The Belgian officials in the valley declare that 170,000 railway workers in the occupied region are ready to go back to work as soon as assurances are given that the Berlin Government will guarantee the payment of their wages and authorize them to take the oath of "professional allegiance" to the Franco-Belgian railroad management.



Kansas City, Oct. 9.—(By A. P.)—
Effects of price reductions, the future prospects of the industry, marketing and other subjects of vital interest to the American farmer will be discussed by prominent men of the nation at the International Farm Congress, to be held in Kansas City October 10, 11 and 12. The agriculture of Canada, Mexico and several other countries will be represented by delegates appointed by their respective governments, according to W. I. 





Huge Sum at Stake.

If the two parks are well filled during each game and the series goes the limit of seven contests, more than a million dollars will be at stake. 




