The losses of the Allies in men have been heavy, and the Canadians have figured largely in the lists of casualties, but those inflicted on the Germans have been far heavier. It is stated that the Germans are bringing forward to this front large reinforcements, to make, perhaps, a final desperate effort to reach Dunkirk, Calais and Paris.

In the eastern arena much fighting took place at several points along the 400 miles of front, but the severest fighting was to the north and to the south-east of Przemysl. The latest information to hand was to the effect that the Russians had definitely checked the desperate offensive of the Teutonic allies, and were them, selves renewing the offensive, being strongly reinforced at that point.

The operations in the Dardanelles and no the Gallipoil Peninsula have been prosecuted vigorously, but details have been withheld. A serious loss to the Allies occurred in the sinking of the old British battleship Majoritie by a Turkish (or German) submarine. Fortunately the loss of fife was small. These operations were being supplemented by the allied fleet bombarding Turkish ports further south on the coast of Asia Minor; and it was reported that Italian troops had been landed on the Island of Rhodes. 


