BAPTISM.—Rev. R. Brocken baptised five persons in the Methodist church at Upper Sackville last Sunday.

A PRETTY PET.—Capt. Anderson, of the bark Siddartha, now in port at St. John, has on board the vessel a very pretty young deer, beautifully spotted. He brought it from Trinidad.

HIGH PRAISE.—Nova Scotia papers speak in remarkably high terms of the Boston Ideal Concert Co., which gives a Matinee in Lingley Hall this afternoon and a concert in Music Hall this evening.

GASPERAUX.—Thousands of gasperaux were caught last Saturday night in Mill Creek about a mile from Moncton. The fish were never known to go so far up the river before. They appear to be unusually plentiful this season.

SUICIDE.—Willis Welling, of Shelburne, Cape Breton, committed suicide last Thursday morning by cutting his throat with a scythe. He had been in poor health for some time and had spoken of killing himself, but no notice appears to have been taken of the threat. He was 38 years old and unmarried.

ARBON DAY was generally observed by the schools in this County and the result is that the school grounds have been cleaned up and put in good order. In many districts ornamental trees were planted—in some cases to take the place of those that have objected to been destroyed. If the object has been achieved, the day is merely to plant trees, the present system works well, but if the intention is to beautify the school grounds, some plan should be adopted to protect the trees after they are planted.

Several hundred copies of the County District No. 9, the pupils greatly improved the appearance of the school rooms by adorning the walls with pictures.

AROUND TOWN.

—The Londonderry Iron Company now employs 600 men.

—Dr. H. H. Coleman arrived here last Thursday and has commenced practicing his profession.

—Mr. Wood, M. P., arrived home from Ottawa yesterday. Senator Botsford arrived home this morning.

—The best way to celebrate the Queen's Birthday is to attend the concert by the Boston Ideal Concert Co.

Several wagon loads of traveling tinkers, generally call gypsies, passed through Sackville yesterday, going east.

—Rev. Dr. Stewart left for England Monday evening via Rimouski. He is not expected to return till September.

—The N. Y. Freestone Quarrying Co., are about shipping a quantity of stone by rail to Chicago. It will be brought to the landing by scows.

—Mr. Geo. E. Ford celebrates the Queen's birthday by displaying a large and handsome sign-board bearing the legend "Victoria House." It was painted by Messrs. Wry.

—Mr. H. J. McGrath, as will be seen by advertisement elsewhere, has opened an office at Dorchester for the sale of granite monuments.

Mr. McGrath understands the business thoroughly and will no doubt make it successful.

—Signor Bosco gave two amusing interesting entertainments in Music Hall last Tuesday and Friday evenings. He was ably assisted by Prof. Dean, who gave excellent exhibitions of ventriloquism, which proved very much provoking.

—J. Hamilton, Port Elgin, sold to Thomas Casey, last week, a lot of seventy feet of front of the Port Elgin river, for thirty-five dollars; the adjoining fifteen hundred feet similarly situated he will sell in lots to suit purchasers, and on as favorable terms. Would be a choice location for establishing a wooden factory or other factory, having shipyard advantages by water and by railway.

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GENERAL NEWS.

—Three men named Feeney, McQuade and Cole were drowned on Wednesday last week by the steamer "W. A. Scott" of the Aroostook. They were engaged on the Hagerman drive.

—Three cars of the Butoche and Moncton railway train derailed at Mill Creek bridge, about a mile from Moncton Saturday afternoon. The cars ran on to the bridge and the whole train had a narrow escape. Men worked all day Sunday clearing the track.

—A singular incident happened on the road leading from Albany to Lake Umbagog last week. A large moose was found under a tree, the tree was completely shattered by lightning, and there can be no doubt but that the moose met his death in that way.—Liverpool Times.

—A very serious accident occurred Saturday afternoon at the works of the Old Sydney coal mines. As two men were coming out of the pit one of the cages with empty tubs was descending the shaft and these men were caught in the cage. Neil McKinnon was killed and John McCallan very badly cut and bruised, but it is thought he will recover.

—The steamer William, purchased in England by Messrs. D. Farquharson and R. McMillan, of Charlottetown, P. E. I., was chartered at that port and is now in the carrying trade, and will now load potatoes for the New York market.

—On Thursday morning last, Mr. C. A. McKinnon, of Kennington, P. E. I., a well known dealer, respectively, was not so well authenticated. Mr. Knight is an adept in aquatic sports, in which he has been an active participant.—St. John News.

—Says the Charlottetown Examiner: Last night there was received from the dead letter office a letter which was posted at Charlottetown on August 13, 1875, nearly thirteen years ago, which has ever since remained in the dead letter office. It bears the Charlottetown post office stamp of August 13th, 1875, and that of its destination, St. John, N. B., of the day of posting, and has probably remained at the latter place until the showing of the next date, being May 7, 1888. Its dispatch from Ottawa shows the impression May 15, 1888.

PRIZE MEDAL.—The silver medal presented by Mr. W. Wood, M. P., to the Sackville Rifle Club, of which mention was made last fall, has been received and will be competed for to-day. The design is very chaste and appropriate—the medal being in the form of an eight-pointed star.

The centre represents a target and is surrounded by a gold wreath, with crossed rifles in the rear, and on each point of the star is a minute gold cartridge. The reverse bears the following inscription: "Presented to the Sackville Rifle Club by J. W. Wood, M. P., 1887."

The clasp is a representation of crossed flags and a pair of bayonets.
