FIGHTING IN EAST FAVORABLE TO RUSSIANS;

Reports of Germans About Russian Reverses Disproved by Steady Advance of Czar's Forces in Galicia - Austro-German Attack Before Cracow Repulsed and Russians Hold Part of German Territory in East Prussia - No Developments of Importance in Western War Theatre, but Believed Enemy is Planning Another Desperate Attack When Weather Conditions Prove More Fav orable - British Navy Again Bombarding German Positions.

London, Nov. 23.—The German submarine U-18 was rammed and sunk today by a British patrolling vessel off the north coast of Scotland, according to a British Admiralty statement. The U-18 was a comparatively new vessel, having been built in 1912. She had a cruising radius of 2,000

The battle which is being fought in the region between the Vistula and Warta rivers in Poland appears to have turned in favor of the Russians. In fact, a special despatch from Petrograd to Paris says that the Russian army already has won a decisive victory. While this may be an exaggeration, both the Russian and the German official reports suggest that General Von Hindenburg's second thrust at Warsaw has been checked.

Grand Duke Nicholas, commander-in-chief of the Russian forces, for two days in succession has recorded partial successes in this great battle and tonight the German general staff says that the arrival of Russian reinforcements has postponed a decision. Both sides have expressed the greatest confidence in the outcome of this battle. Grand Duke Nicholas and General Von Hindenburg heretofore have been so successful in their strategy that their adherents look upon them as almost unbeatable.

RADIUM FOUND IN SPRING WATER IN QUEBEC,

London, Nov. 23.—It was announced officially this afternoon that the British aviators who, Saturday afternoon raided Friedrichshafen, on Lake Constance, report positively that all the bombs thrown by them reached their objective, and that serious damazer was done to the Zeppelin airship factory.

Details of the aeroplane raid on the Zeppelin factory which British officers assert inflicted serious damage, where given in the House of Commons this afternoon by Winston Spencer Churchiil, First Lord of the Admiralty.

HERE ARE THE CONDITIONS

Recruiting for the New Brunswick Regiment Must be Completed Within Ten Days

THE VOLUNTEERS

THE PERIOD OF ENLISTMENT is for the duration of the war and for six months after termination if required.

THE RATE OF PAY is \$1.10 per day and found for seven days a week, equal to \$33.00 per month.

IF DISABLED, the soldier will receive a pension at such rates as may be fixed by the Government.

IF WOUNDED OR ILL, the soldier will be well cared for and sent back to his home at the proper time.

THEIR FAMILIES

SOLDIERS MAY ASSIGN any portion of their regular pay to wives or others, and such sums will be paid regularly to the persons so designated.

WIVES OF VOLUNTEERS will receive twenty dollars per month separation allowance from the Canadian Gov-ernment over and above the soldiers pay.

THE PATRIOTIC FUND will supplement this with an additional allowance as described hereafter.

SHOULD ANY OF THE SOLDIERS BE KILLED, their wives and children will become wards of the Canadian Government, and generous provision will be made for them.

The National Patriotic Fund Committee has decided on a basis of distribution of funds among the wives and children, and other dependents of volunteers. It is estimated that a wife on her own account requires Thirty Dollars Per Month for her maintenance. The Canadian Government provides Twenty Dollars per month of this amount and the Patriotic Fund the remaining Ten Dollars, if required. Children between ten and fifteen years of age are allowed twenty-five cents per day; from five to ten years of age, fifteen cents per day; and under five years of age, ten cents per day. Thus a wife and three children of the ages of three, seven and twelve, may receive a total monthly allowance of Forty-five Dollars, of which Twenty Dollars is payable by the Canadian Government and Twenty-five Dollars by the Patriotic Fund. This is of course in addition to the Thirty-three Dollars per month paid to the soldier, and which may be assigned by him to his family.

Besides the above, provision is made for a compassionate allowance for temporary extraordinary need such as accident, sickness, etc. In short, the whole purpose of the Patriotic Fund is so to supplement the Government allowance as to provide all reasonable comfort for the families of men on service. Such provision, in each individual case, is subject to the report of local committees, who shall consider all the circumstances of families affected, with respect to the earnings of members of such families, amounts received from former employer of the soldiers, and other sources of income.

Every reasonable provision is thus made for dependent relatives, and volunteers need have no anxiety regarding the welfare of those






