### CALL FOR RECRUITS

Your KING and COUNTRY Need You

### WILL YOU ANSWER YOUR COUNTRY'S CALL?

At this very moment the Empire is engaged in the greatest War in his history of the world.

In this crisis your Country calls on her young men to rally round Her Flag and enlist in the ranks of Her Army.

If every patriotic young man answers Her Call, Great Britain and the Empire will emerge stronger and more united than ever.

Newfoundland has already equipped and sent to the front her First Contingent, 540 strong. But we must not stop at this. Further drafts are urgently needed to reinforce our numbers on the battle line, and must be sent forward at the earliest possible moment.

Suitable recruits between the ages of 19 and 36 will be accepted and trained in drill and shooting so as to fit them for military service. They will then be formed into regular companies of the Regiment, and will be given the option of volunteering for service abroad if required, on the same terms and conditions as the men of the First Contingent. Pay will commence when men are actually enrolled for service abroad.

Recruiting Offices will be opened in St. John's, and at the offices of the different Magistrates, and at other suitable places in the Colony, (as to Recruiting, in case of doubt write to the Recruiting Officer, St. John's). Where not less than fifty men offer for enlistment at any recruiting centre, a drill instructor will, if possible, be sent to the District to train them.

## Great Victory

### Russians Capture 40,000 Germans

### Good News is Confirmed

London, Nov. 26.—Official news received in Russian circles in London to-day declares that the rout of the German and Austrian forces in Poland has been complete.

Petrograd, Nov. 26.—Rports reaching here concerning the magnitude of the defeat of the Germans to the west of Lodz, Russian Poland, which in some instances placed the German losses as high as an entire army corps, appear in full measure to be confirmed by telegraphic despatches from Warsaw.

Forty-eight trains have been despatched from Warsaw bringing in prisoners and wounded. This number of cars of Russian wide gauge would carry between 45,000 and 50,000 men, it is estimated here.

There is great jubilation in army circles here, officers expressing conviction that the enemy has received a crushing blow which is likely to prove decisive in the campaign in Poland.

Well, Alex, I haven't heard when we shall be sent to the front to help give the Germans a treat. We may be sent, sometime after Christmas, to Africa or Egypt. But I don't mind where it is. Haven't time to say any more.

## The Patriotic Fund

The Patriotic Fund, which now amounts to over \$70,000, is for the following objects:

- (1) To provide for any contingencies that may arise to our boys at the front, our sailors in the fleet, or their dependents as a result of the present war;
- (2) To make such provisions as may be necessary so as to ensure that none of the dependents of those who are voluntarily jeopardizing their lives for the safety of Newfoundland and the Empire shall suffer want.

Bay Roberts contribution to that Fund so far amounts to about \$150.00. Are we doing our share?

## A Heavy Loss

On Thursday night, Nov. 5th, Mr. Simon Sheppard, of Spaniard's Bay, met with a very severe loss by having his house and shop with practically all its contents destroyed by fire, the origin of which is unknown. There was no insurance. There was no one in the house at the time but Mr. Sheppard's aged mother. With great difficulty a shed nearby was saved, as was also the house of Mr. George Collins, which is opposite.

Spaniard's Bay is a community with no fire fighting apparatus, and therefore no provision what ever is made to arrest a fire. Possibly if some big conflagration occurred we may be led to realize the importance of having something ready at hand to fight a fire with.

## DeWet Beaten Again

London, Nov. 23.—A despatch from Pretoria says it is officially announced today that General DeWet's rapidly dwindling rebel commands became surrounded by loyal forces in the vicinity of Boshof, on the River Vaal, yesterday. DeWet succeeded in escaping with only twenty five men, the remainder of his force being surrounded.

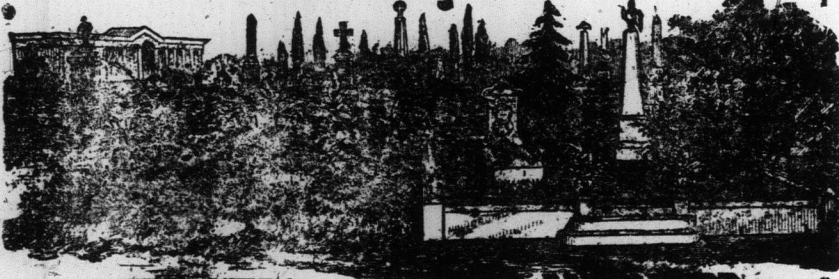

The Causes and the Progress of the Great War

Being a Lecture delivered by His Excellency Sir Walter Edward Davidson, K. C. M. G., Governor of Newfoundland, etc.

(Continued)

But, mark it well, it is the championing of justice and the protection of the weak and the oppressed—in her old-fashioned way—by Great Britain which has secured the isolation of Germany and will, in the end, humble the pride of her over-bearing soldiery.

As to the conduct in this affair of those who govern Great Britain and who guide the policy of the British Empire, I cannot do better than quote the judgment of Mr. Theodore Roosevelt, who represents in these words the feeling of the great Republic, and who has himself been in former times the intimate associate of the German Emperor. He says:—

As for England 'when once Belgium was invaded, every circumstance of national honor and interest forced England to act precisely as she did act. She could not hold up her head among the Nations had she acted otherwise.'

The Kyle Back From Labrador

S. S. Kyle, Capt. Burgess, arrived from Labrador ports at 9.30 a.m. Friday, Nov. 20th, having been over two weeks on the trip. The steamer went as far north as Cartwright, and conditions were such that the ship had to be 'eased' along in entering into the different harbors, owing to snow surges, and sometimes snow storms.

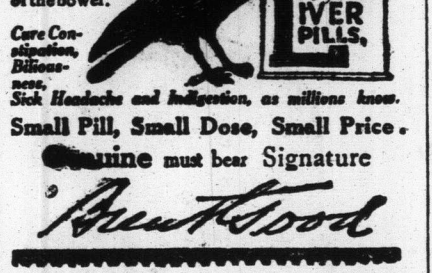

In the battle on the Marne, the British troops again proved their fighting value, and it is a pride to us that the German retreat was first commenced between Meaux and Chateau Thierry where the British pressed home their advantage.

Now the battle on the River Aisne which began on September 18th shows signs of ending. Again it is at the point where the British are that the Germans have shown the first signs of yielding ground; and from Soissons to Craonne the British have been making headway since October 5th.

On the Russian side, the Germans have made good the defence of East Prussia. The Austrians have, as usual, been defeated, but the line of battle is now formed in Russian Poland, on the line of the Vistula. The united forces of Germany and Austria may capture Warsaw, but I am sure that Arva and the salient they have been pushed back, and on their left they have gained ground; but the principal feature has been the attempt of the Allies again to turn their western flank.

First, the French pushed up to Roye, Ham and Peronne, but the Germans faced them resolutely on this new line, and as the French extended their lines further north, the Germans have faced them anew as far north as the frontiers, and almost to the sea.

But the aspect of the battle has greatly changed during these twenty days. The German line on September 18th, from west to east, lay from Noyon on the Oise, through Soissons, Craonne, Rheims, Verdun, Varennes, Montfaucon, to the River Meuse. On their right they have been pushed back, and on their left they have gained ground; but the principal feature has been the attempt of the Allies again to turn their western flank.

Laid to Rest

London, Nov. 19.—The body of Field Marshal Lord Roberts, borne on a gun cart, moved slowly through the streets of London to-day to its last resting place in St. Paul's Cathedral.

The cortege reached St. Paul's at noon, where before a great and reverent throng of people, including King George, the funeral services were held. The body will be interred alongside the remains of Wellington, Nelson, Wesley and other famous Britishers.

The pall bearers, representing England's most distinguished men in the service, were Earl Kitchener, Field Marshal Sir Evelyn Wood, Field Marshal Lord Grenfell, Field Marshal Lord Methuen, Field Marshal Sir William Nicholson, Gen. Sir James Hills John, General Sir Robert Biddulph, Gen. Sir Alfred Guesale, Gen. Sir Reginald Egerton, Gen. Sir Archibald Hunter, Admiral Lord Chas. Beresford and Admiral Sir Michael Seymour.

Telegrams are transmitted by means of the Wireless Service during the summer season, and all the year round by Steamers equipped with the wireless apparatus, which are due to pass through the radi of the wireless stations at Cape Race and Cape Ray.

Telegram messages may be obtained at all Post Offices and from Mail Agents on Trains and Steamers, and if the sender wishes the messages may be left with the P. M. to be forwarded by first mail to the nearest Telegram Office free of postage.

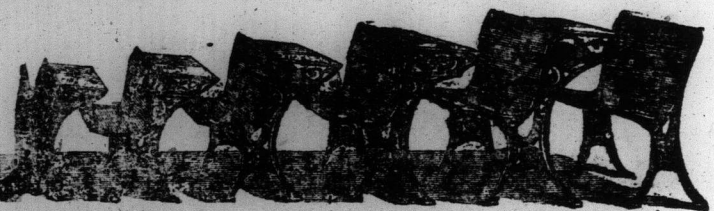

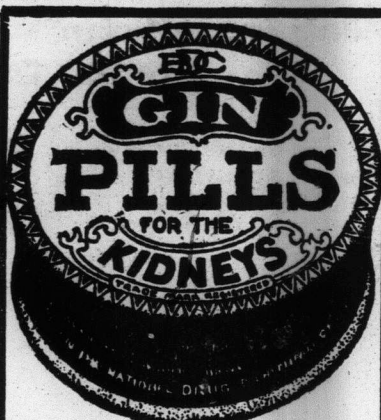

### Smashing a Zeppelin Factory

London, Nov. 23.—It is announced officially that British aviators, who on Saturday afternoon raided Friedrichshafen on Lake Constance, report that all the bombs thrown by them reached their objective, and serious damage was done to the sea plane and airship factory. Details of the raid on the Zeppelin factory, which the British officers assert inflicted serious damage, were given in the House of Commons today by Winston Churchill, First Lord of the Admiralty. On Saturday, said Churchill, under direction of Squadron Commander Briggs of the Naval Air Service, with Flight Commander Babington, and Lieut. Sippe, they flew from the French territory to the Zeppelin airship factory. All three pilots flew down to close range under fire from airship guns. They launched their bombs in accordance with instructions. Briggs is reported to have been shot down, and has been taken, wounded, to hospital, as a prisoner. The other officers returned safely to French territory.

His Lordship the Bishop of Newfoundland has appointed the Rev. T. G. Netten of Tappal, to the stall of St. Augustine, vacated by the death of the late Canon Bishop; and the Rev. G. H. Field, of Bay Roberts, to the stall of St. Aidan, as successor to the Rev. Canon Smith, resigned. Canon Netten is one of the senior clergy of the diocese, and both he and Canon Field are members of the executive of Synod. The installation will be performed by the Dean, His Lordship the Bishop, at Matins next Sunday. The Rev. A. K. Talk has been appointed to Salvage, and the Rev. C. H. Humphries to Taak's Beach.

### German Submarine Sunk—Crew Rescued

London, Nov. 24.—The German submarine U. 18 was rammed and sunk by a British patrolling vessel off the north coast of Scotland, yesterday. According to the British Admiralty statement, the U. 18 was comparatively new, built in 1912. She had been cruising in a radius of 2,000 miles.

London, Nov. 24.—The British submarine patrol ship rammed the German submarine U. 18 at 12.30 p.m., and the latter was not seen again until 1.20, when she appeared on the surface, flying a white flag. Shortly after this she foundered, just as a British gurry came alongside. The destroyer rescued 3 officers and 23 of the submarine's crew, only one being drowned.

### Call For Holy War

London, Nov. 1.—There have been great manifestations at Damascus, in Asiatic Turkey, in favor of a war against Christians, and especially against Great Britain, according to a despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from Athens. The manifesting of Bedouins along the Egyptian frontier, the despatch adds, is being continued.

### Public Notice Pulp-Wood.

Licenses to cut Pulp Wood on Crown Lands on the Labrador may be issued by His Excellency the Governor in Council, subject to the following conditions:  
1. The licensee shall continue in force until June 30, 1915, and be longer; Provided that any licensee shall have the right to export any pulp wood so cut at any time up to and including December 31st, 1915.  
2. The licensee shall pay an export on any pulp wood exported of \$1.00 per cord.  
3. The Governor in Council may prescribe the rate of wages to be paid men employed by the licensee for the purpose of cutting and exporting such pulp wood.  
4. The export duty is to be paid at the Port of entry when wood is exported.  
Any person exporting Pulp Wood without a License, shall be liable to a fine of \$5,000.00 and an amount equal to double the amount of duty on the quantity so exported.

Any person may export by the usual export entry any timber or lumber for pit props to any place in the United Kingdom for one year from 1st September, 1914.

## Report of the Battle

London, Nov. 18.—The Admiralty issued last night the report of the battle of the British light cruiser Glasgow, of the battle with the German squadron off the Chilean coast.

The Glasgow, which left Cebu on the morning of that day, was advised by Rear Admiral Craddock that the enemy's ships were to the Northward.

Towards evening the Glasgow sighted smoke and reported to Rear Admiral Craddock and the British fleet formed a line ahead, the British Hope leading with the Monmouth, Glasgow and Otranto following. The enemy had turned south and were also in single line ahead, the Scharnhorst and Gneisenau leading. Admiral Craddock signalled the Command: 'I am going to attack the enemy.'

**Jambled Wireless Signals**  
The enemy was at that time 15,000 yards away, says the report, and maintained this range, at the same time jumbling the wireless signals. The sun was setting immediately behind the British ships and, while it remained above the horizon, the British had the advantage in light but range was too great.

When the sun had set and visibility conditions were altered, the British ships were silhouetted against the afterglow and the faint light made the enemy difficult to see.

The Germans opened fire at 7 o'clock at 12,000 yards range, followed in quick succession by the British. The growing darkness and heavy spray and head sea made firing difficult, particularly from the main deck guns of the Good Hope and Monmouth.

The enemy, firing salvoes, got the range quickly and their third salvo caused an outbreak of fire on the forepart of both ships which were constantly on fire until 7.45 in the evening.

**Good Hope Blew Up**  
At 7.50 an explosion occurred on the Good Hope amidships, the flames reaching two hundred feet high, and the total destruction of the ship must have followed.

It was now quite dark and both sides continued firing at the flashes of the opposing guns.

The Monmouth was badly down by the bow and turned away to get her stern to the sea signalling the Glasgow to that effect.

At 8.30 the Glasgow signalled to the Monmouth 'The enemy is following us' but received no reply. Under the rising moon the enemy's ships could be seen approaching and as the Glasgow could neither see the Monmouth nor assistance she proceeded at full speed to avoid destruction.

**Final Attack on Monmouth**  
At 8.40 we lost sight of the enemy and at 9.30 we observed flashes of fire which were doubtless the final attack on the Monmouth. The statement issued by the Admiralty on Nov. 6th, concerning the sea fight off Chile, said the battleship Conque was not present at the time of the battle. This report of Captain Luce indicates that Admiral Craddock tried with his wireless to locate the Conque, which was doubtless in the Pacific and within range of the wireless call, and the hope that the battleship would turn her prow in his direction and assisted in giving battle to the Germans.

## Japanese Loan French Guns

Paris, Nov. 16.—The French army now has the use of the 105 millimeter field guns built in France to rearm the artillery forces of Japan. When the war began, part of the guns had been delivered and another large consignment was on the ocean.

Japan was asked by France if she might take the guns. The Japanese government calid promptly phoning the matter to the disposition of France and announced that she was sending back those already delivered so that the French army might use them. The vessel conveying the last consignment had already reached Colomb: when it was intercepted.

## Oporto Market

The accompanying letter, dated Nov. 3rd received Monday by the Board of Trade from Lind and Couto, of Oporto:—'The market is now much overstocked, the demand is weak and prices are falling. There is a large quantity of undecorated Norwegian fish in the market which is being forced into consumption as fast as possible at any price obtainable. The rate of exchange fixed by the Government has been reduced to 384, without results. No drafts are obtainable at such a rate.'

## Japan is Ready

London, Nov. 23.—Arthur Dowse, an authority on Anglo-Japanese affairs says in a statement that the Japanese are ready to furnish a large army if it is found necessary to invade the Allied Forces in Europe. The Japanese army is in a complete state of readiness. The Japanese are willing and ready to supply a large admirably equipped and highly-trained army over the trans-Siberian railway and there is an ample supply of Japanese steamships to make the transportation of half a million men in two months easy.

## German Advance Stayed

Paris, Nov. 24.—The correspondent at Petrograd of the Matin says that the Russian army after having checked the German offensive on the Ploek-Lenyaev front, gained on that side a brilliant decisive victory. The enemy who had heavy losses, is flying with all speed to the German frontier, and an entire German regiment has surrendered to the victors, who are energetically pursuing the enemy. The Russians are also vigorously attacking along the Czarnotchowa-Ciaco line, and this day seems to mark one of the most important and perhaps decisive phases of the war.

## The "Current Price"

At the Convention of the F. P. U. held recently, the Conception Bay delegates brought up the matter of the current price of Labrador fish shipped off the coast this season, and asked to have the matter tested before the courts. As a result we learn that the matter will be brought before the courts as a test case by Mr. A. B. Morine.

As a number of our fishermen were paid off at \$6.60 a qt., and others were paid \$4.00, the result of the action will be awaited with interest by all concerned.

Receipts given the fishermen often vary, as follows: 'Current price' or 'as much as is paid on the coast,' or 'whatever price is paid on the coast,' or 'at the current price paid on the coast,' and other forms. If it is found that the law does not cover these points, legislation dealing with this matter could be introduced at the next session of the House.
