### IMPERIAL PARLIAMENT.

#### The Irish University Bill Read a First Time.

Details of the Proposed Scheme.—The Chancellor of the Exchequer reserves his opinion as to whether the measure should be read a second time, and whether it should be referred to a select committee, or whether it should be referred to the House of Commons to-day. It is expected that the measure will be read a second time, and that the House will be asked to pass it on Friday next.

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### NEWS FROM ABROAD.

#### EUROPE.

Mr. Mitchell Henry, M.P., will not accept the leadership of the Home Rule party.

The German Reichstag has approved the Anglo-German treaty for the protection of the slave trade on the African coast.

The Italian Chamber of Deputies has passed a bill making the performance of civil marriages before the religious ceremony obligatory.

Prince Alexander of Battenberg is receiving a Bulgarian delegation at Tirnova, and the advantages of an alliance with Russia.

The miners representing thirty collieries at Durham have decided to return to work, but to give a fortnight's notice for a 20 per cent. advance in wages to ensure full employment.

A Berlin dispatch says the Kaiser is determined to shorten the period of military service in the line by three years, which will permit an immense increase in the number of recruits.

A Constantinople dispatch says a Ministerial crisis is anticipated. The Mohammedan population of Bulgaria and Romania are constantly agitated over the present state of affairs.

The German Government has resolved to restrict the sale of arms temporarily, and may possibly extend this restriction to Russia.

It is believed this indicates a disposition to increase the silver content.

A St. Petersburg dispatch says the Tatar Turovians completely defeated the Russian army at Merv on the 19th of April, and also captured much booty. The Tatars are now marching towards the city of Samarkand.

The London World affirms that the youngest son of the Queen, Prince Leopold, has just sent an offer of marriage to the Princess Marie of Hannover, and his brother, the Duke of Connaught, was an unsuccessful suitor.

The Paris Republic affirms that the negotiations relative to the Greco-Turkish question commence at Constantinople early in June, and will partake of the character of a conference. All the powers have agreed to this proposal except England, the Conservatives advocated the measure, pointing to the increase of murders since the death penalty was abolished.

In the French Chamber of Deputies on Monday, M. Lockroy, referring to the conduct of the Archbishop of Aix, demanded that payment be made of salaries of rebellious ecclesiastics be withheld, and advocated the separation of Church and State.

The Archbishop of Aix, in his reply, stated that the members of the Cabinet were in complete accord on M. Ferry's educational bills, and they were determined to oppose such a proposal. Should the reports of the speech of the Archbishop of Aix, and his subsequent conduct be correct, the Archbishop would be prosecuted.

#### UNITED STATES.

Severe drought prevails throughout the Kentucky blue grass region. The hay has turned brown, and the young crops are all dying.

At Terre Haute, Ind., William McKeever was sentenced to the penitentiary for a year and a fine of \$1,000 for marrying a white woman.

The ninth annual conference of general secretaries of Young Men's Christian Associations of the United States and British Provinces was convened at Baltimore on Saturday.

The New Orleans Sanitary Association on Tuesday commenced systematically flushing the streets gutter with river water. This will be done daily the entire length of the city.

The New York Times says during the fiscal year ending June 1878, the number of cases of high crimes was 14, the value of the property was \$70,000, and has doubled each succeeding year, reaching twelve millions last year.

The grave of Mrs. Nimmons, at Nimmonsburg, N.Y., was robbed on Sunday night. It is supposed it was done at the instigation of her wife who lives at Boston, and wanted to remove the body there in opposition to the wish of his relatives.

A Toronto dispatch says that a woman of fortune was murdered in a house at the corner of Queen and York streets on Saturday last, and the body was discovered by the relatives of the deceased.

New York, May 20.—An explosion of petroleum occurred this morning on board the Italian bark Amelia J. at anchor at Staten Island. The vessel was burned to the water's edge, and 2,000 barrels of petroleum were consumed. Loss over \$20,000 fully insured. The vessel cleared last Saturday for Barcelona, Spain. The captain and crew escaped very narrowly. The cause of the explosion is unknown. The combustion was terrible, and shook all the houses at Tompkinsville to their foundation.

#### AFFAIRS IN AFGHANISTAN.

Forty-eight railways were sold under foreclosure in the United States during 1878, representing a total mileage of 2,502 miles, \$160,014,500 bonds and debt, and \$181,016,700 capital stock—48 per cent. amount of bonds, debt, and stock being \$911,831,300. The foreclosed sales for the last three years across the border have been:

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### ST. PATRICK'S UNIVERSITY.

#### The Scheme for a Catholic University at Dublin.

Debate in the House of Commons.

LONDON, May 21.—The Catholic hierarchy and newspapers of Ireland maintain a profound silence respecting the bill for the establishment of a University of St. Patrick at Dublin introduced by the O'Connor Don in the House of Commons. In the absence of knowledge whether it would be the end or only the beginning of difficulty, they must be certain of its success by Rome before they can do any good. The Protestants of Ireland look unfavorably on the measure. The Protestant Dissenters and Church of England Society of England bitterly oppose the measure, and are organizing a public agitation against it. The Bill is a compromise between a University of St. Patrick and a University of St. Mary. Mr. Gladstone is not known.

In the House of Commons to-night the Irish University bill was read a second time. An animated discussion, during which the Scotch members strongly opposed the bill, the debate was adjourned till the afternoon of the 22nd. The bill is now in the hands of the House, and will be read a third time on the 24th. It is expected that the bill will pass, but the possibility of its amendment is not yet known. 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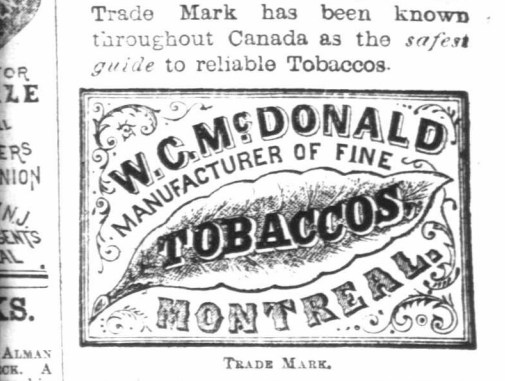

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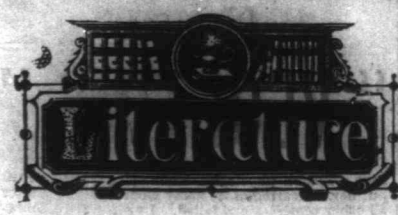

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NEEDLEWORK.

There are various forms in which gold and silver are prepared for the purpose of needlework, and also different colors, named by different degrees of brilliancy. Modern alloys are more successful in those used in the last century, and are made of inferior metals, tarnished at very short work, and soon show the action of embroidery into disrepair. What is called "passing" is generally composed of a thread of silk, round which is loosely twisted a fine strand of gold or silver spun. The needle may be threaded with it in the usual way, and it can be used in the same manner as silk for embroidery; it is made of two or three different sizes, and is distinguished by a cord by its being formed of only one thread. For embroidery with "passing" the needle must be round, very large the eye, and sufficiently large to prevent the fraying of the threads. 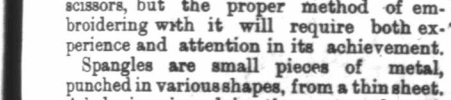

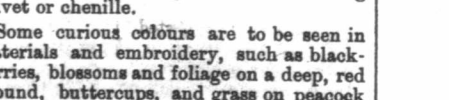


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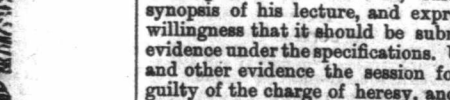
