SUPREME COURT.

Cases Heard Yesterday and the Suits Set for Today.

Mr. Justice Drake held a session of the supreme court yesterday at 10 a. m. in the Masonic hall and, adjourning at 4:30 p. m., the court will again sit this morning at the same place, at 11 o'clock in the forenoon.

There were three cases disposed of as far as this session is concerned, and two are set for today, leaving four for tomorrow, which day will probably end the session.

The case of Leith vs. Reiter, for balance of account, in which W. J. Nelson appeared for the plaintiff and A. H. MacNeill for the defence, was adjourned by consent until the next court.

The next, J. H. Johnson & Co. vs. Estmere, for the balance, \$14,750.00 of commission on sale of property, in which W. J. Whitehead appeared for the plaintiffs, and J. H. Harvey for the defence, was settled in favor of the plaintiffs, but subject to reference in regard to the expenses incurred in the sale of the property.

The remainder of the sitting was taken up with the case of Eastman vs. A. G. Pemberton, sheriff of Yale, for unlawful sale. The counsel for the plaintiff is Mr. A. J. Macdonald, and for the defendant, Mr. J. Elliott Nelson.

For today there is set the case of Cranston et al., vs. the English-Canadian company, in which the plaintiffs, represented by Mr. W. J. Whitehead, claim as owners, all the mineral lands in limits of the Union Maid, etc., and pray right of possession. Mr. A. C. Galt appears for the English-Canadian company.

The matter which will probably be heard is the case of Reid vs. Reid, in which the petitioner asks for a divorce. The parties are of Revelstoke.

THE BELEAGUERED CITIES.

Thanksgiving Services Held at the Church of England. Hearty services were held last Sunday at St. George's church in thanksgiving for the relief of the beleaguered cities in South Africa.

In the course of his remarks on the occasion, the rector, C. W. Hedley, M. A. of Trinity, Ontario, said the coincidence between the turn of the tide in the war and the general day of supplication which was held by the Anglican church throughout the world on Septuagesima last, (February 11), was, to say the least, extremely remarkable.

ROSSLAND CELEBRATES.

How the Relief of Mafeking Was Observed Here.

Roseland was in glorious spirits Friday, and held one of the liveliest impromptu patriotic celebrations ever seen in British Columbia.

The Canadian Pacific Telegraph company did some effective and quick work in getting the despatch through to this city. It took just seven minutes from the time it left the London wire office to reach Roseland, which was dated London, 9:15 p. m., and reached here at 1:25 p. m.

Roseland, May 18.—Colonel Baden-Powell, Mafeking, South Africa: Roseland joins rest of Empire in admiration of your gallant defense and in joy at your relief. (Signed.) AYORM.

One of the wonderful things about the celebration was the quickness with which decorations were gotten up by the residents. The fronts of buildings were soon ornamented with flags and streamers and pictures of Colonel Baden-Powell were considerably in evidence.

The scene around Mr. Brownlee's store during the afternoon begged description. The afternoon began with the playing of the national anthem, the strains of which were followed in rapid succession: "The White and Blue," "Soldiers of the Queen," the "British Grenadiers," "Hearts of Oak," "We Don't Want to Fight," and a hundred other patriotic effusions.

IN THE EVENING.

The Organized Procession and the Patriotic Speeches.

But at seven in the evening was the organized effort of the day. The city band, the volunteers, the fire brigade, a body of horsemen, and a number of carriages formed into a magnificent parade which took the citizens by surprise.

When it is remembered that many of the boys of this city had volunteered with the first and second contingents and with the Strathcoombs, and that there is hardly a man in the club but has relatives at the front, the reception that they received cannot be wondered at.
