Editorial Notes.

The Provincial Board of Health is recommending that every body should be vaccinated, in view of the existence of small pox at Montreal and other places.

Mayor Thomson has again put the town under obligations by having a crossing constructed at his own expense across Elm avenue at the confluence of that avenue with Main street. Such acts speak for the public spiritedness of our mayor.

The report that Sir Chas. Tupper, owing to pressure of private business, was about to retire from the leadership of the Conservative party, and with the consent of prominent members of both houses was writing Hugh John Macdonald to take the position, is authoritatively contradicted.

Halifax is becoming somewhat excited over the threat of the Allan and Dominion line of steamships to withdraw their boats from the Halifax route during winter months, and run only to Boston and Portland, unless the Government continues the subsidies which it has hitherto given for carrying the mails.

The hearing of the claims before the Behring Sea claims commission was terminated on Wednesday, with a summing-up by Hon. Frederick Peters for Great Britain. The commission has been in session since August 24th, and has been very exhaustively and learnedly addressed by the counsel on both sides.

On our first page this issue appears a pretty little poem by Rev. Arthur J. Lockhart, (Pastor Felix) a native of this county, whose success in the literary world many of our readers have gladly noted from time to time. Mr Lockhart was at one time on the staff of the Acadian, the predecessor of this journal.

We have been visited by a decidedly cold wave this week. On Tuesday there were several snow squalls and the day was decidedly unpleasant. However, the weather has got toned down again now and we will hope for many pleasant days before winter finally sets in. As the spring and summer have been so cold and wet a fine autumn is predicted. May the prediction be verified.

This issue of the ACADIAN contains the first instalment of Barrie's famous novel, "When A Man's Single." Mr Barrie, as most of our readers are aware, is one of the most eminent of modern novelists, and "When A Man's Single" is perhaps the most popular of his fictitious productions. We are confident that the novel will be well received and absorbing interest.

The provincial exhibition was formally opened on Wednesday by Lord Aberdeen, speeches being also made by Lord Kelvin and Gov. Daly. The attendance on the exposition grounds, thus far, has been extremely good, the number present yesterday, when Sir Wilfrid Laurier spoke, being particularly great. The exhibits are probably above the ordinary both in quantity and quality, and a good proportion of the award are coming to this county.

Sir Oliver Mowat, it is reported, has resigned the portfolio of Justice in the Dominion Cabinet, to become Lieutenant-Governor of Ontario. During the long and wonderfully successful public life of Sir Oliver, he has proved himself to possess the attributes of a statesman, and his retirement from active politics is to be very much regretted. It is fitting that the highest position in the Province should be conferred upon him, who has served Ontario so long and faithfully.

No more Canadian postage stamps of the present design are to be issued. After the stamps now in stock are exhausted, which will probably be in November next, a stamp with a new design will go into circulation. The stamp will bear a portrait of the Queen as she appeared at the coronation except that a coronet is substituted for a crown. The corner of the stamp will be ornamented with a representation of maple leaves, taken from a photo of leaves pulled from maples on parliament hill.

The Tarte-Grenier libel suit which is now being heard before Judge Wartelle in Montreal, is exciting very great interest. In this case the Minister of Public Works, Mr Tarte, accused Mr W. A. Grenier with having libeled him in an article in a paper called La Libre Parole. It is the intention of the counsel for the defence, if they are allowed, to review the whole of Mr Tarte's political career and show some of his transactions to be a justification for the publication of the article complained of. Among the many prominent public men implicated in the case are Sir Oliver Mowat and Sir Wilfrid Laurier.

The union of the Maritime Provinces is again being discussed, and urged as a measure of economy by an over-governed community. If one legislature can do for two million people in Ontario and a million and a half in Quebec, one should do for nine hundred thousand in Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward Island, says a Montreal exchange. Considerations of economy, however, are not likely to govern in such a case. If they were paramount, the provincial legislatures would all go, and with them a lot of pernicious influences, and we would have one parliament and be one people.

The Bicycle's Place.

The bicycle is proving itself an instrument almost as sanguinary in its effects as the sword, and the worst of it is that the number who perish with the "bike" is in no way confined to those who take the bike. Wheelmen and non-wheelmen alike are counted among its victims. Even in our orderly and quiet community its ravages are so common that scarcely a week passes when the ACADIAN is not called upon to record some accident traceable to the "silent steed."

This unpleasant prevalence of cycling accidents is due, perhaps more than anything else, to the fact that the position of the wheelman in relation to the rest of the travelling public, is imperfectly understood.

The bicycle is a legitimate conveyance, and as such, the wheelman is entitled to the same liberties and privileges as the driver of any vehicle. He has a right to a part of the road and if a horse becomes frightened at his wheel he is not responsible and any oaths or imprecations cast at him under such circumstances are positively out of order.

On the other hand, the cyclist is not expected to make use of the sidewalks in riding, but is supposed to limit himself to the street. He is supposed to meet to turn always to the left and not simply to suit his own inclinations in the matter as he too frequently does. In passing he must himself turn to one side; he has no right to expect that a ring of his bell should send pedestrians scurrying out of his way, as the French peasants were obliged to flee from the chariots of the old noblesse. The wheelman should remember too, that "scorching" no more than horse racing, can be tolerated on frequented highways.

If these few facts were remembered, we think the dangers of cycling would be considerably minimized, and this very agreeable sport would be riddled, to a large extent, of its chief drawback.

Marriage of an Evangelist.

The Bethany Baptist church in Skowhegan was the scene of a charming wedding, Thursday morning, when Miss Edith B. Hanson, only daughter of Rev. and Mrs C. V. Hanson, was united in marriage to Herbert L. Gale, of Boston, Mass., the well known evangelist.

A profusion of flowers and ferns artistically arranged by the young people of the Bethany society added to the beauty of the attractive church interior, making most fitting surroundings for the marriage service.

The marriage ceremony was performed by Dr. Hanson in a most impressive manner. The church was filled with invited guests to whom the happy event was one of unusual interest.

The bride is a highly accomplished young lady, having graduated with honor from the Classical Institute and Colby University, and is a prominent and effective church worker. Mr Gale is widely known as a most successful evangelist, having labored in many parts of the United States and Canada.

The wedding gifts were choice and abundant. Mr and Mrs Gale left on the afternoon train for a short trip, after which they will go to Nova Scotia where the first of October, Mr Gale begins a series of meetings.—Maine Farmer.

The People's Forum.

To the Editor of the Acadian.

A Citizen Heard From.

There are a great many people in Wolfville whose chief ambition seems to be to get into some employment which will bring them in profits with their giving very little in return. The tendency may be due to the summer in-rush of tourists, who afford such excellent bait for those who are looking after tips. At any rate, the tendency is here and it is greatly to be deplored. What Wolfville needs, more than anything else, is some good, healthy industries. If, however, any one in the town has any capital to invest, it never seems natural for him to go into any undertaking which will involve the employment of labor and be of real use to the community, but he instinctively turns to some venture, which by catering to the extravagances and weaknesses of the people, may turn a few pennies into the coffers of the promoters but impoverishes the town to that extent.

While taking my daily walk the other day, I noticed a number of boats drawn up in a pile on the vacant lot below the Methodist church. On investigation, I found this to be a decomposed "Merry-go-round," or an invention of some such mythical significance, which is to be reconstructed and fitted for use in the town. Now this is an instance of that of which I have just spoken. The owner of this huge toy, whoever he is, may have had access to capital, for the purchase and cost of running such a machine would, I imagine, entail a considerable expenditure. Instead, however, of putting this capital into some productive industry, he has expended it to bring this contrivance to the place to tempt the children of Wolfville to spend their copers.

But this is only one of the many instances of this unfortunate tendency, against which the people of the town should contend. We should be something more than mere leeches on society. We should give something for our living or else not live at all. We should make the town more prosperous for our being its citizens rather than the reverse.
