General Intelligence.

IS PARALYSIS CURABLE? MR. GEORGE LITTLE, OF ESSEX COUNTY, SAYS IT IS.

He called in one of the best known physicians of Essex county, who appeared to do all that lay in his power for the relief of Mr. Little, but to no avail. For two and a half years he suffered the most intense pain and was confined to his bed for the greater part of the time. The doctor was puzzled with his case and as he seemed to obtain no relief, he changed doctors for a period. The second doctor did no better than the other, and Mr. Little returned to the one he had first called in. Finally, despairing of ever obtaining relief, he told the physician that he did not see any further use of taking his medicines, and believed he should die if he did not obtain relief in a little time. He had wasted away to little more than a mere skeleton, and was an object of pity to his neighbors, and felt himself a burden to his family. His wife and family had given up hope, and his neighbors all thought it was merely a question of time when Mr. Little's death would relieve his sufferings. While his limbs were partially paralyzed he could use them sufficient to hobble about the house and door yard, but if he undertook to walk to the stable he would be confined to his bed for a week after. His limbs grew numb and cold. During the hottest summer days he was obliged to sit with his feet and legs in a hot oven, wrapped in blankets and hot cloths until the skin would come off in scales. So a cloth, pail and water, and pieces of wash-leather were supplied to her, and greatly did she revel in the indulgence.

Farm and Household.

Good barnyard manure applied right after the mowings and pastures are mown in the summer gives very beneficial results. It can be hauled out from the yards and stables in August or September, and spread over the stubble. The earlier after the mowings are mown the better, and where they are cut in early July the work can be done profitably then.

Even straw manure that has not been evenly composted will give good results. The straw protects the roots of the grass from the hot sun, and helps to retain the moisture in the soil after each shower. About ten good loads of manure to the acre applied several years in succession will make such a difference in the yield that one will be surprised.

Manure applied in the fall, and then hrowed over lightly, will make grass seed sprout. The pastures seem to be benefited by this harrowing, especially if a rain follows right after it. By applying the manure in this way late in summer it does not interfere with the next season's crop of hay, but rather increases its yield. Of course it keeps the cattle off the pasture for a time, and this certainly should be done for a few weeks in mid-summer anyway. Pasturing stock on the meadows right after mowing, when the soil is dry and sun very hot, is the surest way to run out a good piece of grass land. After mowing the land needs a rest, and a little stimulating thing will help matters a great deal.

By handling our hay fields in this way we can crop them more years in succession than if we neglected them. Six successive crops of good timothy off the hay field is something unusual, and yet that is just what this system will do every time. The question is whether the rule of spreading the manure in late summer will not pay if such results are obtainable.

This year hay is apparently going to be high. Already prices are tending upwards, and holders are keeping their old stock for further advances. The coming crop will not be a large one unless more rain falls. We have had for that matter a number of years lately when good hay paid as well as any crop on the farm. If we but handle the grass land properly we will find it the most remunerative on the farm. Good timothy hay, however, can be grown only on land that is enriched.

Manure is most valuable when it is first voided. It never gains in lime, potash, phosphoric acid or nitrogen by being preserved, but as usually kept there is quite a loss of these elements by leaching. Carefully composting the manure makes it finer and more quickly available as that fact, especially if such coarse stuff is mixed with it, but for all field crops the sooner manure is put upon the land the more good is received from it. So true is this that progress to farmers can't manure right on the snow in winter, provided the land does not wash, while during the rest of the year it is daily spread on the land desired to be fed.



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
