Often the young baby, even when at a very young age, will attempt to get his hand to the ear when pained by earache.

Heat is one of the simplest and best remedies. The child should lie with the ear against a hot water bag, or a warm flannel cloth. Be careful that the heat is not enough to burn.

If this does not help, syringe the ear with warm water. It should be about 105 or 110 degrees Fahren-

heit.

When a pea or bean becomes lodged in the ear, DON'T pour water into the ear. It will cause the seed to swell.

Water is an excellent remedy when insects crawl into the ear. Usually there is wax in the ear, through which an insect can not
