DEATH OF THE QUEEN. The weary vigil at Osborne House has ceased. Earthly royalty has yielded up its sceptre and passed into a higher Court.

Surrounded by her loved children and devoted attendants, with her loyal subjects in every quarter of the globe watching in spirit a glorious epoch-making transition, with the civilized world looking sympathetically on, loved and revered by her people, honored by sister nations, at peace with God, Queen Victoria departed this life at 6:30 p.m. to-day.

And Justice stands mutely by the usual severity of his demeanor softened by the spectacle of a justifying Queen laying down her earthly sceptre forever. Meek and gentle mercy kneels in anguish by the death-couch. Dove-eyed charity, remembering all she has done—the burdens she has borne, the sorrows she has known—offers heartfelt homage at the bier of the gracious and tender-hearted Queen.

How truly Victorian reigns in the hearts of her people, the profound sorrow that to-day fills every hamlet in the Empire eloquently attests. Her thousand claims to reverence, of which Thompson says "she was the greatest of her age," are now that the curtain has fallen on her illustrious life and reign. It is the universal experience of humanity that only when we have lost or are about to lose a benefactor or a friend, do his virtues and our obligations and causes for gratitude assume their proper perspective.

Contemporaneous opinion it is said is never just to a great figure in the drama of human affairs. When the storms of passion and prejudice have ceased to beat and the historian of another period takes up his pen then and then only, we are told, can the true measure of a great character be taken.

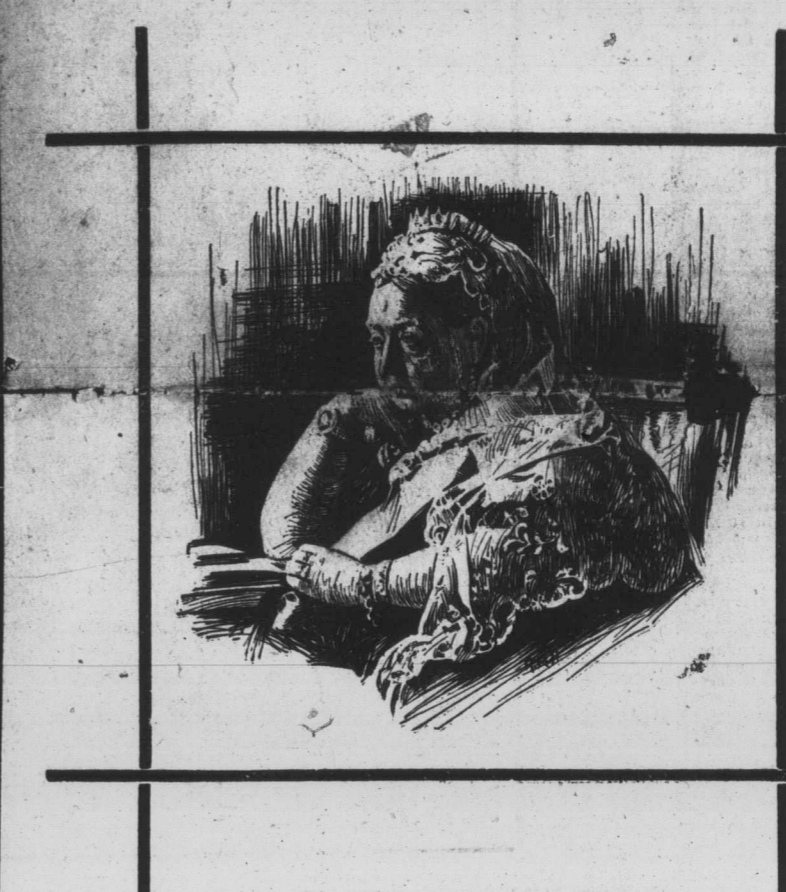
AN EMPIRE MOURNS ITS ILLUSTRIOUS RULER.

THE QUEEN IS DEAD. London, Jan. 22.—7:03 p.m.—A telegram from the Prince of Wales to the Lord Mayor is as follows:—"Osborne, 6:45 p.m.—My beloved mother has just passed away surrounded by her children and grandchildren. (Signed) ALBERT EDWARD."

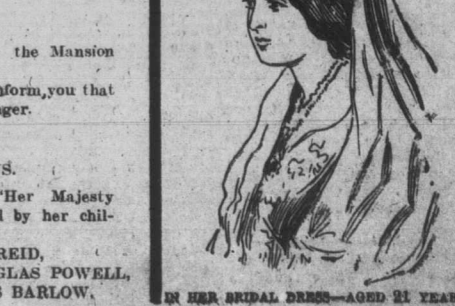
