

THINKS-MUCH OF LLOYD GEORGE AND THE LIBERAL **WORK FOR SOCIAL REFORM** Oscar Straus Studies Methods in Lloyd George Against Feverish

England and Will Introduce Expenditure on Armamer Phase in New York

(Canadian Press) London, Aug. 14- Oscar Straus ha een in London for two weeks and has devoted the entire time to studying the social welfare schemes which have been introduced by the Liberal party. He tells the correspondent that as a result of what he has seen regarding co-operative homes, he shall endeavor to introduce similar schemes in New York.

Mr. Straus will attend the opening of the peace palace at The Hague and will be the guest of Andrew Carnegie in Scotland before returning to America in October. On the subject of Social laws, Mr. Straus said:

London, Aug. 14—A striking speech was made by Chancellor of the Exchequer Lloyd George in the House of Commons yesterday on the question of the

"eGrmany enacts many laws for the welfare of the masses, but there is a different spirit behind the German and the English movement. The German spirit is rather patriarchial. In England, social justice laws spring from the growing power of the democratic masses."

Mr. Straus had a long conference with Chancellor of the Exchequer, Lloyd George, Attorney-general Issaacs, and Lord Advocate of Scotland Ure, and some minor ministers in the present administration.

"The whole programme of the Liberal movement is on all fours with the Progressive movement in America," observations of the question of the expenditure on armaments.

Mr. Lloyd George said the powers were just scaring each other into this expenditure. 



WRONG DEPARTMENT

Embryo Sleuths, Seeking Divorce Evidence, Find Trouble Instead

New York, Aug. 14—Searching, they said, for divorce evidence, two men, who described themselves later as Jas. B. Varring of 288 Greene avenue, Brooklyn, and Davis Willard of 75 West 119th street, stealthily entered the apartment of Elmer de Sapresi, an art editor, on the second floor of 149 West 12th street, early in the mora and were all but cut to pieces by the editor and his wife, who attacked them with a Japanese sword and a broad French bayonet.

The two, after climbing a picket fence in front of the house, swung to a drop ladder and started up the fire escape. By mistake, they said in Charles street station, where they were taken and locked up, they had entered a window which they believed led to the apartment where they expected to find a woman for whom they were in search.

One of the men, cambing in through the window, struck Mme de Sapresi, who awakened her husband. Startled by the presence of the men and believing them to be burglars, the deSapresis jumped from bed and grabbed the two weapons from the wall.

Husband and wife attacked the two in the dark, striking them repeatedly with the sword. The men begged for mercy, but the angered pair paid no attent ion to them. Then the men attacked de Sapresi and his wife, and both were badly beaten.

Three other men tried to break their way into the apartment, but were compelled to retreat by the woman and her Japanese sword. They, too, were later arrested and charged with disorderly conduct.



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

PUBLIC OPINION BACK OF HOME RULE

Effort to Heat up Old Animosities Declared Failure

WANT MATTER SEITLED

Views of the Westminster Gazette -Never Mind Law, But The Covenant, Says Carson — Case Set Out By John Dillon

(Times' Special Correspondence) Dublin, July 81-The "Westminste azette" (Liberal), says:-

"For our part, we are convinced that he government need not have the slightest fear of public opinion in going forward with the Irish bill. Nothing in recent months has failed more signall than the effort to heap up the old anti Irish animosities. Electioneers who want votes dwell on almost any top in preference. The general sentim in favor of a settlement of the Iris question, and a vast number of peop are of Lord Dunraven's opinion that i would be a disgrace to statesmanship i after all these years of debate and agit ation parlitment made shipwreck with another Irish bill. We could imagine no thing more disastrous for the gover ment than to blanch before Sir Edwar Carson's threats, and appeal helpless Carson's threats, and appeal helplessly to the electors for guidance, not on the principal of home rule, but on the particular way of solving the Ulster difficulty. That is precisely the kind of problem which the electors expect states men to solve for themselves, and they will have an account to settle either with a government which professes itself helpless or with fanatical opponents where the professes is also try to make a settlement impossible."

What Ulster will do if home rule is established is now set beyond all doubt by the drama witnessed at Craigavon when Sir Edward Carson addressed 250,000 Orangemen. Sir Edward chose the emotional scene to make a final proclamation of Ulster's intention, "We intend to take over the government of Ulster for ourselves. I know nothing of legality or illegality. My covenant is to me all that is meant by legality or illegality."

That is the organized determination of Sir Edward Carson's party, to take effect from the day that home rule is declared. A general order will simultaneously be issued that no Orangeman or Unionist shall pay taxes or rates which would go to Dublin and that the decisions of the courts shall not be recognized. The organization will be quite completed this autumn.

Should a Parliament be sitting in Dublin towards the end of next year, a Unionist provisional government would be sitting in Belfast thwarting every effort at every turn which the Dublin parliament might make for the purpose of carrying on what they would be pleased to call the government of Ireland.

The essence of this controversy in Ulster, proceeded Mr. Dillon, was because they had enjoyed ascendancy and the monopoly of political power, and no instance in history could be found in which such a minority had abandoned their ascendancy without a struggle. Ulster wanted to be top dog, and "we say," exclaimed Mr. Dillon, "that there shall be no top dogs in Ireland." We say that there shall be equality and liberty, and that the people must rule. Do they expect us, the descendants of a fighting race, to lie down and submit to be trampled upon by a minority who have not ashamed to declare that they hate as much as they despise us? We will teach them, as we have met and beaten them, that though they may hate us they cannot despise us.

"We will not submit to insult and tyranny on the part of a fraction of Ulster. We have taught our people that they can win by constitutional means. We do not import arms, abuse the king, and threaten to shoot his soldiers. We are the true Unionists, and the day which saw Mr. Asquith pass in triumph through the Irish capital opened a new and brilliant chapter in the history of the two peoples." Mr. Dillon's address was received with much enthusiasm.
