

THIRTY-SECOND ANNIVERSARY

Eanada Sunday School Anion.

The Thirty-second Anniversary Meeting of the Canada Sunday School Union, was held on the 27th of January, in the Wesleyan Church, Great St. James Street. J. W. DAWSON, LL.D., occupied the Chair, who, after prayer, opened the business of the Meeting with an appropriate address, and then called on the Corresponding Secretary, Rev. J. ALEXANDER, to read the Report; after which, the following resolutions were passed unanimously:

Moved by the Rev. C. P. BUSH, D.D., of the American Board of Missions seconded by J. C. BECKET.

"That in seeking the diffusion of sound and instructive religious literature and in the establishing of Sabbath Schools in destitute localities, and in the manifold labours of its Agents in the good cause, the Canada Sunday School Union is deserving of our confidence and support."

THIRTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT of the Ganada Sunday School Anion, Presented to their Subscribers at the Annual Meeting, January, 1869.

Though not distinguished by any remarkable incidents, the past year has been one of encouraging and steady efforts, which have, your Committee trust, been followed with the Divine blessing. It is with a feeling of profound and grateful satisfaction, that the friends of the Sunday School recognize on every side, and in all Christian lands, the deepening interest that Christians personally and the Christian Church, are manifesting in the Sabbath School institution. The increase of valuable publications and periodical literature, designed to promote the efficiency of the teachers, or to instruct and interest the scholars; the establishment of Teachers' Institutes, and the Annual Sunday School Conventions, which on this continent at least, have become an established institution, are but the expression of that deepening conviction, which is year by year giving to the Sabbath School the position to which it is entitled, among the evangelizing agencies of Protestant Christendom. Among the most zealous workers in this good cause, are now reckoned some of the most able and devoted Christians of Britain and America. Your Committee rejoice, that in the glorious work, the churches and Christian men of Canada are showing an interest greater than in former times, and never perhaps has greater progress been made than during the past year, especially in organizing and preparing for aggressive work. Some humble share of responsibility your Committee have been privileged to bear, and some part of the work to forward through their agents and depository. The report of what they have been doing, they now submit as in duty bound, to their constituents, in this annual account of their stewardship.

We have to record the goodness of our Heavenly Father, in mercifully sparing the lives of Agents and members of the Committee, though personal and domestic afflictions have not been unknown, nor we hope and pray unblessed. During the past year, we retained on the field both

OUR AGENTS.

Mr. McKillican's labours have been occasionally interrupted by illness contracted in the labourious service in which he has now for many years been engaged. Though often but little fit for the physical exertions of his missionary tours in the back country, he has lost but little time and seldom failed in his appointments. A large proportion of the field in which he laboured last year, was actually destitute of any stated means of grace, where the music of the Sabbath bell and the voice of the Christian Minister are sounds scarcely ever heard. Its geographical limits are thus described by Mr. McKillican, "Commencing at a point 40 miles above Ottawa city on the north side of the river, I took the country westward for 50 miles, ranging in width according to the mountain range from two to ten miles. Next crossing to Ontario, at the Black River, (ten miles below Fort William, I took up a field 34 miles long, averaging 10 miles in width, visiting in both sections every accessible place. Near the upper end of this section my work extended southward 20 miles (to the Bonnchere, 35 miles above its outlet.) My next section extended from a short distance above Aylmer, westward 30 miles, varying in width from 2 to

7 miles. Much of this was new ground. From its upper extremity I went north from the river 35 miles into a new country, visiting Bear Lake and Otter Lakes, and several points in Thorne, returning via Portage du Fort. Next I commenced to revisit downwards and supply what was wanting, when they were prepared for me in the new field west of Aylmer. Another section lies from the mouth of the Madawaska near Arnprior, westward to Lake Dore and Mink Lake, 46 miles long and 10 miles wide. Next from Lake Dore northward 50 miles. My next and last extended from the mouth of the Gatineau northward (to the Kayabaga River) 50 miles Then I went 50 miles up the Gatineau. The section described above, lying in Ontario, had not been visited for nearly two years and required attention."

Any one acquainted with the geography and physical characteristics of the country described in the foregoing extract, may conceive the amount of hard and self-denying labour performed by our Missionary, and the importance of the work which this Society is doing, in extending its efforts to such localities, totally destitute of the means of grace. In all the places visited sermons or addresses were delivered, parents spoken to on the necessity of personal religion, and urged to embrace the Saviour, that they might thus be prepared to train their children in the fear of the Lord; and in many localities permanent centres of influence were established in the organization of Sunday Schools. A few extracts from Mr. McKillican's journal, will give us some idea of his work in its more encouraging features.

"Riding into a back settlement," says Mr McKıllican, "I took as my guide an old man, a staunch friend of a school I had opened in his settlement. He said, that for several years after he came there, the Sabbath was not respected by either parents or children, and the ground where the large Union Sabbath School now meets, was formerly a Sabbath play ground, where all the youth gathered, and liquor was often brought to add to their enjoyment. Such a thing he said could not now take place, and all would frown on it. Such is the great change, which under the blessing of God, the Sabbath School had wrought. In this locality children who had been growing up without any Bible instruction, stood a most satisfactory examination on the five books of Moses."

"In another place," Mr. McKillican says, "Passing over details of a journey 30 miles into the woods where I nearly lost my horse, had to cut logs and make roads, piling small timber to get over large ones, I came to a school referred to last year as in the Pine Forest. Here I learned that a poor boy, whose size, simplicity and ignorance, excited a smile on some faces when he entered the school two year's ago, has since learned in Sunday School to read well and to love what is good, and is as much an object of interest as he was before of pity. Visiting three other schools in new settlements which I organized when last here, in sections where as yet there is no common school, I found they had been well sustained, and were producing the desired result in sowing good seed, and in improving the appearance and manners of the children. Since the removal of Mr. F----, from B---- settlement, there has been no Sabbath School, and hearing of the large number of children without religious instruction, I sent them an invitation to meet me. On arrival I found the house full, and though none were qualified to take hold, I found two or three willing after hearing an address to do all they could, also to learn more and give for books to help them. They paid me \$14 and have conducted since that time a very interesting school, with marked effect on young and old."

Mr. McKillican mentions many incidents of great interest which cannot be embodied in this report. In one place where a school of 30 children was organized two year's ago, of whom 16 could not read, the latter are spoken of as being all able now to read the New Testament. Ten districts were found entirely destitute of religious instruction, in seven of which Union Schools were formed and well furnished with all the requisites of the Sabbath School. At the Desert, our Agent received much kindness from the Agent of the Honourable Hudson's Bay Company, who opened his house for the newly formed school, when 20 children, a proportion of them Indians, were gathered together.

In one district where three years ago, Mr. McKillican, organized a Sabbath School, and which till lately met in summer in a barn, and in winter in the large kitchen of a farm house, there is now erected a large and beautiful hall, occupying an eligible site, and affording tangible or visible evidence of the progress of the Sunday School cause in that locality.

Mr McKillican was permitted during the year to organize 25 Schools with 117 Teachers and 848 Scholars and to visit in addition 83 Schools with 433 Teachers and 3591 Scholars. In the same time 178 sermons and addresses were delivered.

In addition to his direct missionary work, this old and tried servant of the "Union" has at the request of the Committee rendered efficient service in collecting for a few weeks in the city, at a season when the roads and weather precluded his usual visitations. This service has materially aided the Funds of the Society at a time when all was needed to meet our increased liabilities.

Your Committee have to express their satisfaction with the Revd. W. Walker, as an efficient and reliable Agent. During the past year however his usefulness in the field has been somewhat crippled by severe domestic afflictions, which for nearly three months, more or less interfered with his missionary labour. In these domestic trials Mr. Walker has had the sympathies and prayers of the Committee, who rejoice in the restored health of most of the invalid members of his family.

The field occupied by Mr. W. has been the same this

year as last, with the exception of extended visits as far as Kingston. Mr. Walker has visited the section of country bounded by the St. Lawrence on the south and extending westward from the line of the Ottawa and Prescott Rail Road, and northward to the boundaries of the fields indicated by Mr. McKillican as visited by him. Unlike so large a proportion of the newly settled lumbering region visited by the other Agent, this in general has been long occupied, and where the land is at all productive, comparatively wealthy. But unhappily the moral and spiritual aspects of these older districts, where the people have been with each successive generation becoming more indifferent to divine things, and more engrossed with material things, are far less encouraging to a missionary than those of the new bush settlements, when he always, receives a hearty welcome to the log cabin of the settler. Mr. Walker while acknowledging the kind hospitality always extended to him, frequently complains of the discouraging apathy of old settled districts, from which it seems all but impossible to rouse the people. Still your Committee feel assured that no other agency is so likely to prove effective as that of the Sabbath School. It seems in many cases an all but hopeless task to move the worldhardened adult population of those districts to any interest in the things of God. If good is done, it will be chiefly among the young. It is hoped that some good has been effected in this direction by our Agent. Mr. W. in one of his monthly reports says, "In O. I succeeded in bringing up several schools which had declined for four or five years, and were at last abandoned altogether. The interest there is now considerably on the increase, and parents are manifesting some concern about the souls of their children," Again, "D-is at present my field of operations, and surely it is much in need of missionary labour. Sunday school life has been very low, and it is with a considerable amount of labour that I have succeeded in organizing six Sabbath Schools in the township. I visited one part where there once existed a good School, but from

many causes it has been altogether abandoned. I'visited several of the families around, and gave them two addresses on separate occasions yet failed to stir them up to do anything. In other localities I was more fortunate, and six schools were organized with 28 Teachers and 205 scholars." In another report Mr. W. mentions one of the North Gower schools as reporting the conversion of 21 of their scholars, and of three schools in Edwardsburg, as supporting by their united contributions an orphan in India, and as contributing for the year \$108.50 for charitable purposes. Another school rejoices in eight of the scholars as being passed from death into life. Smiths Falls is especially mentioned, as indicating an increasing activity in the Sabbath School cause, and an increasing interest in the work of this Society, as evinced by large contributions to its funds.

The results of our Agent's labors, so far as they can be presented in the form of statistics shew on the part of Mr. McKillican 25 schools organized, with 117 teachers, and 848 scholars; 83 schools visited with 433 teachers, and 3,591 scholars, and 178 sermons and addresses delivered. Mr. Walker has organized 13 schools with 65 teachers and 480 scholars; and has visited 103 schools with 784 teachers and 6,669 scholars, and delivered 190 sermons and addresses.

In all, the Agents of the Canada Sunday School Union have planted 38 Sabbath Schools, which are all new centres of gospel influence, in some places the only Evangelical agencies at work in the neighbourhood. They have engaged in active service for Christ 132 persons, who profess to preach the Gospel from the bench of the log school house, or the extemporized seats of the log cabin in the woods, to an aggregate Sabbath congregation of 1,328 children and youth. Making all allowance for the imperfections of many of those on whom, of necessity, the work of instructing others in those destitute localities devolves, surely under the Divine blessing which we crave, all this teaching shall not be in vain !

In addition our Agents have spoken words of counsel and encouragement to 1,217 teachers, who had already been engaged in the 186 schools before established; and both directly in their sermons and addresses to the children, and indirectly through the parents and teachers in schools visited, they have sought to influence for good, 10,260 precious young souls, who in a few years may be the men and women who shall bear their part in determining the destiny of our beloved Canada.

In 224 Sabbath Schools they have been permitted to labor. They have addressed 1,399 Sabbath School teachers on the responsibilities and duties of their positions.

They have spoken of Jesus and the power of his Cross to 11,588 children, besides having had the opportunity of urging upon thousands of parents, the necessity of a personal experience of the truth, as the indispensable qualification for discharging their parental obligations to their offspring.

THE DEPOSITORY

has continued during the past year under the careful and efficient management of Mr. Thomas Muir. There has been a steady increase in business, the cash sales being \$1,953 00 for 1868, against \$1901 50, for 1867. If we make allowance for the extraordinary sales of one month in 1867, that of September, when a large number of delegates, present at the S. S. Convention patronized the Depository in their purchase of Sabbath School requisites, we shall see that the increase has been encouraging. Your Committee hope that each successive year shall witness greater prosperity in this department of their work. The personal labour of their Agents are productive of lasting benefit to the localities visited in proportion as they are followed by the dissemination of sound and instructive reading.

The sales by Agents, remittances from Schools, &c.,

for the past year, amount to \$3567 85 as compared with \$3516 29 for the previous year.

KINDRED ASSOCIATIONS AND EFFORTS.

Your Committee refer with pleasure to the efforts of the Montreal S. S. Teacher's Association, which is doing good service in awakening a deeper interest in the work of teaching, and in calling attention to the best modes of conducting Sabbath School work.

At the annual S. S. Convention held at St. Catherines last October, your Committee was represented by H. Nelson, Esq. and Rev. John McKillican, our Agent, the occasion was one of interest and profit, and the proceedings were reported to a Montreal gathering by the various delegates from this city who had attended.

Your Committee hail with pleasure the formation of the Ontario Sabbath School Missionary Union, whose proposed work in Ontario is to be similar to our own in this section of the Provinces; and the formation of the Ottawa Sabbath School Association, which is already engaged in active service, sending out its members by two and two into the country districts around Ottawa City, for the purpose of forming schools and encouraging and aiding those already formed. Steps have been taken by your Committee towards the formation of county organizations with a view of promoting Sabbath School interest in their several localities, and they hope their successors in office may successfully overcome all the difficulties which in this section of the country are greater than in Western Ontario, and have to report at the next Annual Meeting the formation of many such associations.

Your Committee in closing would renew their acknowledgments to the London Tract Society for favours continued during the past year, and would gratefully mention the liberality of the many friends of the cause in this city, and elsewhere, through whose generosity the Canada Sunday School Union has been enabled during the year closed to meet its various liabilities. In the hope that the incoming year may be one of greater efficiency and prosperity than the one just closed, they humbly resign their trust into the hands of their constituents, with this record of their stewardship.
