

The Lessons of Togo's Victory.

Naval experts are searching for the lessons of Togo's victory, but the task is not made easier by the modest brevity of Togo's dispatches. It was the first great naval engagement under modern conditions, in which every species of fighting craft-battleships, cruisers, destroyers, torpedoes and, it is said, submarines-was employed on both sides, and in which the opposing fleets were on something like even terms. It was the battle for which the world has been waiting to solve theories of naval warfare, which have never been put to an adequate test.

The decisive part played by Japanese tornedo boats in the operations off Port Arthur discredited the battleship in the eyes of a school of critics, who declared that the trend of naval architecture must be toward a smaller type of vessel, sacrificing weight of guns and armor to mobility and speed. The champions of the battleship claim it has been vindicated by the battle of the Sea of Japan, as Togo desires it shall be called. Among these is Captain Mahan, the foremost living writer on naval tactics and the author of that great work, "The Influence of Sea Power Upon History." All accounts of the battle agree that during the first day the heavy Japanese guns reduced most of the Russian battle- of the hammock. ships and cruisers to impotence before the torpedoes were brought into

"The torpedo boats," says Captain Mahan, in Collier's Weekly, "are still the cavalry of the sea, rounding up and completing the destruction of a foe already decisively routed. MEXICO COLONY

Will Build Seven Cities in Southern Republic.

WATER FARMS FROM VOLCANOES

No Hogs, No Mules, No Whisky, No Oysters WIII Be Permitted in the Cities.

El Paso, Texas, June 18. - No hogs We want popular verbs for several 1100 mules, no oysters, no whisky, but more or less of everything else, is a brief statement of the principles that are to govern John Alexander Dowie's colonization scheme in the State of Tamaulipas, Mexico.

The hog, says Dowie is the scaven fact, something like the man without a country. And as for liquor of the kind that cheers and simultaneously inebriates, John Alexander says it is

bad for any country. Therefore mules, hogs, oysters and whisky are barred from the precincts of the Dowie colony.

Dowie's colonization plans have a satisfying vastness about them. This queer old man seems to have hypnotized the Mexican Government into granting him more valuable concessions than any other individual has ever acquired. He is on close terms with President Diaz, and from one end of Mexico to the other he is hailed as

Briefly summarized, Dowie's plans include the building of seven cities, the construction of a network of railroads. the irrigation of an extensive region by a peculiar method, and the general development of 2,000,000 acres of land. The chief city will be called Eden, and it is to be built first. No attempt will be made to start the other six cities until after Eden is fully established. Various experiments in city building will be made during the early days of Eden, and when comparative perfection has been reached Eden will be taken as a model from which to pattern the other six cities. So far as possible, without conflicting with the Mexican Government




