





Grain-Oats are higher in price, at \$1 30 to \$1 33 per cwt-44 1-5c to 45 1-5c per bu; the supply of oats is exceedingly small, and there is practically nothing doing in barley or wheat, there being only an occasional load offered.

Hay and Straw-Hay was a drug last but so far this week there have been only about a dozen loads offered; sales as a consequence are brisk and prices are higher, from \$13 to \$14 per ton. There are not many loads of straw offering, and prices are steady at \$6 per ton.


