Anybody," says:
"In his highly illuminating statement made to Lieutenant-Commander Walter R. Gerhardi, the American naval attache at Berlin, Admiral Behncke, speaking for the German admiralty, lays bare the reason for the German Government's effort to make the United States pull its 'hot chestnuts' from the fire that is blaz-

ng in Europe. Germans Starving. " 'The shutting off of food supplies has now come to the point where Germany no longer has sufficient food to feed her people,' says Ad-miral Behncke. 'Germany,' he further explains, 'is in a position where her life depends upon her putting into effect the only means saving herself. This is said in dence of the threatened subr blockade to starve Great Britain.

With what Germany may be able to do to her enemies, the United States Government can have only academic concern. There can be no direct issue between the United States and Germany, unless Germany goes to the length of sinking merchant vessels of the United States or of taking American lives. Against the threat to do these things the United States has very properly and very positively entered its protest and sounded a note of

solemn warning. Would Drag in U. S. A. "The German Government has apparently taken this warning to heart. It now comes forward with a somewhat modified threat-this time that it will unloose the torpedoes of its submarines against merchant ships unless the United States forces Great to permit foodstuffs to go to Germany.

Fatuous Diplomacy. "It is another stupid move of Germany's fatuous diplomacy. American neutrality is not going to be disturbed by it-nor by any of Germany's threats, no matter what form these may take.

"The United States is not going to be 'made a monkey of' by anybody, least of all by Germany. It is in the hands of the German people to put a stop to the war which Gernany began. It is for them to say whether they prefer peace or the alternative suggested by Admiral Behncke-starvation."

SAYS TURKS PREPARED

Will Carry Through War, Which He Insists Is Holy War.

Constantinople, Feb. 17, via London, 12:52 p.m.-Turkey declared war with out urging by Germany, or impelled by any other influences save those of the empire; she engaged in military operalons only when actions on the part of Russia and Great Britain made defen sive measures necessary, and Turkey has taken all steps needful to carry the war through. "On land and sea alike the Russians and the British provoked hostilities," Talaat Bay declared. "Our action finally was the result of efforts to bottle up our fleet by mining the entrance to the

Germany Will Open "War Zone" Warfare as This

London, Feb. 17.—At the stroke of hidnight the waters surrounding the oasts of the United Kingdom will beome, so far as lies within the power of Germany to make them, a war zone

will penetrate at their peril.

Some of the services across the Channel probably will be curtailed, but a majority of the neutral shipping lines will accept the risk and continue their sailings. The names and nationality of the vessels and the flags of their nations will be painted on their sides in the hope that German submarines will not sink them by mistake.

THE statements of Chancellor Lloyd George and the Hon. Winston Churchill in the British Commons Monday should banish any doubts as to the ability of Great Britain and her allies to carry on the war at top speed for an indefinite period. If in the final analysis the war is to be won by the nations with the best filled war chests then ultimate triumph is assured for the Allies. Great Britain and France are today the two wealthiest countries of the old world and according to Lloyd George the former can carry along the huge expenditure for five years and the latter THE REAL "EMERGENCY." for three years without seriousously crippling their financial resources. With Germany it is quite otherwise. In preparing for this war Germany had planned to finance it with the firm belief that it would be a swift triumph for her arms. Now that she faces a prolonged struggle she will be quickly drained of her cash.

It is pretty well understood that Germany is financing the semi-collapsed Austria, and certainly the bankrupt How long the Kaiser's pocket book can stand the strain it is not possible to say, but assuredly the Allies are not handicapped as is the Hohenzollern in the matter of sinews

Another important point brought out by Lloyd George's statement is that the Allies are sticking together. The conference of the three powers at Paris has resulted in an unbreakable determination to see the matter through with an unbroken front. Undoubtedly Germany has hoped to isolate at least one member of the original pact. 





> [Canadian Press.] BERLIN, Feb. 16.—(Wireless to Sayrille)-Admiral Behncke, of the marine lepartment, has made a statement to Lieutenant Commander Gherardi, navai attache of the American embassy at Berlin, which is given out officially as the best exposition of the situation with respect to Germany's declaration of the waters around the British Isles as a war zone. Admiral Behncke's statement follows: "Up to the present time Germany, in he war at sea, has followed the Lon-

don declaration or the stipulations of the Paris treaty, on which the conduct of war on the sea had been based before the London declaration. "In waging this commercial warfare Britain had in view the subjugation of Germany by starvation. Germany had in every way sought to bring the attention of the neutral powers and all

others to the necessity she was under to obtain food for her civilian population, which was her right under the laws of war. No results could be obtained from her efforts. Not Enough Food.

"Since the shutting off of food supplies had now come to a point where Germany had no longer sufficient food to feed her people, it became necessary yous, undeveloped men and for her to bring Britain to terms by the exercise of force. Germany knows that by the use of the submarine, Brit-ain can be placed in a position where food will be lacking. She has the submarine force with which to do it; her life as a nation and the lives of her people depend upon her putting this campaign into action, and she must do so.

'Blockade" Last Attempt To British Drop Bombs On Gun Mounts and Supply Trains, While French Airmen Attack Aerodrome and Keep Enemy From Meeting British.

[Canadian Press.]

LONDON, Feb. 16 .- 11:50 p.m. - The air wing of the British navy today made another massed attack on the German positions along the Belgian coast in an effort to destroy or damage the submarine base at Zeebrugge, the guns at Ostend and Middelkerke, and the aerodrome at Chistelles.

According to the official report, good results were attained. Forty machines were utilized today, as compared with 34 in last week's attack.

OFFICIAL STATEMENT.

The official statement concerning the air raid

says: 'The air operations of the naval wing against the Bruges. Ostend and Zeebrugge districts were continued this afternoon. Forty aeroplanes and seaplanes bombarded Ostend, Middelkerke, Ghistelles and Zeebrugge.

"Bombs were dropped on the heavy batteries situated on the east and west side of Ostend, on gun positions at Middelkerke, on transport wagons on the Ostend-Ghistelles road, on the mole at Zeebrugge to widen the breach damaged in former attacks, on the locks at Zeebrugge, on barges outside Blankenberghe and on trawlers outside Zeebrugge

Eight French aeroplanes assisted the naval machines by making vigorous attacks on the Ghistelles aerodrome, thus effectively preventing German air craft from cutting off our machines. It is reported that good results were obtained.

'Instructions are always issued to confine attacks to points of military importance, and every effort is made by the flying officers to avoid dropping bombs on any residential portions of towns."

GERMANS HELPLESS. While the British airmen were dropping their bombs on the gun positions, the supply trains and barges and the trawlers used in mine-laying and mine-sweeping operations, eight French airmen attacked the Ghistelles aerodrome, thus preventing the German airmen from making any attempt to cut off the British machines.

The official report makes no mention of the airmen engaged, so it is presumed that they all returned safely. The day was bright and clear, conditions being more favorable than last week for a raid.

Magnificent Set of Men: Have Done Excellent Work.

WHY PROGRESS IS SLOW

Valuable Point Secured At LaBassee With Severe Losses to Enemy.

LONDON, Feb. 16 .- 5:40 p.m .- The first of the bi-weekly communications from Sir John French, commander-inchief of the British army in the field, for which the war office arranged as a concession to the public demand for more news concerning the progress of the war, was made public by the official information bureau today. It is as follows: "Since our successes near La Bassee

at the beginning of last week, there has been less activity in that area. We nevertheless made further progress in this quarter, and on the 13th a valuable point was secured with loss. "We have consolicated our hold on the ground gained, and conclusive evidence has been obtained that the enemy's losses in the recent fighting thereabouts have been severe. Lost Ground Recovered.

"In the Ypres district the enemy attacked our line on the 14th and succeeded at first in gaining possession of a few trenches. Counter-attacks were made by us and the ground lost was recovered, some prisoners being cap-

Direct hits have in several instances been secured on the enemy's guns, and much damage has been done to his defences. 

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
