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## COMMON COUNCIL.

The Council met on Tuesday at 11 a. m.  
The Market Committee reported on the  
sale of the market revenues. They asked  
authority to make necessary repairs, and  
they declined to order the opening up of  
the Market street. The report was con-  
firmed with the exception of the clause  
regarding the opening of the streets, which  
was amended so that the matter will be brought  
up as new business at the next meeting.

The Street Committee reported on the  
number of accounts which they recommended to  
the Finance Committee for payment. They  
informed the Board that the fund is now  
out of debt and has a balance to its credit.

The Harbor Committee reported having  
instructed the City Engineer to make sound-  
ings, &c. at the North Wharf, with the view  
of having the dredging asked for done.

They recommended the appointment of the  
following gentlemen as Portwardens: A.  
Quick, W. Black, O. Emery, J. D. Mc-  
Donald, John Riddick, Joseph Dunlop,  
Samuel K. Wilson, Thos. S. Adams, James  
O'Brien, and Duncan Robertson.

They recommended for exemption from  
wharfage dues, wheat, barley, buckwheat,  
naple sugar and maple candy, fish barrels  
and kegs, the products of New Brunswick  
and Nova Scotia. The report was adopted.

The report of the Engineer, as engineer,  
in place of McLaughlin, resigned, and that  
future 500 tickets be sold for a dollar  
instead of 50c. Ald. Magee explained that  
the House was not in favor of the  
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best mode of levying taxes, that a Com-

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## FREDERICTON NOTES.

As the session draws to a close business  
is hurried, and it is a common thing to see  
several members at one time trying to  
catch the Speaker's eye, in order to get  
their particular Bills before a committee of  
the House.

Five Bills were disposed of and passed  
in one day—generally of a local character.  
Davidson is a terror to the advocates of  
local Bills. He slaughters them without  
mercy, and is especially hard upon St.  
John's members. In a recent conflict with  
Marshall in a Bill introduced by the latter  
requiring corporations to elect Deputies  
under any Act of Assembly to make a year-  
ly return to the Government, Davidson  
rather roughly handled him. Your city rep-  
resentative, who is noted for his genial dispo-  
sition, was fairly aroused. He gave a  
graphic description of the great Northern  
Bear, and asserted that he made a ridiculous  
exhibition of himself in making ap-  
proaches to Bills which he did not  
understand, and assured the House that  
Davidson was "nothing if not honest."

The latter with Blair, was compelled to

member of the Legislature, in pushing
