News Brevities.

The wing and library of the new Parliament buildings are now roofed in. The Barker House at Fredericton was sold at auction last week to Mr. S. D. McPherson, for \$6,005.

The press receipts of the Western Union Telegraph Co. for one year up to the 30th June, amounted to \$1,200,000.

Jonathan Wier, of Moncton, has concluded a contract for the supply of a large number of cars for the Canada Pacific Railway.

Messrs. Wm. Parks & Son, of the New Brunswick Cotton Mills, were awarded a contract in every department for goods exhibited by them at the Provincial Exhibition held at Hamilton, Ont.

It will be completed in two years.

Large Lumbering Company.

A number of Scottish capitalists have formed a company, with a capital of \$1,000,000 to be called the British Canadian Lumbering and Timber Company (Limited). Their operations will extend over an area of 1,300 square miles, covering territory along the Ottawa and St. Lawrence rivers.
