FIRE AT HONEYDALE

On Thursday night last the store of the George F. Beach estate at Honeydale, twelve miles from St. Stephen, was fire covered to be on fire. The buildings were valued at about \$5,000, and the stock at upwards of \$7,000, and both were totally destroyed. The insurance on stock and buildings was about \$6,500.

Frederick, May 27.—The Misses Sherman received word yesterday that their brother, Frank J., assistant general manager of the Royal Bank, has resigned and enlisted as a private in the 22nd Infantry of the Canadian Expeditionary Force. He acquired his initial knowledge of banking in this city, and after his appointment as assistant general manager about ten years ago was in charge of agencies in the West Indies. For several years he has been stationed in Montreal, filling the position of assistant bank manager in Canada and was in receipt of a salary of \$10,000 a year. "I am very glad my alphabet is going out to fight for the Empire," said Miss Stella Sherman to the Times' correspondent, "and I am proud of him from this ever." Private Sherman is a brother of Rev. Ralph Sherman, curate of Trinity Church, St. John.—Evening Times.

WOLVES' LIGHTHOUSE

It is most satisfactory to learn that Mr. Eusebius Wright has been reinstated as keeper of the Southern Wolf lighthouse by the Department of Marine and Fisheries. A cruel and wholly false malicious story had been in circulation in connection with the disappearance of two brothers who were drowned during a storm in January, 1912, of the Wolves; and Mr. Wright had relinquished his position in consequence of the rumor. Mr. Wright in a deposition by himself, confirmed by a further deposition of two brothers who had entirely cleared himself of having had any connection with the tragedy. We regret that we are unable to print the depositions which are clear, full and explicit. If Mr. Wright, or someone else, could trace the false story to its source, and bring to justice the person or persons who originated it, a service would be rendered to the community, and a much needed warning would be given to scandal mongers.
