





PROTECT FRUIT TREES FROM MICE

(Experimental Farm Note.) Thousands of trees are injured in Canada every year by mice, and in the newer districts a large number by rabbits also.

While the depredations from mice and rabbits in winter vary from one year to another, depending on the quantity or abundance of food, the number of mice which are in the vicinity, and the character of the winter, the injury is always greatest when the ground is in soil, and when there is rubbish lying about; hence the latter should be removed before the winter sets in.

Mice usually begin working on the ground under the snow, and when they come to a tree they will begin to gnaw it if it is not protected. A small mound of soil from eight to twelve inches in height raised about the tree, and even snow tramped about the tree has been quite effective, but the cheapest and surest practice is to wrap the tree with ordinary building paper, the price of which is small. Tar paper is also effective, but trees have been injured by using it, and it is well to guard against this when building paper will do as well.

Strenuously Objects to U. S. Railway Companies Confiscating Coal Consigned to Canada's Manufacturers.

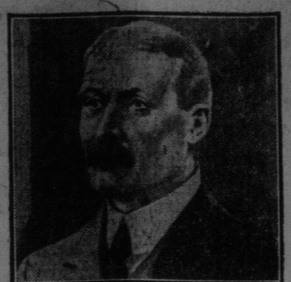

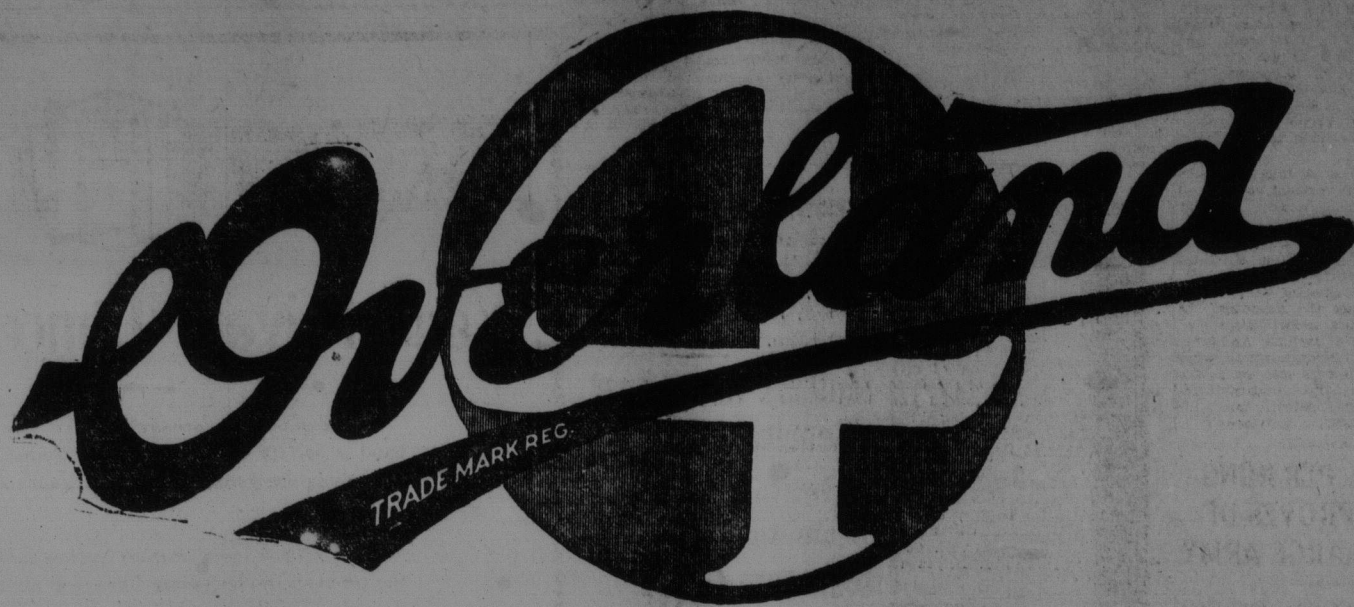
INTERESTING CASE DECIDED YESTERDAY

In the estate of James A. Lord, in the matter of an originating summons taken out by the executors to determine the question whether certain lands had been validly conveyed by the testator to Mrs. Grace Lord or whether the same remained a part of the estate, Mr. Justice White delivered judgment yesterday morning. It appeared that the testator instructed his solicitor, S. B. Bustin, to prepare a deed of land on Prince street, Carleton, to Mrs. Lord and that he executed the conveyance, which remained in Mr. Bustin's possession and was never actually in the possession of Mrs. Lord. The testator, however, had a conversation with Mrs. Lord, in which he told her that he had given her the property. Subsequently through a real estate agent, he carried on negotiations for a sale of the land in question and executed a second deed of the premises, which was never delivered, as the purchaser failed to complete the transaction by payment. The testator then died, both deeds being in the custody of Mr. Bustin, who was one of the executors of his will. 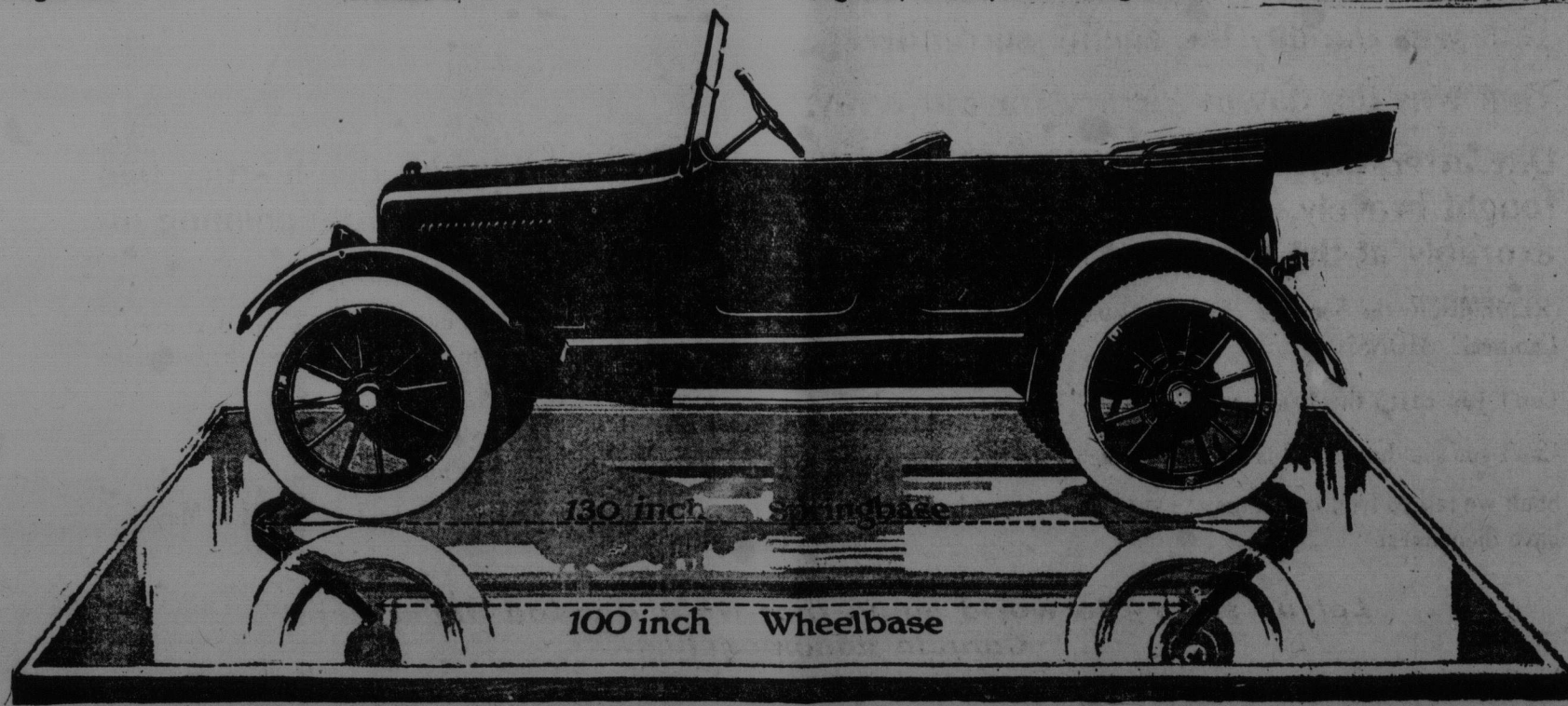

### GENERAL PERSHING DISAPPROVES OF A LARGE ARMY

Tells Military Committee That United States Does Not Need More Than 300,000 Men — Favors "Trained Citizen Reserve."

Washington, D. C., Oct. 31.—Disagreeing with War Department recommendations for a permanent army of 500,000 men, General Pershing today told a joint meeting of the Senate and House Military Committee that he thought the number could be placed at "an outside figure of 275,000 to 300,000, and possibly less." The cost of maintaining a large army, the General said, was an element which, in his opinion, would make it impracticable to set the figure any higher. The General said the regular army should be sufficient to protect the nation against sudden attack, and to meet America's international obligations both on the American continent and elsewhere, and that this should be backed by a "trained citizen reserve."

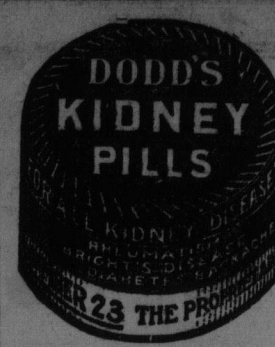

### INJUNCTION TO PROHIBIT SALE OF ALL LIQUOR

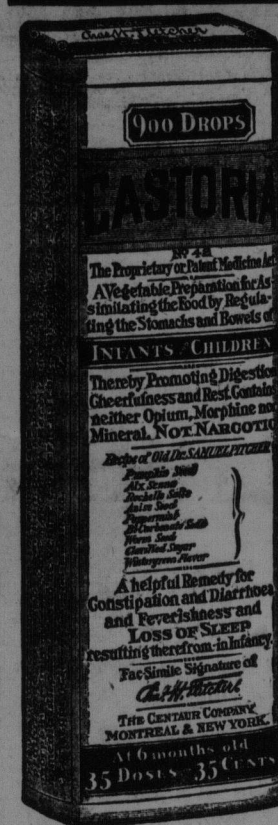

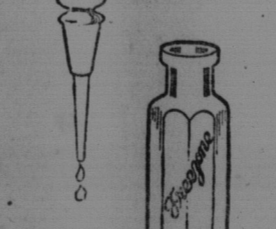
