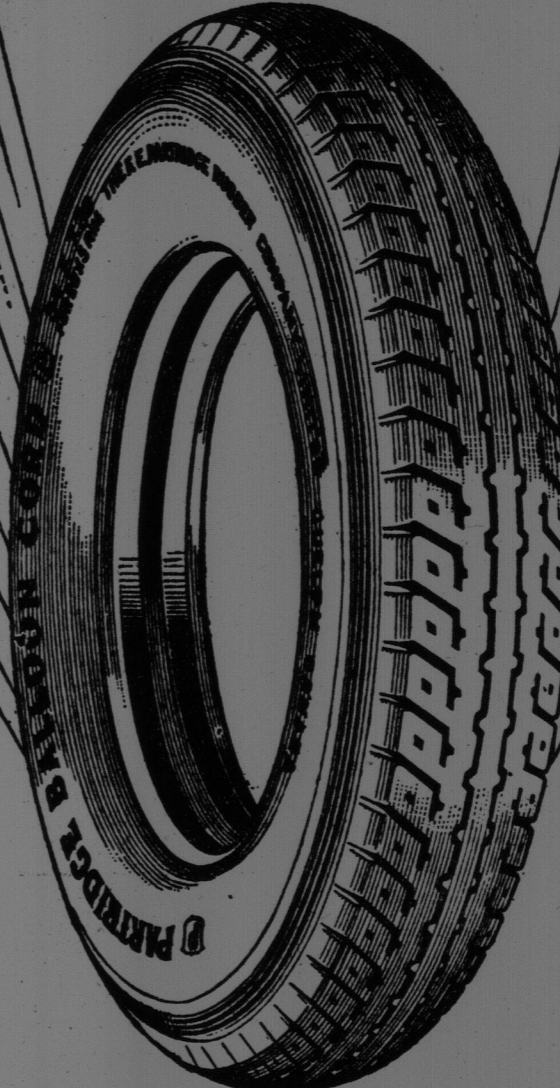

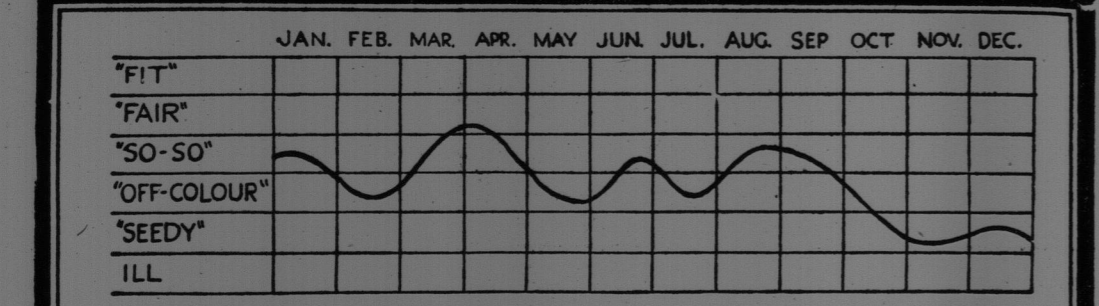

The timely use of "Andrews" at such times is invaluable. Andrews is not habit-forming, and is pleasant to take. A teaspoonful (or two) taken in a glass of water morning or evening for a few days running will soon bring back the normal tone again, and ensure that physical well-being which makes life the joy it is.

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
