FIRST EDITION. ARSCORDER BREGOR.

HE IS INTERVIEWED IN HIS CELL THIS MORNING.

He Tells the Story of His Labors as a Rebel of His Countrymen and Associates in the Neglect of His Friends.

A Gazette reporter visited Kufman Bregor, the Jewish emigrant in his cell at the central police station this morning and gleaned from him his version of the story, which is as follows:

"I was, about five years ago, secretary of the Jewish Benevolent society at Boston, and was greatly engaged in my work. I continued in the position for some time, but previous to my leaving Boston I had left the office. I was, however, a trusted man in the society, and when the proposition came up to buy land for a cemetery I promised to lead my utmost endeavors in furthering the project. The money was not on hand in the association, and it was agreed that all members should donate whatever sum they were able to part with. I with the rest gave freely what I had and worked hard in the interest of my fellow countrymen and associates.

When the money had all been collected from the members, \$24 was wanted to raise the desired \$300 could not be had. I was then elected secretary of the society for the next year, and I succeeded in finding a man who agreed to lend the \$500 and take a mortgage on the land. This was settled with the society and the money was paid over and the mortgage drawn up. I had worked so faithfully for the association that my own work was neglected; grocers were crying out for money; my wife and family were in great straits but still I worked for the society.

Seeing that I was interested and was as they thought an honest man, the \$500 collected from the members was entrusted to my care. I was not, as the papers stated, secretary of the society for the next year, but a trustee member. This was in July. My wife kept continually beseeching me to cease the work of the society and support her and my family which, that time I was not doing.

Some members of the society saw my position and told me that I was in a very bad way, and that I was in a very bad way, and that I was in a very bad way.

In St. John I obtained employment at a trade, that of a painter, and continued to work until my arrest.

During the interview, Bregor, at times showed some emotion, especially when his wife and three children were spoken of. He is a German Jew and gives his age as twenty nine. His true name is not known.

Other McDougal, in whose house Bregor lived, speaks of him as a quiet law abiding citizen, who was always honest in his dealings, and eventually paid his rent.

Mr. Louis Green is trying to make settlement with the representatives of the society, by which Bregor was to be paid for the land. The society has some valuable jewelry, which will be given to the society in the meantime Bregor remains under lock and key.

Another body is picked up floating in the river and taken to the morgue. Two men decomposed in the morgue. Another body of a man was found floating in Little River early today. The body was taken to Davidson's beach and the police notified. The chief sent two men out about eight o'clock the body was brought to the morgue. The body was found in a far more advanced state of decomposition than the body found yesterday and it will be impossible to recognize it, excepting by the clothes. The face is nearly all eaten away, as are the hands. The long pipe trades between the teeth and gives the corpse a horrible appearance.

The body is dressed in a pair of dark pants with a light stripe, a pair of laced boots, woolen socks, a dark grey flannel shirt and black neck coat. Around the waist there is a black leather belt, and the body looks as if the deceased had either been a longshoreman, or a man of a middle sized man, and is not so stout as the one picked up yesterday.

Harry Short, livery stable keeper, examined the body found at Little River, and is quite confident that it is the remains of John Foster, who was drowned from a tugboat in the harbor some months ago. The pants and boots correspond exactly with a description given to Mr. Short by Foster's father. The features, although much decomposed, Mr. Short thinks he can identify. Foster's sister will be brought to the morgue to identify the corpse. The appearance of the body would seem to justify Mr. Short's belief, as it looks as if it had been in the water for some time.

SECOND EDITION. INSTANTLY KILLED.

ATLYING FREIGHT TRAIN STRUCK A CARRIAGE WITH FATAL RESULTS.

Three Ladies and Two Children Occupied the Vehicle—Two Ladies Instantly Killed and the Third Severely Injured—The Children Escaped Without a Scratch.

(SPECIAL TO THE GAZETTE) WASHINGTON, Oct. 2.—The wife of Dr. Doster of this place left yesterday morning to visit her sister at Louisville. She was accompanied by Mrs. Fitch, Miss Harcourt and two young children about five years of age.

In returning to Mackinac last evening a carriage, about nine o'clock and while crossing the track at a point known as the "Third Crossing," which is a mile from Mackinac, the train struck by a freight train on the C. P. R. bound for Montreal and all three of the ladies were instantly killed. The two children escaped without a scratch.

At the time of the accident they were in their mother's arms and when the dead and mangled bodies were picked up by the train hands the children were found to be dead. Mrs. Doster's arms were wrapped in the bodies of the children and she was complaining bitterly of being held too tight. The bodies were taken to the morgue and the coroner at Three Rivers summoned. An inquest has been ordered for this afternoon. It appears that the train was running at the rate of thirty miles an hour at the time. Mrs. Doster and Mrs. Fitch were instantly killed and Miss Fitch died about an hour later.

The accident occurred four miles west of Louisville on the straight piece of track and surprise is expressed that the ladies did not notice the approaching train in time. The unfortunate people were driven a considerable distance from the shock. When picked up Mrs. Doster and Mrs. Fitch were found to be dead and Miss Fitch was still alive but unconscious. The horse was killed and the carriage broken to pieces.

CANADIAN IMMIGRATION. Though not so numerous, the class of emigrants to the United States is increasing. The Immigration Commission has just issued a report on the subject.

THE PRESBYTERIAN SYNOD. Opening Meeting Tonight—The Work of Today—Large Number of Delegates.

(SPECIAL TO THE GAZETTE) MONROVIA, Oct. 2.—The opening meeting of the Presbyterian Synod of the Maritime provinces will be held in the Presbyterian church here tonight. This morning there was a meeting of the local board and important business in connection with educational matters was transacted.

This afternoon the organization and Home mission committee will meet. A number of delegates have arrived and this afternoon's train will bring the balance. About 250 are expected and the Synod will be the largest ever held in the lower province.

HOW TO ATOM. A Torpedo Factory, with its only occupant, completely demolished. Toronto, Oct. 2.—A torpedo factory was exploded at the Anson Torpedo Company's works, located in West Virginia, opposite this place, at 11 o'clock yesterday morning, which completely demolished the works and killed Ralph Schoff, the only workman about the place. Schoff was making explosive when the explosion occurred. A magazine filled with nitroglycerine was setting out 25 yards, but was not touched.

The force of the explosion was so great that pieces of the building were thrown across the Ohio river. Not a piece six inches long was found of Schoff, the workman. The damage to the plant was about \$2000.

AN AGED INDIAN DROWNED. The New York Equity Court is adjourned till 11th November.

FRANCIS, Oct. 2.—Capt. Tomer, a well known aged Indian was found face downward drowned in Murray's Creek at Kingscote yesterday. The deceased was a constabulary.

High Jinks in Madawaska. The Woodstock Press says: The following case was tried at the Madawaska Circuit Court last week: The case of Thomas Clark and Fred LaForest against the defendants for having broken and entered into the barroom lately occupied by the said Peter Clark, and for having carried away the liquor found therein. Verdict for the plaintiffs for \$125. The evidence showed that the defendants, after taking the liquor, drank two bottles of it and lost fourteen other bottles before they reached home, and on arriving at Edmondston they delivered the liquor or what remained of it to the Chief Inspector of Licenses, who gave them each a receipt for the remainder in his office, where he was in the habit of calling on the Chief Inspector of Licenses. The Chief Inspector of Licenses admitted that there had been some twelve bottles so consumed in his office. Among those named by the Chief Inspector as having drunk of the liquor were Fred LaForest and Thomas Clark, who were afterwards convicted him.


