PACT ASSURED

New Zealand Gives Government Free Hand-Resentment Shown Beaverbrook

ONDON, June 25—"Austen Chamberlain's explanatory speech in the House of Commons yesterday was addressed not only to Britain, but particularly to the overseas Dominions, in the hope of allaying fears that have arisen there and for which there is no justification," declared a prominent member of the government this morn-

"Mr. Chamberlain's opponents declare that he is creating Imperial disunity by his policy, but this is untrue, LOOKING FOR for we are most anxious that the Dominions should share our obligations, which we have assumed in Europe for Seeks Work in Florida-Adverthe maintenance of peace, and when tises For Position the time comes we hope that the Do-minions will signify what their atti-tude is. New Zealand has given the government a free hand, and we be-lieve that when the other Dominions have fully investigated the pact they will not be so hostile towards it as they are now reported to be."

Yet it is going to make a big effort to secure the support of the Dominions by showing that while Britain gives the pact her unqualified support she is in no danger of being involved in war unless there is similar aggression to that which Germany displayed in 1914.

NEWSPAPER ATTITUDE. Resentment against Lord Beaver-brook's attempt to kill the pact is reflected in the press comment upon Chamberlain's speech this morning. The London Times, in approving of his effort, makes an obvious hit at the owner of the Express. The Morning Post follows suit, while the Liberal papers like the Daily News find themselves in something of a dilemma through approval of Beaverbrook's policy and approval of the pact. They therefore take a middle course, approving of Lloyd George's warning against the dangers of the pact and demanding that a certain vagueness that still exists shall be made quite clear.

BLAMES FOREIGNERS FOR CANTON AFFAIR

British Consul-General Gives Evidence to Contrary—Acted in Self-Defence.

HONG KONG, June 25-The Chi nese civil governor of Canton in a note nese civil governor of Canton in a note to the British consul-general regarding Costly Faint Tuesday's shooting in Canton, places the blame entirely on the foreigners. "The killed and wounded," says the hote, "totalled more than 100, and this brutal killing was premeditated and

secretly planned."
Replying to the note, the British consul-general declared that the defence forces of the British and French concessions had merely replied to an attack made upon them by Chinese troops or military students from the other side of the canal, which separates Shameen, the foreign settlement, from Canton proper.

The consul-general added: "I can, from the evidence of my own eyes, make the statement on oath that the firing was first started by the Chinese. The British senior officer and myself were standing unarmed by the bridge for the special purpose of guarding against precipitate or nervous action on the part of the defenders. We only excapted with our lives, out of the hall of bullets directed against us.

"It was only then, in self-defence, that fire was opened from Shameen and by the French forces, who were similarly attacked. The firing from Shameen ceased even before the sniping from the tops of the houses opposite was discontinued by the Chinese."

MINISTER OF WAR

General Pangalos was appointed forcek Minister of War in June, 1924. He was formerly generalissimo of the Greek army, and military governor of Athens. He headed the rebels who defeated the Greek royalists in Athens, in September 1922, and thereafter became minister of war in the Conatas cabinet. He resigned that office within a month to join the Greek army in Thrace, then fighting the Turks. He became commander in chief during that campaign and after returning to Athens, there were rumors in 1923, that he would attempt to overthrow the government. This plan, if it existed, did not materialize and in November, 1923, he was appointed military governor of Athens. In December 200, 1923 he proclaimed a Greek republic, demanded the resignation of the Gonalas government, and favored M. Papanastasiou for premier.

Reduction In Wages Is One Plan to Be Discussed

RESULT IN DOUBT

Problems Confront All Classes of Labor in England-Unions May Amalgamate

LONDON, June 25—Representatives of the British railways and their employes in all branches of the service are meeting here today to discuss pro-

posals by the companies for a rigid The proposals include reduction of all emoluments from the salaries of the railways directors to the wages of the humblest workers. It is said that one plan to be submitted to the conference would, if adopted, entail a saving of

From talk in labor circles, the impression is gained that the railway men will not necessarily oppose the reduction, but there are some matters pending between the companies and workers, settlement of which may be demanded before the question of a general reduction in pay is entertained.

The whole position is somewhat involved, and the outcome cannot be foreseen.

foreseen.

One possible eventual development is a quadruple alliance of the railway men, miners, engineers and transport workers, all of which are up against the problems of wages and working conditions.

OPPOSITION

OPPOSITION

The miners are strongly opposed to the operators' movement for longer hours and reduced wages, and according to the Westminster Gazette, have appealed to the general council of the trade union congress to help them in fighting the owners. The Gazette regards this as a serious step, likely to widen the threatened industrial trouble. Meanwhile, the labor party continues to hold the government to account for the employment situation, and a formal motion of censure has been submitted to the House of Commons, in the names of former premier MacDonald, John Wheatley and Philip Snowden, declaring no confidence in the government, which after a lengthy period of industrial depression, and confronted by an alarming growth in the number of unemployed, has failed to take measures to deal with a situation of unprecedented gravity.

The motion is to be debated in the Commons next Monday.

The association will tender to Earl Haig assurance of unqualified co-operation to this end, and the assets, records, amenities and membership of the body, with full authority to complete negotiations on behalf of the G. W. V. A.













OTTAWA, June 24—Defence estimates led to sharp debating in the House tonight.

Miss Agnes MacPhail, in a speech which brought some lively replies, declared that in our method of handling international disputes we were entirely pagan. She warmly criticized cadel training in schools. The boys were right to the core, but the thing they were doing was false to the core. Empire Day instead of showing the things we were doing for civilization—Miss MacPhail went on—was nothing but a struty, silly pompous, bombastic performance by military men and those who backed them.

Miss MacPhail spoke of "silly" war memorials erected all over the country, which were memorials of war ather than of those who had paid the supreme sacrifice.

There was a vote of \$400,000 for cadet training before the House and Miss MacPhail moved that it be reduced to one dollar.

LONDON, June 25—The first Victoria Cross ever awarded is a priceless relic left under the will of Mrs. Frances Russell Lucas, of Great Culverden, Tunbridge Wells, whose estate was proved at over \$50,000.

Mrs. Lucas was the widow of Adciral Charles David Lucas, who was the first man in either Navy or Army to win the V. C.

This was gained on June 20, 1854, when H. M. S. Hecla was bombarding Bomarsunda fortress, in the Baltic. When the Hecla was within 500 yards of the principal fort a live shell, with the fuse burning, fell on the deck.

Lucas, who was then a 'mite, picked up the shell in an instant and hurled it into the sea. Almost before it reached the water it exploded with a terrific roar.

Captain Hall, of the Heela, immediately promoted Lucas a lieutenant, and three years later Queen Victoria decorated him with the Victoria Cross.

Mrs. Lucas was the daughter of Captain Hall, of the Hecla, afterwards Admiral Sir William Hutchinson Hall.




