Mrs. J. W. Robinson, of Chicago, told the correspondent of the International Telegram Company the story of her experience on the drifting steamship. She said:

"When the shalt broke I was sleeping in my state room. I was aroused by a crash; then felt a heavy shock, which almost threw me from my berth. I knew that something scrious had happened. I got up immediately, dressed as fast as I could, and ran into the corridor, where I found the rest of the passengers frightened and huddled together. When we learned the cause of the trouble none of us realized the danger we were in. When we got on the deck, however, we saw a frightful scene. Hundreds were struggling for life preservers, shouting or greaning or danger we were in. When we got on the deck, however, we saw a frightful scene. Hundreds were struggling for life preservers, shouting or groaning or running about as if crazy. The preparations to lower the boats increased their terror. For two days and nights we were tossed about and drifted away from our course. We did not go to bed either on Saturday or Sunday nights. The sea was terrific. The ship rolled so that we had to chig to tables or chairs to prevent being dashed to the floor or against the partitions. A German lady, who tried to leave the cabin when the sea was at its worst, was thrown against a pillar so violently that she broke her arm. The surgeon set it with the greatest difficulty, as it was almost impossible to remain quiet even in one's berth. The suicide of the young man from Vienna depressed us all. He was wealthy and was engaged to marry a Viennese young lady. Four women in the second cabin became temporarily insame from anxiety and lack of siep."

Miss M. L. Merriman, of Boston, was ill in bed at the time of the accident; in fact, too ill to realize her danger. She was nearly thrown on the floor by the shock. She dressed herself slowly and was one of the last to get on deck. "I never before saw such a scene," he said. "The ship was at the mercy of the sea, and the waves were dashing up on the decks. The passengers were huddled together in the passang ways or on the stairs, or were running about as best they could on deck. Most of them had been calmed by the time I got upstairs, but the faces of all were white with terror. We had a terrible Sunday morning. The seas was worse than I had ever seen it. We feared that the bulkheads would not hold out, and at night had become so frightened that we would not go to be do, but lay down in the companion way." IN THE HIGHEST DEGREE PAVORABLE.

There never has been a time in our history when work was so abundant or when wages were as high, whether measured by the manner in which they are paid or by their power to supply the necessaries and comforts of life. It is true that the market prices of cotton and wheat have been low. It is one of the unfavorable incidents or agriculture that the farmer cannot produce upon orders. He must mow and reap in ignorance of the total production of the year. I believe that the protective system which has now for something more than 30 years continuously prevailed in our legislature has been a mighty instrument for the development of our national wealth and a most powerful agency in protecting the homes of our workingmen from the invasion of want. It is not my purpose to renew here the argument in favor of a protective tariff. The result of the recent election must be accepted as having introduced

A NEW POLICY.

We must assume that the present tariff constructed upon the lines of protection is to be repealed and that there is to be substituted for it a tariff law constructed solely with reference to revenue; that no duty is to be higher because the increases will keep open an American mill or keep up the wages of an American workman, but that in every case such a rate of duty is to be imposed as will bring to the treasury of the United States the largest returns of revenue. The contention has not been between schedules but between principles, and it would be offensive to suggest that the prevailing party will not carry in legislation the principles advocated by it and the pledges given to the people. The tariff bills passed by the House of Representatives at the last session were, as I suppose, even in the opinion of their promoters, inadequate, and justified only by the fact that the Senate and that a general revision could not therefore be undertaken. ## BARNACLES AND SHIP WORMS.

BARNACLES AND SHIP-WORMS.
Col. William Ludlow Tells About These Eated Pesis.

"Yes, water is a great preservative of wood, so long as it remains beneath the surface," said Col. William Ludlow yesterday, "but take it out and leave if exposed to the air and it quickly rots. Wooden vessels on fresh water are pecularly favored over those on the occan, in that he ship-worm and barnacle are unkined to the lakes. One great difficulty with which Government engineers have treated with in the coast region south from Delaware Bay is the ship-worm, which makes punk of solid timbers placed below water unless proper metal sheathing it placed over them. It is purely an aquatic. Born in the water in the form of a very diminutive pin worm it enters a stick of timber, boring clear to the center. EGGS.

It is now conceded that the British mar ket has not taken the place for eggs occupied by the United States prior to the increase of the duty to 5 cents dozen. Last year less than 1,500,-000 dozens were marketed in Britain -not a few of the consignments, after paying all liabilities, being disposed of at a loss. That is 400,000 dozen less than were sent from Canada to Britain in 1890. For ourselves, we desire to have Canadians enjoy both markets as freely as they possibly can be made. Great Britain now takes all that we can send and charges us no duty on them. The United States, as a result of the restric-tions of trade on both sides of the border, taxes our commerce the moment it reaches her border. How eggs are affected by this taxation can be seen by a reference to the market reports. The best eggs sold in London market at from 20c to 23c on Saturday. In New York the best eggs sold at from 26c to 28c. The country needs a change, if it is possible to get it. We need an all-round reduction of taxation both on exports and imports.

CANADA AND THE STATES.
In the present United States Senate the Republicans have six majority over both Democrats and Populists, but the new Senate, after March 4 next, will be Democratic. The Democrats have gained one in New York, one in Wisconsin, one in Monana; and Kyle, Farmers' Alliance, from South Dakota, has announced that he will act with the Democrats, and thus the Democrats will have a clear majority in the Senate over all parties and combinations. The casting vote of Vice-President Stevenson is not needed for this purpose. New Mexico and Arizona will be admitted, and as these are Democratic States, the Democrats will have six majority to carry any measure they desire. Their majority in the House of Representatives is between 80 and 90. As to the policy of the Democratic party towards the present Government at Ottawa, the New York Sun, which should know, asserts that it will not differ from that pur sued by the Republican Administration. If we are to have any reciprocity in trade, the Sun tells us that it must be wholesale In the Sun's opinion the very best thing that Canada can do is to unite her fortunes with the United States and receive all the benefits of union. Leaving speculative propositions like these aside, however, the important point that is emphasized by these semi-official declarations from the other side is that the present Administration at Ottawa has succeeded in making itself thoroughly despised by both political parties at Washington, and it is made evident that while it holds sway no arrangement that will be satisfactory to the Canadian people will be arrived at.

CHARGED WITH HERESY.

The Actual Trial of Dr. Briggs at Last
Begun.

New York, Dec. 5.—The actual trial of
Dr. Briggs was begun here to day. Col.
McCook, of the prosecuting committee,
read extracts from the second edition of
Dr. Briggs, inaugural address and introduced in evidence the Confession of Faith,
the Bible, the catechisms and other docuthe Bible, the catechisms and other docu-ments to be used during the hearing. Then Dr. Briggs read a statement telling what he had to present against the evidence of the prosecution. He offered in evidence the Holy Scriptures and the standards of the Presbyterian Church, from which he quoted at length.

Dr. Briggs declared that he did not be-

lieve in purgatory according to the teachings of the Catholic Church. He also rejected the Armenian doctrine of sanctifica-

jected the Armenian doctrine of sanctification after death. He did believe, however, in a middle state, for the Bible, he said, did not teach that a man was sanctified immediately after death.

In speaking of the divine and human authority of the Bible Dr. Briggs said: "The Bible is the word of God, and its authority is the divine authority that determines the life and fath of man. Biblical scholars have been long held in bondage to ecclesiasticism and dogmatism, but modern Biblical criticism has won the battle of freedom. On all sides it is asked not what do the creeds teach, what do the thologians do the creeds teach, what do the thologians say, what is the authority of the church but what does the Bible itself teach us? Dr. Briggs occupied nearly all the after-noon in reading his paper.

The hot embers from his pipe set the excelsior on fire, and Monahan beat a hasty retreat.

At the door he was met by Officer Thompson, who had smelled the smcke and was preparing to investigate. To him Monahan confessed that he had accidentally fired the building.

The top floor was occupied by Michael Doyle and his family of ten. Their escape was cut off by the stairs, and Mr. Doyle, standing at one of the front windows, cried aloud for help. The officers, who were still on band, told him to throw the children down and they would catch them in their coats. One after another the little ones were lifted clear of the window and sent down to safety below. Then his wife followed him, but by this time the flames were surrounding Doyle, and he announced that he would jump from a rear window. This he did without waiting for any assistance. His body struck a clothes-line and then landed in the yard. Those who ran to pick him up found that he was dead, his neck having been broken.

The only one of his children who was injured was Willie, aged 4, who was overcome by snoke before his father threw him into the arms of the policemen. Willie is at the Eastern District Hospital and he may die.
