MEETING OF THE TOWN COUNCIL

Police Resolution Declared Illegal, Other Matters Dealt With.

A meeting of the Town Council was held in the Firemen's Hall Monday evening, His Worship Mayor McKay presiding, Couns. Wallace, Patterson, Moores, Bisset, Chamberlain, St. Onge and Duncan were present.

The minutes of the previous regular and a special meeting were read and approved.

A communication from the School Board re taking a school census of the town was read and referred to the Education and Improvement committee for a report.

H. A. Carr, Town Solicitor, submitted a lengthy opinion as to the legality of the resolution passed recently defining the duties of the police. This stated clearly that the resolution was not a legal and proper one.

After considerable discussion, Coun. St. Onge moved that the matter be laid over until the next meeting so that councillors can have a chance to think the matter over.

Coun. Patterson moved in amendment that the question be dealt with at once.

The original motion passed on a vote of St. Onge, Wallace, Duncan and Chamberlain for and Moores, Bisset and Patterson against.

Applications were read from Frank M. Watson and Patrick H. Doyle for position of meter reader and collector of rates and taxes.—Laid on the table.

Wm. Brown and Mrs. Margaret Kerr wrote complaining of assessment for 1920. Referred to Assessment and Appeals Committee.

A petition from residents of Ward III asking for extension of Crown Avenue was read and referred to the Public Property and Streets Committee for a report.

Departmental accounts were ordered paid.

The Assessment and Appeals Committee reported recommending that those Henry be granted refund of poll tax, he being over sixty years of age and that Mrs. John Ward's assessment be reduced \$600.00, and that poll tax be struck off. Report received and adopted.

Coun. Bisset moved that the Town Clerk be authorized to get prices on or printing necessary forms for Electric Light department tabulating system.—Carried.

Coun. Duncan of the Finance Committee read draft of a bill to go to the legislature asking permission to issue \$10,000 bonds to pay off over draft on Fire Station. He moved that same be sent to legislature.—Carried.

Mrs. R. Barclay Gerrard, was given permission to address the Council in behalf of the W.C.T.U., on the matter of the resolution re policemen's duties passed at a recent meeting. She made a strong appeal for the rescinding of the motion and a rigid enforcement of the Prohibition Act.

Rev. Mr. Boothroy also spoke along the same lines.

Coun. Moores complained that the Councilors had no copy of the Town Bylaws and suggested that steps be taken to procure same, duly amended.

Coun. St. Onge moved that the matter of consolidation of Bylaws be left with the Bylaw and Legislation Committee, and report next meeting.—Carried.

Coun. Moores gave notice that at the next meeting he would move a resolution fixing the hour of adjournment for 11 o'clock.

Coun. Duncan requested that the appointment of the official to read meters and collect all rates and taxes be left over until the next meeting.

Coun. Moores spoke strongly against the men reading meters being stopped and moved that they be ordered to proceed with this work.

Coun. Duncan said that a permanent man would be chosen in a week.

Motion was lost.

Coun. Duncan asked what progress had been made in the auditing of the books and the preparing of the copy for the Annual Report.

The clerk reported that the work could be ready in a very short time.

Coun. Wallace moved that the Auditor be requested to submit his report for the next meeting.—Carried.

Coun. Wallace submitted deed of Hillside Street from Robt. L. Duncan together with an agreement in reference to same.

Coun. Bisset moved that deed be referred to the town solicitor for opinion as to its legality.—Carried.

The council then adjourned.

OBITUARY.
James Harquail.

In the death of James Harquail on Thursday, March 17th, Dalhousie has lost one of her oldest and most highly esteemed residents. Mr. Harquail was in his 78th year and up to within twelve days of his death enjoyed good health and took an active interest in public affairs.

Mr. Harquail was born in Dalhousie, his father, John Harquail, coming here from the Isle of Jersey about the year 1826, and was one of the first settlers in Dalhousie.

Being of a very kind and genial disposition he was loved and respected by all and many incidents are related of his kind and charitable acts. In his own family he was cherished and revered, receiving that deference and love which his long fruitful years dealt him a tribute to a truly good husband and father.

Fifty-seven years ago he married Mary Carroll of Cork, Ireland, who survives him, also real daughter, Rev. Sister Harquail and Rev. Sister Carroll of the Hotel Dieu, Campbellton, N. B.; Mrs. M. W. Doyle, Stephenson, Michigan; Mrs. E. E. Kean, Montreal; P. Q.; Mrs. J. H. Driscoll, St. John, N. B., and Helena at home; and John and David of J. & D. A. Harquail Co., Ltd., Campbellton; and twenty grandchildren.

All his family were at his bedside continually during the twelve days of his illness.

The funeral took place from the Church of St. John the Baptist, Saturday morning, the 19th instant, the requiem high mass being celebrated by Rev. Father Hart, assisted by the Rev. Father Lantegne of Athol.

The pall bearers were Messrs. W. A. R. Cragg, S. Blanchard, Charles Stewart, James Wright, G. E. Mercer and Thos. Dundon.

Cornelius McKinnay.

The death of Mr. Cornelius McKinnay occurred at the Belgrave Brothers Hospital, Montreal. Deceased had been ill for a few weeks and it was thought advisable to have him removed to Montreal to undergo an operation from which he never recovered.

He was 48 years of age and leaves to mourn his loss a large number of friends besides his father, Timothy McKinnay, four brothers, John of Toronto; Parnell, Montreal; James and Patrick at home and six sisters Mrs. Ed. Carr, Cleveland, Ohio; Mrs. S. Malouhney, Montreal; Mrs. Albert Berriault, McKinnay Hill; Mrs. Jos. Chules, Niagara Falls; Miss Nora, Cleveland, Ohio; Kate, nurse in training, Niagara Falls. The remains were brought from Montreal by his brother, Parnell, the funeral being held at Grand Pabos and was largely attended.

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seur, Englehart Deraiche, Forest, LeBlanc, Cyr, Castonguay, Levesque, and Henri voted for the amendment, Mayors Adams, Oatman, Hardy, Glover, Ahern and Chapados voting against, the majority being in favor of the amendment the same was declared carried and main motion lost.—Adopted.

Moved by Mayor Hardy, seconded by Mayor Adams that notice is given that at the next meeting of this Council, a County Prohibitory By-Law will come up for approval, and that the Secretary-Treasurer do publish all necessary notices in connection therewith.—Adopted.

Moved by Mayor S. M. Adams, seconded by Mayor Oatman, that the attention of the Honorable, the Minister of Public Works at Ottawa, be called to the present condition of the Interprovincial Bridge over the Restigouche River at Matapédia, and to the necessity of immediate painting of the said bridge for its proper preservation.

That since the construction of the bridge in question, some fifteen years or more ago, the same has never been attended to or painted.

That unless the said bridge be properly painted in the near future, the damage caused by the weather and rust will become almost irreparable.

That this Council of the County of Bonaventure do respectfully pray the said Honorable the Minister of Public Works to take this their Resolution unanimously adopted in full session, into his kind consideration, and that he may deem it expedient to adopt immediate measures to have the said repairs and painting done to the said bridge.

Further Resolved that a copy of this present Resolution be forthwith transmitted to the said Honorable the Minister of Public Works at Ottawa.—Unanimously Adopted.

Moved by Mayor S. M. Adams, seconded by Mayor Poirier, that the attention of the Honorable Prime Minister of Quebec, be called to two previous resolutions passed and adopted on the 10th day of September, 1919, relating to the building and repairing of the High Way Road through the Matapédia Valley, from Bonaventure on the West, to Matapédia on the East, and from Matapédia to Cross Point, in the said County of Bonaventure.

That the said County Council deem that the construction opening up, and repairing of the said road is an absolute necessity, and of great urgency for the public in general, and the inhabitants of the said County in particular, to enable all to have free communication from one part of the County to the other, and to link up and give free ingress and egress to the same with the remaining parts of the Province of Quebec.

That the said road moreover is an absolute necessity, and one without which no communication whatever, as hereinabove stated, can be had.

That this County Council of the County of Bonaventure respectfully pray the said Honorable the Prime Minister of Quebec to take this their Resolution, adopted and passed unanimously at their present meeting, into his kind consideration, and that he may deem it expedient to adopt the necessary measures, for the reason as hereinabove mentioned, to effect the construction, opening up, and maintenance of the said High Way, at the earliest opportunity, in view of the immediate urgency and necessity of the same.

Further Resolved that copies of this present Resolution be forthwith transmitted to the Honorable E. A. Taché, K.C.M.P. Prime Minister of Quebec, Hon. John Hall Kelly, K.C.M.L.C. and J. F. Bujeaud Esq., M.L.A.—Unanimously Adopted.

A bill for damages in connection with an accident which happened to Mr. Adams at Glen Emma last spring, being placed before the Council, Mayor Adams of Matapédia was authorized to interview Mr. Adams, so as to get further information regarding same.

OF MURDER CHARGEJury Out Less Than One Hour—
Mr. LeBlanc Warmly
Congratulated.Edmundton, March 17.—It took the
jurymen less than one hour today to
lift the stigma of murder from Wil-
liam St. Pierre, the young man who
has been on trial here for his life on

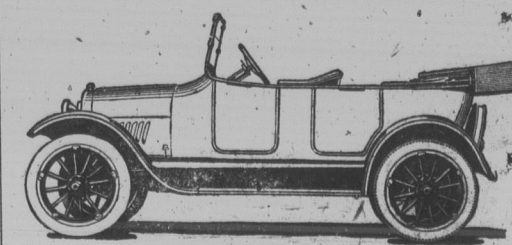
