



Traffic Arrangement Which Will Give Canada a Third Transcontinental Line-Vancouver and St. John Joined By 1915

Ottawa. May 9—No later than the summer of 1915 the Canadian Northern transcontinental railway will be completed and in operation between Vancouver and St. John, according to Sir Donald Mann.

This will be the third great Canadian transcontinental. Construction work is now being carried on the Pacific coast to Port Mann on the Fraser opposite New Westminster and the only link that remains is the building of the new line from Hawkesbury through Ottawa to Port Arthur, and with traffic arrangements with the government for rights over the I. C. R. to maritime province ports there will be a continuous and direct service, and, according to Sir Donald Mann, it is the object of the company to make this service the most luxurious in Canada. The best cars that money can buy will be put on, he says. on, he says.






