### FRENCH SMASHED THE GERMANS | STATISTICS OF INCORPORATED ALONG FRONT OF 25 MILES

In a Battle of Desperate Violence Between Soissons and Rheims, General Nivelle's Troops Captured the Germans First and Second Line Trenches More Than Ten Thousand Prisoners, and Much War Material

PARIS, April 16—The French began an attack this morning, after several days artillery preparation, between Soissons and Rheims, Several German lines were carried, and more than ten thousand Germans were taken prisoners. The official announcement of this success issued by the War Office tonight describes the fighting as being of the utmost violence.


