The case of Marie Antoinette is one of the most tender and touching, for in a single night her rich dark hair was changed to a silvery-gray. A sepoy of the Bengal army was taken prisoner in 1858, and the fright he received caused his hair to become completely whitened within half an hour, the change being so rapid as to cause his captor to exclaim in astonishment, "He is turning gray!" Under the influence of fear or any great mental shock the blood recedes from the surface of the body to the heart, and it is supposed the same influence may cause the coloring fluid of the hair to retire to the root-bulbs, where it remains thereafter. Gray hair has been known to become dark without the chemist's aid. In 1774, Nazarelia, a man 105 years old, was presented by nature with a new set of teeth and a restoration of the black hair of his youth. John Weeks was blessed with a regeneration of the color of his hair a short time before his death, which occurred at the age of 114; and Sir John Sinclair, dying at 110, rejoiced in a youthful head of hair during the latter years of his life. Dr. Richards has reported the case of a man who had three changes of his hair from black to white during his life, the first taking place when he was about 35 years old. Careful and patient counting has hown that a single plant of purslane will produce 1,000,000 mature seeds. This will furnish a seed for every square foot of ground on 23 acres. At this rate, the second generation from a single plant will produce the enormous aggregate of 1,000,000,000,000 seeds, or a seed for every square foot of 23,000,000 acres.

LONDON, Sept. 4. The following despatch has been received

from General Roberts, giving details of his victory over Ayoob Khan : CANDAHAR, Sept. 2.—Report of rec noisances carried out by General Hugh Gough and Col. Chapman, on 31st ult., afforded me all necessary information regarding the enemy's position. I found it quite practicable to turn his right, and thus place myself to the rear of Baba-Wali range, where Ayoob Khan's main camp was. I decided on doing so, and com menced the attack shortly after Line o'clock yesterday morning. To cover my designs I made preparations for a direct attack upon Babi Wali. This feint was entrusted to troops of the Candahar garrison under General Primrose, who also arranged to occupy my advanced positions of the previous day. At the same time a cavalry brigade under General Hugh Gough advanced upon the left, and without diffi culty reached Amandab, where it was well placed for pursuit, should the enemy break either towards Girishk or Kakrez. The attack was made by first and second brigades under Generals McPherson and Baker respectively, with the Third Brigade under General McGregor in support, the whole infantry being under command of General Ross. An elevated village within 1.200 vards of our position was strongly held by the enemy and had first to be taken. This was done in a most gallant manner by the 92nd Highlanders and Second Ghoerkas covered by artillery. Two brigades then advanced through orchards and enclosures, fighting steadily. The left of the Second Brigade being brought gradually round until the villag of Pirspaimal was reached. At this point the enemy was in great force and fought most resolutely, but nothing could resist the determined advance of the British troops. Shortly after this the reverse slope of Babi-Wali was reached and the standing camp of Ayoob Khan became visible. All the enemy's attempt to stem the torrent were futile. By 12 o'clock noon the camp was in our possession with 27 pieces ordinance, which included our own guns lost on the 27th of July. THE BARK EXTRACT FACTORY BURNEL.

The destruction by fire of Messrs. Miller's Hemlock Bark Extract Manufactory at Derby took place on the afternoon and evening of Tuesday last. It appears that the fire began in the centre of the building in which the large vacuum pan is situated, but its origin is not known. Mr. Crocker, book-keeper of the establishment had just been up in the tower where the pan was, for the purpose of noting the pressure and saw nothing amiss, but he had just come down and reached the side of the building when the alarm was given. Many of the men about the establishment at once rushed for buckets and endeavored to check the flames, while others got the hose connected with the factory pony engine and that of the other fire engine in readiness, but the fire could not be checked. Word was sent by telephone to Newcastle asking for assistance, but, in the meantime, the work of destruction went on, the means at hand being entirely inadequate to check it. When hope of saving the main factory was abandoned attention was turned to the adjoining warehouse and other property.
