EIGHT DIE IN FIRE IN A THEATRE

Playhouse in Edinburg Burns, Performers and Musicians Lose Lives

AUDIENCE ALL SAFE

Rush Out in Panic as Iron Curtain is Lowered Because of Fire on Stage—Manager Dies Trying to Save Horse and Dog

Edinburg, May 10.—Eight bodies have been recovered this morning from the ruins of the Empire Music Hall, which was burned last night. The bodies so far identified are those of Lafayette, the Great, and two members of his company, Alice Dale, who impersonated the Teddy Bear "Midget" and Joe Coster. Two bodies are those of members of the orchestra and three others have not been identified.

Died Trying to Save Pets

Miss Dale and Coster were natives of England. Lafayette was a German. He played for twenty years in America. During the last two years he had been in Great Britain presenting in music halls a spectacular turn which introduced a horse and dog. An attempt was made to save the horse and dog.

Lafayette had escaped in the first panic when the stage was a mass of flames. All the performers and stage hands were rushing out of the place, when he was seen to re-enter the stage door with a horse and dog. When the fire was at its height he said: "I am going to try to get my horse and dog."

When the ruins were examined today the actor's charred body was found beside the body of his horse and a heavy burnt timber lay across both man and beast.

The fire started in a mass of scenery used in the conclusion of Lafayette's performance which was a spectacular military pageant in which he represented Lord Roberts and other celebrated men on horseback. In a moment the stage was in flames. The iron fire curtain was hastily lowered and the audience, which at first thought that the burst of fire was a part of the spectacle, escaped with little harm.

Those behind the scenes having secured the safety of the audience, made a mad dash for the exits. When the fire was at its height the iron curtain fell upon the stage.

ALL FAVOR RECIPROcity

Pithy Speeches Before the New York Canadian Club

New York, May 10.—(Canadian Press) In perhaps the shortest speech ever made in the Canadian reciprocity question, William D. H. Washington, who served four years as a United States consul in Canada during the Cleveland administration, said at a dinner of the Canadian Club last night:

"Neither can be damaged by reciprocity, so I say God speed the day when reciprocity will rule."

Augustus Vanvey, president of the South Carolina Society added: "Reciprocity will point the way for goodwills and fair play and work for the prevention of hostilities."

S. H. Voochess, New York manager of the Royal Bank of Canada also said: "Hasten the day of reciprocity. It will be better for all."

KILLED HUSBAND TO SAVE HIS SOUL

New York Woman, Supplanted By Another in Husband's Affection, Shot Him

New York, May 10.—Mrs. Patrick O'Shaughnessy has told the coroner that she killed her husband last Friday night to save his soul. It was an astounding declaration, quite in keeping with her manner when she went into a police station and informed the sergeant: "I've just shot and killed my husband."

She wants to be punished at once, before the birth of her child. It would have been easier to commit suicide, she explained, but in that case the loved one would have foregone his religion for the sake of the woman who she believed had supplanted her in his affection.

OFFICERS OF CONTINGENT FROM CANADA

Col. McLean Receives Official List—The Dates of Assembling, Sailing and Return After King's Coronation

Col. Hugh H. McLean, K.C.M.P., commanding the Canadian contingent, has received the official list of the officers, and they are here given. To a Times' reporter Col. McLean said that the appointed men are to assemble at Quebec on May 22, and the mounted men are to be assembled at St. John's, Quebec, on the same date for a week's training in the Cavalry Schools.

The whole force is to be assembled at Quebec on Monday, the 28th. It is intended to have a review and inspection of the contingent in Quebec on August 31. The sailing date is June 2, and the return will be on the morning of July 2.

Col. McLean has made preparations for a grand reception on the arrival of the contingent, and already extensive plans are in progress for the entertainment of Canada's contingent in London. The list of officers follows:

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REBELS CAPTURE JUAREZ

Federal Commander Reported to Have Deserted the City—There Was Heavy Firing Again Today

(Canadian Press) Mexico City, May 10.—I will die before I will surrender, so long as I have soldiers to defend my position in Juarez I will not deliver to the rebels. With these words General Navarro yesterday closed his report to the department of war on the battle at Juarez. He declared this to be the message returned to Madero in reply to a demand for the surrender of the city.

Prof. Francisco Figueroa, brother of Ambrosio Figueroa, a rebel leader in the south, was captured by the rebels last week, left the capital today with tentative terms which he believes his brother will accept. Under the proposed terms the rebels in the state of Morelos, who are now threatening Cuernavaca, and who are mostly natives of Guerrero, under Figueroa, will disband and go back to their own state, keeping peace, except in case Madero comes south and requires them to come forward, in which case they are free to rally once more to his standard. This arrangement, while it does not seem much to outsiders, is regarded by the government as the best that can be made, as there are nearly 3,000 well armed men under the influence of Figueroa.

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EMPEROR DIRECTS SHAM FIGHT; IN SADDLE ALL NIGHT

Spectacular Operations by the German Army Near the Battlefield of Gravelotte

(Canadian Press) Berlin, May 10.—Emperor William took part in a spectacular sham battle yesterday near the historic battlefield of Gravelotte, about seven miles from Metz, where the Germans defeated the French on Aug. 18, 1870.

The manoeuvres lasted from 11 o'clock last night until 9 o'clock this morning. The Kaiser presided over the operations of the troops. He remained in the saddle all night and did not leave the field until 6.30 o'clock this morning, after he had ordered a terrific artillery engagement which lasted for several hours.

More than 100 search-lights brilliantly illuminated the field and the countryside for miles around during the engagement. Three military aeroplanes were expected to participate in the manoeuvres, but did not appear.

OWEN SOUND TO AID INDUSTRIES

By-Laws Carried in Effort to Realize Slogan of 20,000 Population

Owen Sound, Ont., May 9.—Three laws by-laws carried with practically no opposition here last week. They are for, industry, and their effect is confidently expected to help in the realization of the town's slogan of 20,000 population.

The by-laws to aid in the establishment of a knitting factory by a loan of \$15,000 at 4 1/2 per cent. interest. The industry is to commence work in 1915. The houses to aid in the establishment of a similar industry at Alton. A similar by-law submitted about six weeks ago was defeated through lack of sufficient number of votes.

The second proposition is to loan \$25,000 to the Adams Furniture Company of Toronto, \$25,000 for five years at 4 1/2 per cent. to erect a factory for the manufacture of high-class furniture and upholstered goods. The factory will be operated in conjunction with the three big factories now in operation here, the National Table Company, the National Furniture Company, and the National Chair Company.

The third proposition authorized the loan of \$20,000 to C. S. Lloyd & Co., of Toronto, to establish a baby carriage and child's wagon factory here. The conditions are the same as those of the other by-laws, the terms of repayment being arranged so as to in no way affect the tax rate. During the past few months Owen Sound has seen a sharp advance in real estate values, and several blocks of residential property were picked up as major as they were placed on the market.

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OVALION FOR KING ON RACE TRACK

His Majesty at Newmarket Sees His Coat Hopelessly Bled

(Canadian Press) London, May 10.—King George went to the Newmarket race track yesterday and received a great ovation. This was the first time His Majesty has attended a race meeting since his accession to the throne, a year ago. He wore a light grey suit and yellow gloves, with a white carnation in the lapel of his coat.

The royal subjects of His Majesty plunged over the king's two-year-old Pindan, which was one of the starters for the Norfolk two-year-old plate, and he was made a favorite. The colt was the first one to run in His Majesty's own name and colors since his accession. Much to the disappointment of the majority of those present, the colt was hopelessly beaten.

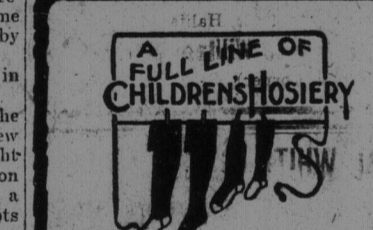

London, May 10—The German Emperor and Empress will probably arrive in London on May 15, and the day fixed for the unveiling of the Queen Victoria memorial at Corbet's, 106 Union street.

Their Majesties will arrive at Port Victoria on board the imperial yacht Hohenzollern, and will be accompanied by Princess Victoria Louise and Prince Joachim.

The emperor and empress are to visit the city on Monday, and on that day they will be met by the king and queen, their stay being entirely a family one, and not in any way connected with matters of state.

A command performance of Lord Lytton's comedy "Money," will be given at Buckingham palace for several days as the guests of the king and queen, their visit being entirely a family one, and not in any way connected with matters of state.

The coronation procession route is fast becoming lined with reviewing stands. The churches and other buildings are hidden by carpenters to provide seating accommodation.

Parliament square will be the scene of the coronation procession, and the general public will have access to one side of the route. The route will be lined with reviewing stands, and the coronation will be held in the Albert Hall.

THEY HAD MADE HEROIC FIGHT IN ARCTIC WILDS

(Canadian Press)

Toronto, May 10—The Dawson City correspondent of the Mail and Empire, in a letter telling of the trip of Corporal Dempster and his three companions, who found the bodies of the ill-fated mounted police party led by Capt. Fitzgerald and comprising Constables Kinney, Carter and Taylor, declares that the common opinion in Dawson is that the Fitzgerald party was lost because of not having an acquaintance with the country and not taking a native guide, and that they perished on the return trip for want of proper equipment for hunting small game.

"It now develops," says the writer, "that the Fitzgerald party not only was shy of supplies on starting but had hoped to make sport by travelling light and even took no shoguns."

The party consumed fifteen dogs. Some of the dogs, of course, went to the other dogs. At the camp thirty-five miles from McPherson on the return were found two dog skeletons. Were the men well enough at that point they should have been able to make the finish with the meat of two dogs but they may have been reduced and foot sore and probably poisoned from eating dog's liver.

Although the temperature was low and the trail unbroken, the cold and snow probably hindered the men little compared to want of food. The desperate fight of the finish shows the men held out against all odds.

The Arbitration Treaty

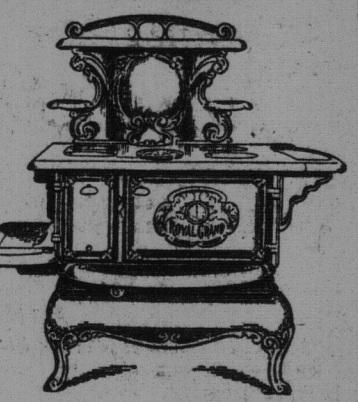

BISHOP CASEY TO ATTEND FUNERAL OF ARCHBISHOP McEVAY

His Grace Died in Toronto Early This Morning—As Bishop of London Was Preacher at Consecration of Bishops Casey and Barry

His Lordship Bishop Casey will leave by the I. C. R. at 6:30 o'clock this evening for Toronto to attend the funeral of the late Archbishop McEvay, who died there early this morning. At the consecration of Bishops Casey and Barry in the St. John Cathedral eleven years ago, His Grace, then Bishop McEvay of London, Ont., was the preacher. He was elevated to the dignity of Archbishop of London, archdiocese, in 1908.

A Canadian Press despatch to the times says: Toronto, May 10—His Grace Archbishop McEvay died at 12:23 this morning after a long and painful illness from pericarditis aneurism. The end came very suddenly, the distinguished patient having been unconscious for several days.

At the bedside were Rev. Father Burke, editor of the Catholic Register, Rev. Father Kitt, secretary of the archdiocese, and chancellor of the diocese, Rev. Father Wiseman, rector of St. Michael's Cathedral, Rev. Father McGuire, nephew of the archbishop; Dr. R. J. Dwyer, the attending physician, and several sisters of the church. No arrangements have yet been made for the funeral.

His Grace's illness was considered hopeless from the first, although he rallied frequently and made several public appearances since his condition first became critical last year.

THE INDIANTOWN PROPERTY TROUBLE

All Quiet This Morning But Excitement Expected This Afternoon—Mishap to Steamer

Everything was quiet at Indiantown this morning in the Star Line wharf matter. D. J. Purdy, president of the Greyhound Steamship Company, took possession of the property this morning. Last night M. L. A. Curry arrived on the Boston train last night from Fredericton by so far has not done anything in the matter. However, there promises to be some excitement at Indiantown this afternoon between 2 and 3 o'clock, when the Simonses, Magais and Victoria will arrive at Indiantown. The law allows him to admit that the Victoria would dock at her own wharf, that is the one in question, but Mr. Purdy's Company states that there is to be trouble if there is any attempt to dock her at their wharf. The steamer is expected to arrive at Indiantown first, with the Victoria Second.

The Champlain was towed down from Oak Point this morning with a broken shaft, by the tug Captain, and the Simonses had to go in to Glenwood to get her passengers. She may require about half or three quarters of an hour late arriving.

At any rate there is likely to be some excitement at Indiantown when the boats arrive.

COUNTRY MARKET DEALER ASSIGNS

Friends of John McDonald, Jr., wholesale meat dealer, will regret to learn that he is in financial difficulties, and that on Thursday last he made an assignment to John Crowley, of the city market, for the benefit of his creditors. Mr. Crowley was secured for a large proportion of his account in the Bank of New Brunswick. A meeting of the creditors will be held on Friday, May 19.

It is stated that Mr. McDonald's liabilities amount to \$22,000 and his assets, something over \$20,000, consisting of book debts of about \$8,400; property on the Marsh road, estimated to be worth \$20,000, against which there is a mortgage of \$3,000; his stall and cold storage plant in the market-house, etc., estimated at about \$2,000. It is understood that he was a heavy loser in the failure of Court Bros., and that he had made some contracts that he had to carry out at a loss.

It was learned from County Secretary Kelley that Mr. McDonald had resigned his position as secretary-treasurer of the highway board of the parish of Simonds and turned over the books and funds of the office in satisfactory shape. W. B. Tennant is acting in his place on the highway board.

JAMES H. FRY MEETS DEATH IN ACCIDENT

Word reached the city yesterday that James H. Fry, aged 39, who left here a year and a half ago, had been killed in an accident which took place in a mill near Matawamkeag. The message contained no details as to how the accident occurred. He was unmarried, and a son of the late William H. Fry, of this city. Three brothers survive. They are Stephen H., of the Times-Star, mechanical staff; George H., also of this city, and William H., of Pittsburg.

THEFT IS CHARGED

A seventeen year old sailor, Thomas Keenan, was arrested last night by Policeman Marshall on a charge of theft preferred against him by Percy Layzell, another sailor, with whom he was rooming in the Salvation Army Metropole. Young Keenan, it is said, was at the place two or three nights, and his roommate says he stole from him a razor, brush and a shirt while another sailor, John McGuire, asserts that Keenan took from him a fancy vest.
