THE REPORT WILL BE SENT TO OTTAWA

Result of Investigations into Fisheries of Province Will be of Great Value.

(From Wednesday's Daily).

The work of the British Columbia Fishery Commission closed at noon to-day, when the chairman, Professor ce, of Ottawa, and T. Charles Mc-Intosh, Victoria, completed certain for-mal routine business. The last executive session of the commissioners was held yesterday afternoon in the board neid yesterday atternoon in the board of trade rooms, when all the members of the commission attended excepting Campbell Sweeny, who has been called away by urgent bank duties in Van-couver. The Dominion government ap-pointed the commission on July 22 1905. pointed the commission on July 22, 1905, and for over two years investigations into the fisherics of the province have been carried on and evidence collect at public sittings, and in various other ways, including international conferences at Seattle on November 10th and 11th, 1905, and at Vancouver on Sep-

tember 19th and 20th, 1906. Lengthy and important interm re ports were signed and submitted to the government on December 8th, 1905, and October 2nd, 1906, and a special report
