



me Corrections to Mayor Fenety's article in the Trade Review.

Sin—I have read Mayor Fenety's article in the Trade Review, and find he is mistaken in some of his remarks regarding the great five in Fredericton on the 7th of Oct. 1825. At the time, I was going to school in a building belonging to the military department, situated on the ground now occupied by the Wilson, Wiley and Colter brick buildings. The school was taught by Dr. Shelton. The alarm of fire was given about three clock in the afternoon. The school was diminised, and the scholars who belenged to the upper end of the city tried to go up Queen street, but could not do so, and had to go down and up the bank of the river to get home. Your correspondent was one of them who had to go home that way. The fire caught in the barn belonging to Jarvis Ring, near where Cooper & Pinder's carriage factory now stand, The wind was blowing a heavy gale directly towards the river; the fire following the course of the wind. It went down the west side of King street till stopped by the brick building belonging to Whiffield Hart, now known as Hume's Hotel. It swept both sides of York street. There was an open lot between York street. There was an open lot between York street and Wilmot's Alley, in which Peters & Wilmot were doing a very large business, the old school house and Mark Needbam's store next below the Alley, but was stopped at the building now occupied by Sisson Nealis as a five and ten cent store.
