## CORRESPONDENCE

Editor Black:

The letter of Mr. John N. Chute published in your issue of Dec. 4th, was a most interesting one. His suggestion that the best cure for the exodus from the Annapolis Valley, is to be found in the extension of the orchard area, is well worth considering.

It seems to me that this suggestion might be of particular value in the district between Kingston and Bridgetown, where there is so much unused land.

In conversation the other day, with Inspector Vroom, I asked him if it would not add much to the value and prosperity of the farms in the district named, if a large number of apple trees were set next spring. His answer was, "Yes" providing that three conditions are observed."

Mr. Vroom's conditions were these: First, that the proper varieties are set; second, that no trees be set except on suitable soil; and third, that no person set more trees than he

will care for.

My next question was: "What do you consider the six best varieties for the Annapolis Valley?" He replied: "In order of merit, I would name the Macintosh Red, Golden Russet, Northern Spy, Wagener, Gravenstein, and Cox's Orange Pippin." The last named, Mr. Vroom would not set, but would obtain by grafting scions into some other healthy apple tree.

The question of variety, seemed to me so important, that I interviewed half a dozen other leading fruit men of this vicinity. It might interest your readers, Mr. Editor, to have their opinions. Mr. G. N. Rough said: "In setting trees, one must bear in mind that some varieties of apples do better on a light or medium soil, while others do best on heavy land." The best six varieties for setting he considered to be the following: Macintosh Red, Golden Russet, Spy, Gravenstein, Cox's Pippin, and Delicious.

Mr. Harland Forsythe named as the five most profitable varieties: Baldwin, Wagener, Gravenstein,

Bramley Seedling and the Stark. Mr. W. H. Starr said: "For setting trees on clay soil, my first two varieties would be Baldwins and Golden Russets; if on sandy soil, Spies and Wageners." These he would follow with Kings, Gravensteins, Macintosh Red and Cox's Pippin.

Mr. F. M. Munroe gave as his choice: Golden Russet, Gravenstein, Spy, Gano, Wealthy, Delicious, Wine-sap and Roman Beauty.

Mr. Handley Wheelock said: "If you have loamy soil, set Cox's Orange Pippins, Kings and Spys, with Ben Davis as fillers; if you have rich soil and intend to use lots of fertilizer set Golden Russet."

Mr. E. O. Wood emphasized the importance of giving the variety of apple the soil it required. His best half-dozen varieties in order of merit are: Gano, Golden Russet, Cox's Pippin, Spy, Baldwin and the Gravenstein.

Hoping, Mr. Editor, that these suggestions may be of some help in solving the "Exodus" problem, I am,

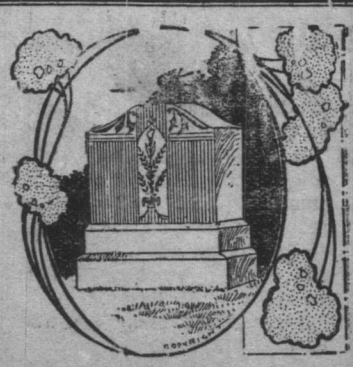

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### A Tax on Mail Order Houses

It has frequently been suggested that mail order houses should be compelled to pay a tax into the treasuries of the districts in which their business originates. This subject comes to the fore again owing to the consideration being given by Parliament legislation to curb Transient Traders and also because of the Parliamentary Inquiry into conditions surrounding farm life in Canada. It is understood that when the Members of Parliament were informed of the vast amount of business done by the mail order business and the harm this does to the smaller cities and towns, several of them expressed themselves as being in favor of a tax that would be paid to the localities affected.

The result of mail order competition is worthy of the earnest consideration of the Parliamentary Committee on Agricultural Conditions in Canada. It is admitted that one of the biggest drawbacks to farm life is that the farmer cannot induce his children to stay on the farm. Life in the farming districts cannot compete in interest with city life. What is the reason for this? Largely because the community centres in rural districts are dull and uninteresting places. And why is this? Because they have not got live, up-to-date stores and the attractions that go with a prosperous community. They lack these attractions because they cannot afford them because fifty per cent, or more of the money spent by the residents of the districts goes to the mail order houses and the community gets no benefit from it. Prosperous retail stores are the first essential of a bright progressive community and these cannot exist because of mail order competition.

Conditions would be improved somewhat if the mail order houses were taxed for the benefit of the communities in which their business originates. The tax money could be applied towards making these communities better places to live in and the tax would place the local stores in a better position to compete with the mail order houses.

The 1st of July celebration added over a hundred dollars to our bank account as we served meals on a 60-40 basis with the Athletic Association. More money was expended for supplies. We called for a Hospital Donation Day on Oct. 8th, which greatly added to the table and bed linen, dish closet, jam closet and vegetable cellar, besides the many articles that did not come under any of those heads.

We have voted \$25.00 to the Inter-Provincial Home for Girls at Moncton which we are now collecting to pay off. We were entertained most pleasantly, one afternoon at the home of Mrs. Foss, Wilmot, while a pleasant and profitable evening was spent listening to Miss Miller, Miss Brown and Miss McDougall.

We have twice served tea in our hall and enjoyed the relaxation. We now have a membership list of 60 which is most encouraging. We hope for even a livelier interest and greater work next year and hope not to be disappointed.

And 2nd: Cause to be printed upon the package containing such insecticides and fungicides a guaranteed analysis showing the percentage of active ingredients and also the percentage of any materials that might cause injury.
