# Closing of Roads

The attention of the public is respectfully called to an Act to amend Chapter 77 of the Revised Statutes of 1923 of "The Load of Vehicles Act," passed the 9th day of April, 1924, A. D.

Be it enocted by the Governor, Council and Assembly as fol-

1. Section 7 of Chapter 77 of the Revised Statutes, 1923, the "Load of Vehicles Act", is repealed and the following substituted therefor:

7. (1) No person shall operate a motor vehicle that is subject to the provisions of the Motor Vehicle Act on any highway in any municipality after the first day of March and before the first day of June following without the permission of the Superintendent of Highways or of such other officer as may be appointed by the Pro-

vincial Highways Board for that purpose first had and obtained. (2) The Provincial Highways Board from time to time in each year may, and is hereby authorized and empowered with the approval of the Ministers of Highways, to exempt from the provisions of Sub-section 1 of this section, for the whole or any part of the period between the first day of March and the first day of June following in the year and for which the exemption is granted, every person operating any motor vehicle or a motor vehicle of any particular class that is subject to the provisions of the Motor Vehicle Act, on all highways within any municipality or municipalities which highways in the opinion of the Provincial Highways Board will not be unreasonably damaged by reason of the granting of such ex-

## Nineteenth Cable Under Atlantic Has Just Been Completed by the Western Union Telegraph Co.

FIRST OF ITS TYPE TO BE LAID

Called a "Permalloy" Cable—Represents Investment of Five Million
Dollars—Great Speed is Attained—
Possible Cable Rates Will be

Greenwich, England by the same company that made the first Atlantic cable to operate successfully, which was laid in 1866. In some places the cable lies in water three miles deep.

A new trans-Atlantic cable has just been completed by the Western Union Telegraph Co., and will be opened for business. This makes the nineteenth cable working under the Atlantic between North America and Europe, and is the first cable to land in Southern Europe, and is the first cable to land in Southern Europe, which in the past has had to be relayed in England or Ireland, thus saving considerable time in transit.

The new cable is what is known as a "Permalloy" cable, and is the first of its type to be laid. The copper core which carries the current, consists of seven strands and around it is wrapped a ribbon of permalloy. This latter is the most highly magnetic material known to science, having more than thirty times the permalloy is the gutta—percha insulation and eighteen galvanized steel sheathing wires for strength. Heretofore this printing mechanism has been used on land lines only.

This speed is by no means the finit, for after a few at histments on the receiving apparatus the speed

cautions were taken in the case of the new cable one was to carry a ground wire in a cable, one hundred miles out to sea, this serves as the ground connection of the new cable. This has liminated the difficulty experienced in the past of the cables being affected by disturbances caused by electrical power systems and atmospheric sources, from which stray currents are readily picked up by the very delicate machinery necessary to work the cables at high speed.


