The feeble folk of Ontario, who reside in asylums and institutes, maintained by the Provincial Government are rapidly approaching a condition of self-support. For some time progress in this direction has been materialized, but it is now understood that a new movement, broad enough in scope to include all the institutions in all parts of the province is being worked up by Hon. W. J. Hanna, and some of his lieutenants. One of the predominant features is the speedy organizing of a canning system, adquate to produce enough products to serve all the needs of the 8,000 old ersons who are confuned in these places. All the needs of the 8,000 old ersons who are confuned in these places. All the necessary supplies will be drawn from the fields and orchards now being cultivated on Government land.

This idea of erecting canning factories and preserving frrits and vegetables is not altogether a new venture for the Ontario Government. In connection with the London Asylum for the Insane, a small plant has been fit operation for years and has solved the question of winter supplies with marked success, though on a much larger scal: and to distribute the benefits to all.

The far-reaching nature of the proposal has involved a tremendous amount of detailed planning and the accurate rating of the crops of the institutions from year to year in order to understand the demands of the plants and the yielding power of the sources of supply. A careful analytis of the crop returns from farms under operation this year, is believed to have convinced S. E. Todd, provincial farm director, that the idea is highly feasible, and that the resources in soil fertility, in beef and fruits and vegetables, will permit of the launching of the system at an early date.

itish Field Marshal Has Gone Through Accidents Enough to Ac-count For Most Human Beings

But He Always Gets Better—Fe'l From Rigging, Toppled Overboard and Once Was Frozen Stiff. The veteran Field Marshal Sir Evelyn Wood resently met with a very serious accident whilst riding at Marlow and was for some time con-

very serious accident whilst riding at Marlow, and was for some time con-fined to bed suffering from concussion of the brain. Indeed the doctors were not at all certain for a while that Sir Evelyn who is row in his 76th year, would recover from the shock and the Lace Insertions to 6oc. concussion. This gentleman had excellent grounds for his remarks, since probably no living man has ever been so near death, time after time, and excepted in the most extonishing and lacky ways inaginable as Sir Evelyn Wood.

This good luck began whilst Sir Evelyn was but a midshipman on beard H.M.S. Queen in 1853. He and some other middles, were playing "follow my leader," on the rigging of this vessel, at a height of 147 feet above the deck. Wood became giddy and fell, but he managed to catch held of the lighting conductor, and held on by it until he was reacued, though he stated afterwards he was so nervous as to feel sick, and at one moment almost let go his hold, which would have meant certain death on

would have meant certain death on the deck bolow.

At another time, when his ship was at another, it is related the daring midshipman fell overboard one night whilst taking part in some games. An officer suddenly startled him with a shout. Wood let go of the yardarm where he was, but fortunately fell immediately between two lower deck ports which were open. He turned over twice in the air before he reached the water, and his shins were bleeding from coming in contact with the side of the ship, but he was able to swim to the boat stern. He regards this as one of the most miraculous escapes, since there was little distance scapes, since there was little distance between the ports, and had he fallen on either of them he must have been

on either of them he must have been killed on the spot.

The future field marshal was pres-ent with the naval brigade at the at-tack on the Redan in the Crimean War; where his many and astonishing escapes from death were often the opic of conversation. He was passing topic of conversation. He was passing some guns when a shell buzzing close over his head made him suddenly stop. As he lifted his head and looked round he saw the shell had killed two gunners just behind him.

In one of his journeys from the caves to the battery he was walking close to a rergeent when a round shot whiszed past, just missed the midshipman, and cut the sergeant into two pieces, as it struck him between

two pieces, as it struck him between the shoulders.

One night Wood went to sleep in a solitary example of its kind.

It is extraordinary, too, how little a thing will start the biggest and most devastating of ocean fires. Thus the carelessness of a member of the crew, who dropped a lighter oil-lamp on the forecastle floor, was responsible for the burning in mid ocean of the big emigrant ship Cospatrick on November 18th, 1874 when no fewer than 465 lives were lost. When he woke at daylight he found all his limbs and body were so frozen that he was unable to move. 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BOILED COFFEE OF BRAZIL. The Real Thing as the Natives Make

coffee plantation in Brazil. "There, when a coffee craving seizes you, you take a few handfuls of green offee berries, and after rejecting all the imperfect ones among them you place these picked berries in an iron ladle and roast them over an open fire. "You roast them till they begin to smoke. Then before they are charred you take them off, drop them into a mortar and pound them with a pestle

carefully. "Meanwhile a cup of cold pure water has been set on the fire. When it omes to a boil the ground coffee is thrown into it-a table and the boiling is allowed to go on for about three minutes.
"Now you drink the coffee. You

drink it without straining it. The grounds He at the buttom of the cup, and if you don't shake it the fluid is as clear as crystal crystal clear, black "The French can boast as they please

of their filtered coffee, I tell you there's nothing like the boiled coffee of Brazil, all picked, roasted and prepared within a few minutes under the open sky."—New York Tribune.

Life at Low Temperatures. Most recent experiments show that the idea that bacteria in general are not harmed by freezing is untenable. On the other hand, the effect of very ow temperatures has been great overestimated. It has been observ that as destructive effects are pro-duced upon bacterial life from the tem-perature of sait and pounded ice as from that of liquid air. The critica from that of liquid air. The critical point appears to be somewhat about the freezing point of water. An organism that can pass this point in safety may be proof against even absolute zero. A few individual bacteria in every culture tried were able to endure unharmed the temperature of liquid air. This is believed to have been due to the absence of water in cells.
