

Commenting on the new Canadian eustoms tariff introduced in the Dominion House by Finance Minister Fielding, the Buffalo Commercial (Republican) editorially says: "So far as the Canadian tariff affects American interests it may be said to be 'as you like it'-to the extent of a ten per cent; discount. It is a little early yet to determine how far this option is likely to operate in creating sentiment in this country in favor of a reciprocity treaty with Canada. The subject is not likely to be revived in a separate form in the near future, but to be considered in the general tariff enquiry that it is sure come, soon or late-probably

The Evening Times (Democrat) says: "The new customs tariff measure now before the Dominion Parliament provides for a British preferential tariff tending to increase trade with the mother country, which is the natural thing for the Canadians to seek a general tariff which is applicable to all countries not entitled to the preferential tariff and an intermediate tariff not applied to any country at present, but a standing offer to other countries which may enter into negotiations for reciprocal concessions in trade. The intermediate rates are about ten per

intermediate rates are about ten per cent. less than the general tariff.

"Thus the way is left open for the United States to establish closer trade relations with Canada, an opportunity which should be taken advantage of."

MORE SAN JOSE SCALE.

To the Editor of The Planet:

Sir,—I am afraid the public will tire of reading my letters in relation to the San Jose Scale and its extermination, but I am enthusiastic about fruit growing and I always did like to hear our good county mentioned as one of the best fruit growing sections in the Dominion, but we are getting away' behind simply because we have done nothing but sit down and let a serious pest destroy all our trees.

Mr. Backus in Friday's issue of your paper has written a capital letter on the scale and its demolition, and I agree with him in nearly all he says, but I must remind him that the Codling Moth, the Tussock Moth and other pests are not of the same nature as the San Jose Scale and can be got rid of without a contact spray, whereas the scale must have a contact spray. I am aware it is impossible to get rid of it at once, but it can be kept in check, and from my experience the lime, sulphur and sait is the best, it makes the female scale sick, if it does not kill her, and she is not in condition to lay eggs in the same quantity as if she was healthy, as I have proved by their decrease.

Mattoax, who was in charge of the block station at Rangoon, four miles north of the scene of the wreck, and the first station north of Lawyer Depot.

This official said that an inspection of the telegraph sheets showed that Mattoax had let a second train into the block, although he had not received word that the previous train had cleared it. This was against the rules of the road. Mattoax has vanished.

Tilbury, Dec. 3.—By a clever rese early Saturday morning two crooks from Detroit robbed P. L. McArthur of the local branch of the Sovereign Bank of the sum of \$1,500. ******************

An armed posse is in pursuit of the robbers and it is likely that they will be caught.

The Sovereign Bank was to have opened a branch bank at Fletcher, west of Tilbury, on the M.C.R., and Mr. McArthur had notes and money which were to have been used for the first day's business first day's business.

Mr. McArthur prepared his valise and left it in the vault of the local

Mr. McArthur went into the smoking car of the M.C.R. train, carrying with him the value which con-

tained the money.

The Robbers' Ruse.

The train had gone along a mile or so from Tilbury when one of the crooks, believed to have been Quinn of Detroit, came to the door of the car, and, holding out a paper parcel, called out to McArthur, "Here, will you please give this package to the agent at Fletcher?" McArthur did not understand the request at first the agent at Fletcher?" McArthur did not understand the request at first

did not understand the request at first and made no response.

"Here, I mean you. Give this package to the agent at Fletcher, will you?" the man called out again.

Mr. McArthur, did not suspect anything, and went to the front of the car, thinking that he was doing a favor for one of the railroad men.

As he left his seat and advanced to the door the other man of the pair is supposed to have come up from be-

is supposed to have come up from behind and taken the valise containing the money and substituted another, which was the exact counterpart of the one which was stolen.

At any rate both men went out of

At any rate, both men went out of the car and left Mr. McArthur with the substituted valise, which he supposed to be his own.

It was not until he had arrived at Fletcher and opened his valise that he discovered that it was not his, and that the money had been stolen.

The alarm was given immediately, and with the two detectives from Detroit called into service and the chief of police of Tilbury, Mr. McArthur organized a search and commenced the chase after the robbers.

The posse proceeded to Buxton, and have begun operations from that point.

Among the contents of the valise were six money orders for \$50 each, numbers 5,817, 5,818, 5,819, 5,830, 5,831, 5,832; three branch drafts, numbers 149,713, 149,714, 149,715; four New York drafts, numbers 7,708, 7,709, 7,710, 7,711, All were signed by Mr. J. I. Hill, and were made out in favor of Hill, and were made out in favor of D. T. McArthur.

C.own Attnorney H. D. Smith re ceived a telephone message from Buxton this morning to the effect that a number of the papers stolen from the bank clerk McArthur were found at that place by a constable in the employ of the Sovereign Bank. No cine has yet been found as to the whereabouts of the robbers.

3 TRAIN WRECKS

Three Women Killed and Bodies Burned on the Rutland—Two Engineers Killsd in Other Two Wrecks.

Vergennes, Vt. Dec. 3.—Three passengers, all women, met death near here Saturday as the result of a wreck on the Rutland Railroad, while at

on the Kutland Kaliroad, while at least twelve other persons were seriously injured. Among those hurt were members of the Drury Opera Co. of New York, an organization of colored musicians.

A passenger train consisting of two coaches and a caboose was run into by a heavily-loaded gravel train, moving swiftly on a downgrade, and both coaches were hurled down an embankfames. The women killed were all in the front car. When the bodies were recovered they were so charred as to be almost unrecognizable. The wreckage was consumed.

Engineer Hunt attributed the accident to the failure of the brakes to hold his train.

These estimates cover a period of twenty-one months, because of the change that is to be made in the fiscal year. They contain an appropriation of \$32,953,340 for railways and canals chargeable to capital and \$558,417 chargeable to income.



London Daily Mail Enthusiastic Over Canadian For Ambassador.

Canadian For Ambassador.

London, Dec. 1.—The Daily Mail this morning takes up the agitation for the appointment of a Canadian as ambassador at Washington in succession to Sir Mortimer Durand. In an editorial the paper says:

"It would be a wise course, if the Government is anxious to consolidate the Empire. Canada has suffered in the past through the ignorance or shortcomings of British diplomatists; witness the Ashburton treaty of 1842 (as to the boundary line between Maine and Canada); the Oregon agreement of 1836 (a territorial dispute between Great Britain and the United States) which was settled by treaty, and the Alaska boundary arbitration. Never was there such an opportunity for repairing these mistakes.

"It cannot be alleged that a Canadian as ambassador would be likely to take up an extravagant or dangerous position in his treatment of ques-

dian as ambassador would be likely to take up an extravagant or dangerous position in his treatment of questions between the United States and Canada. The Canadian frontier is 2,000 miles long, and it could be defended only with difficulty. Several men are said to have enter-Several men are said to have entered the store and commenced to wreck it. Every window in the place was broken and the counters torn up. Before the Chinamen could secure aid or call for the police the shop had been literally torn to pieces.

When the owner attempted to pretect his property he was knocked down and kicked and beaten until he was in a serious condition.

This is the second time within a few weeks that Lee's shop has been attacked by the same gang of rowdies.
