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MEETING OF THE TOWN COUNCIL

Police Resolution Declared Illegal, Other Matters Dealt With.

A meeting of the Town Council was held in the Firemen's Hall Monday evening, His Worship Mayor McKay presiding, Couns. Wallace, Patterson, Moores, Bisset, Chamberlain, St. Onge and Duncan were present.

The minutes of the previous regular and a special meeting were read and approved.

A communication from the School Board re taking a school census of the town was read and referred to the Education and Improvement committee for a report.

H. A. Carr, Town Solicitor, submitted a lengthy opinion as to the legality of the resolution passed recently defining the duties of the police. This stated clearly that the resolution was not a legal and proper one.

After considerable discussion Coun. St. Onge moved that the matter be laid over until the next meeting so that councillors can have a chance to think the matter over.

Coun. Patterson moved in amendment that the question be dealt with at once.

The original motion passed on a vote of St. Onge, Wallace, Duncan and Chamberlain for and Moores, Bisset and Patterson against.

Applications were read from Frank M. Watson and Patrick H. Doyle for position of meter reader and collector of rates and taxes.—Laid on the table.

Wm. Brown and Mrs. Margaret Kerr wrote complaining of assessment for 1920. Referred to Assessment and Appeals Committee.

A petition from residents of Ward III asking for extension of Cromwell Avenue was read and referred to the Public Property and Streets Committee for a report.

Departmental accounts were ordered paid.

The Assessment and Appeals Committee reported recommending that the Henry be granted refund of poll tax, he being over sixty years of age and that Mrs. John Ward's assessment be reduced \$600.00, and that poll tax be struck off. Report received and adopted.

Coun. Bisset moved that the Town Clerk be authorized to get prices on or pricing necessary forms for Electric Light department tabulating system.—Carried.

Coun. Duncan of the Finance Committee read draft of a bill to go to the legislature asking permission to issue \$19,000 bonds to pay off overdraft on Fire Station. He moved that same be sent to legislature.—Carried.

Mrs. R. Barclay Gerrard was given permission to address the Council in behalf of the W.C.T.U., on the matter of the resolution re policeman's duties passed at a recent meeting. She made a strong appeal for the rescinding of the motion and a rigid enforcement of the Prohibition Act.

Rev. Mr. Boothroy also spoke along the same lines.

Coun. Moores complained that the Councilors had no copy of the Town Bylaws and suggested that steps be taken to procure same, duly amended.

Coun. St. Onge moved that the matter of consolidation of Bylaws be left with the Bylaw and Legislation Committee, and report next meeting.—Carried.

Coun. Moores gave notice that at the next meeting he would move a resolution fixing the hour of adjournment for 11 o'clock.

Coun. Duncan requested that the appointment of the official to read meters and collect all rates and taxes be left over until the next meeting.

Coun. Moores spoke strongly against the men reading meters being stopped and moved that they be ordered to proceed with this work.

Coun. Duncan said that a permanent man would be chosen in a week.

Motion was lost.

Coun. Moores asked what progress had been made in the auditing of the books and the preparing of the copy for the Annual Report.

The clerk reported that the work could be ready in a very short time.

Coun. Wallace moved that the Auditor be requested to submit his report for the next meeting.—Carried.

Coun. Wallace submitted deed of Hillside Street from Robt. L. Duncan together with an agreement in reference to same.

Coun. Bisset moved that deed be referred to the town solicitor for his opinion as to its legality.—Carried.

The council then adjourned.

In 1910 the year of the Campbellton fire, the store and stock was completely destroyed. Believing Campbellton would rise to be a bigger and better town than ever, he gave instructions for a temporary building and left for Montreal and Toronto to buy new stock. Just three weeks later the firm was again doing business on the old site which the government took later for the subway. In October 1912, they moved to the building which they formerly occupied until they moved into their present new building which has one of the finest store fronts in Eastern Canada.

The interior of the store being finished in cream and mahogany, giving a pleasing effect with the high class merchandise which the firm carries.

This public meeting, representing the Temperance Alliance, various churches and citizens, notes with deep disappointment the continued delay of any, to show that the Railway Company's Town Council in striking from the minutes the recent illegal resolution re Prohibition Enforcement. The law declares that such enforcement is part of the civic duties of the town policeman and, as such, no neglect can be permitted. In the matter of other civic duties, we believe that the Police & License Committee could properly direct the police officers without endangering the carrying out of any law.

As for the Town sharing the fines in face of difficulties to serve some are one with the Council and would support it in any effort in that direction. We further appreciate the Mayor's recent suggestion that the Temperance Alliance cooperate with the Council and declare we are ready to do when requested.

The meeting then adjourned.

B. F. CARVELL UPHOLDS Q. O. RY.

Says Men Who Are Trying to Run Railway Are Patriots.

Montreal, March 23.—When the appeal of the Chicoutimi Pulp Co. against the rates charged by the Atlantic Quebec and Western Railway on coal from Gaspe to Chandler, P. Q., and on wood pulp from Chandler to Gaspe came before the Board of Railway Commissioners this morning, Chairman Carvell spoke in complimentary terms of the Atlantic Quebec and Western.

After referring to the tremendous difficulties confronting the Railway, he added "if ever there was a body of out and out patriots, it is the men who are trying to run that railway."

If the rates had been increased as it was on Mr. Carvell's recommendation and there was no doubt what his decision would be in the matter. After some further argument as to the legal aspect of the question, Mr. Carvell said:

"I want to tell you if these people are within the law, as far as I am concerned they are going to stay there. If you can show they are not—well, it may be necessary to change the law for them."

Chairman Carvell later became impatient and challenged Mr. Iverson who spoke for the Chicoutimi Companies that have profited as they have for the past years and they want to grind down a Railway like the Atlantic Quebec and Western which is trying hard in face of difficulties to serve some are one with the Council and would support it in any effort in that direction. 

BONAVENTURE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL

Regular Meeting Held At New Carlisle On Wednesday, March 9th.

Minutes of a General Meeting of the County Council of the County of Bonaventure, held in the Town Hall, New Carlisle, on Wednesday the 9th day of March, 1921, at 10 a.m.

Notice of the election of Mayors for the different Municipalities were read by the Secretary-Treasurer.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved of on motion of Mayor Adams, seconded by Mayor LeBrasseur.

The election of a Warden for the County in the place of Peter Deraiche, Esq., whose term of office had expired, was then proceeded with. It was moved by Mayor Adams, seconded by Mayor Chapados, that Peter Cyr, Esq., Mayor of St. Omer, be elected Warden for the County of Bonaventure for the current year.—Adopted.

The new Warden thanked the Council for the honor conferred upon him, and was then duly administered the oath of office by the Secretary-Treasurer, and took the chair.

Moved by Mayor Adams, seconded by Mayor Henri, that a vote of thanks be tendered Peter Deraiche Esq., the retiring Warden for his efficient service during his occupancy of the chair.—Adopted.

Moved by Mayor Chapados, seconded by Mayor Deraiche, that Eugene Anglerhart, Esq., Mayor of St. Godfrey, be appointed Pro-Warden for this County for the current term.—Adopted.

The Secretary-Treasurer then read all correspondence from the different authorities relating to business of last meeting, and duly filed them of record.

A vote of thanks was tendered to J. F. Bugeaud, Esq., M.P.P., for his services in settling an action for damages taken against this Council by Mr. Belanger of Quebec, on account of an accident happening to his automobile between Glen Emma and Millstream in the unorganized territory of this County.

Moved by Mayor Poirier, seconded by Mayor Henri that the Secretary-Treasurer be authorized to get all possible information regarding the ownership of the lands bordering on what is known as the Matapédia Valley road through the unorganized Township of this County, from the Crown Lands Agent for that District.—Adopted.

Moved by Mayor Ross, seconded by Mayor LeBrasseur, that this Council do accept the offer of settlement by Pouis Delarossille for seventy-five dollars, (75.00), in full, in connection with the accident to his horse on the County Road between the Township of Cox and Hope, on the 4th day of February, nineteen hundred and twenty-one, the said amount to be charged to the Municipalities interested namely Paspébiac and Hope.—Adopted.

Moved by Mayor Ross, seconded by Mayor LeBrasseur, that Eugene Poirier, Esq., be appointed Superintendent of the said County Road between the Township of Cox and Hope.—Adopted.

Moved by Mayor Gilker, seconded by Mayor Adams that the Secretary-Treasurer be authorized to write the Director of War Trophies at Ottawa, to try and secure a further allotment of Trophies for this County.—Adopted.

Moved by Mayor Poirier, seconded by Mayor Gilker that the valuation for County purposes, as revised, in the month of March, 1918, be again kept in force for this year, and that the Secretary-Treasurer do notify all Municipalities in default to forward a copy of their present Valuation Roll to the office of this Council before the month of September, and notify all absent members of this Council that the same will be revised at the next meeting in September.—Adopted.

Moved by Mayor Frenette, seconded by Mayor Frenette that this meeting do now adjourn for dinner until 1:30 p.m.

At 1:30 p.m. the Council then resumed business.

A question of the legality of the County Prohibitory By-Law, adopted by this Council in 1915, coming up, it was moved by Mayor Outman, seconded by the Honorable John Hall Kelly, to be taken regarding same, and report to this Council at the meeting to be held in September next.

Moved in amendment by Mayor Poirier, seconded by Mayor Henri that the Prohibitory By-Law passed by this Council in 1914, be rescinded and annulled as being illegal and of no force and effect due to the want of necessary formalities, Mayors Poirier, Frenette, Martin, Ross, LeBrasseur, seconded.

ST. PIERRE CLEARED OF MURDER CHARGE

Jury Out Less Than One Hour—Mr. LeBlanc Warmly Congratulated.

Edmundston, March 17.—It took the jury less than one hour today to lift the stigma of murder from William St. Pierre, the young man who has been on trial here for his life on the charge of having murdered Miss Minnie Stevens of Aylesford (N. S.), on the night of October 11, 1920. Following the judge's charge the jury retired at 5:07 p.m. and at 6:04 they returned and announced that a verdict had been arrived at. The foreman, Liguor M. Nadeau, read the verdict which was not guilty. A tremendous outburst of applause greeted the announcement, and it seemed to meet with the general approval of those in the audience in the court room. The attorney-general asked that the jury be polled and as each juror stood up in answer to his name he gave his verdict as not guilty. The judge thanked the jury and immediately discharged them.

Warmly Congratulated. A. T. LeBlanc, of Campbellton then moved that his client be discharged which was immediately done. St. Pierre was warmly congratulated by those adjacent to him and upon his discharge walked over to the jurors with his counsel and shook each by the hand. The judge ordered the court cleared but the spectators would not leave until they had shaken "Zam" by the hand and congratulated him on his acquittal. Several of his friends followed him into the jail while he obtained his belongings.

WERE NOT SWORN IN MEMBERS OF HOUSE

Candidates from Restigouche at Fredericton But Without Avail.

Fredericton, Mar. 17.—D. A. Stewart and Henry Diotte, the opposition candidates in Restigouche at the general elections last October, when they were first returned as elected, then a recount demanded, and finally a protest filed, appeared at noon today before Sir Douglas Hazen, Chief Justice of New Brunswick, and demanded that they be sworn in as members of the Legislature.

The appearance of Messrs. Stewart and Diotte was an unmistakable surprise, and when Hon. J. B. M. Baxter, leader of the opposition, demanded that they be sworn in and seated as members the first political gun of the session had been fired. Sir Douglas Hazen declared that he had been presented with a return by the Provincial Secretary showing the roll of members elected to the legislature, and that regarding Restigouche County it was stated the sheriff had made no return.

Hon. Mr. Baxter persisted that there had been a return made by the sheriff of Restigouche County showing Messrs. Stewart and Diotte elected and he again demanded that they be sworn in. Sir Douglas then ruled that if a return was presented to him showing Messrs. Stewart and Diotte elected he would have to allow them to be sworn in. Mr. Baxter called upon Hon. Dr. Hetherington to present the return, which, he said, had been sent by the sheriff, and which he said, he had seen himself in the government offices. The Provincial Secretary said he was acting under instructions from the Attorney General and Premier Foster took a hand. Messrs. Stewart and Diotte elected not sworn in, and as soon as the swearing in proceedings were completed, the opposition party went into caucus. When they adjourned Hon. Mr. Baxter said he was not in a position to make any statement as to what the next move would be with regard to the Restigouche situation, but he intimated that something further would be done later on.



GAPE COD AT LOW RATE

If Proper Service Given, Fish Could be Sold Reasonably At Quebec.

(Quebec Telegraph.)
Cod fish freshly caught on the Gaspe coast landed in Quebec at the price of four cents a pound is the attractive prospect of Mr. Charles Biard, of Percé, but—such a figure would be very welcome to all Quebec housewives will only be possible if and when the government makes possible the establishment of a refrigerator car service between Quebec and the Gaspe coast.

Disinfection

To kill any spores of common soap, and, to some extent, Rhizotonia the potatoes should be treated with a disinfectant. The safest to use is formalin, at the rate of a point of 50 gallons of water. The tubers are put in a bagged and then immersed for two hours.

Cutting the Sets

Experiments have proven quite clearly that the most economical way to use seed is to cut to sets weighing not less than one ounce and not more than two ounces, with from two to three eyes to the set. Cutting by a machine or a cutting board may be economical in large commercial operations, but as when using these the size of sets and number of eyes cannot be well regulated nor speed may not be good economy.

CARE OF SEED POTATOES AND PREPARATION FOR PLANTING

(Experimental Farms Note.)
Selection.
In arranging for the seed supply of tubers from one crop, the first steps should be taken during the growing season to get the seed from healthy, vigorous, large-yielding hills. When harvesting time comes these hills should be gathered separately from the rest of the crop. The tubers should be sun dried and all showing cuts, bruises or disease of any kind, thrown out. Such supply can then be kept for a seed area for the following season.

Storage

The best storage for maintaining vitality of seed tubers has not so far as the writer is aware, been absolutely determined. Seed from a dry cellar with temperature running from 40° to 50° has been, equally vigorous with that from a moist cellar at a temperature of 34 to 38, though, of course, there would be great loss of bulk and weight in the former case. Potatoes kept in pits with excess of moisture and minimum of ventilation have also given vigorous plants.

Forced Sprouting

For an early crop, it is common practice to take the seed tubers to a light room of about 60 degrees temperature by the 20th March, to give them four to six weeks to warm up, and sprout. A thick green sprout not more than a half inch long is wanted. The exact gain in growth from this treatment has not been determined. In one trial at the Experimental Station, Fredericton, the difference in growth is between seed so treated and seed taken immediately from the cellar, was very slight. Plants from the sprouted seed were only from two to three days


