"According to one account, no fewer than 20,000 German corpses were carried down the Niem after this awful car-nage

nage. In the fight at Sredniki on the Nie-In the fight at Sredniki on the Nie-man, on September 15, the German casu-alties also are said to have been large. An eyewitness of the battle says that in the river and on one of its banks no fewer than 8,000 Germans perished. On the opposite shore from the city the bodies of 1,500 Germans were lying un-buried for some days afterward."

May Close the Bars.

May Close the Bars. Saskatoon, Sask., Oct. 7—Attorney General Turgeon has introduced a bill at the present emergency silting of the provincial government which will enable the closing of any bar or wholesale liq-uor establishment in Saskatchewan, at the discretion of the government. The bill also provides for the protec-tion of the interests of those who have gone to the front, and in addition, con-cerns the suspension of executions and gone to the front, and in addition, con-cerns the suspension of executions and debts in relation to real property and chattels. 

With a first contingent of 33,000 men, accompanied by 7,000 horses and a complement of guns, now on its way to England, Canada proposes further to organize and train forthwith a second expeditionary force of 20,000 men, with a first reinforcement of 10 per cent, making 22,000 men in all.

In addition to the above organization, preparations are being made to organize and train necessary further reinforcements for both the first and second expeditionary forces. It is probable that the
