### Office of the Board of Works,

April 8th, 1857.

The following resolutions were adopted by the Board on the 4th inst:

**Resolved.**—That the Board of Works will not be accountable for any expenditure on Roads, Public Buildings, or any institution over which it has control, except such expenditure shall be ordered by the Board.—such order to be verified by the written order of the Chairman and Secretary for such expenditure.

**Resolved.**—That no Surveyor or Inspector of Roads, or servant of the Board, shall give or have authority to give any order for Supplies, or work of any description, without first obtaining the written order of the Chairman and Secretary.

## NOTICE TO MARINERS.

THE BOARD OF WORKS hereby give notice that the temporary Light exhibited on Green Island, at the entrance of Catalina Harbor, Trinity Bay, since the 1st March last, was on the 13th instant, removed, and replaced by one of a more brilliant character and extensive range. This is a **FIXED WHITE LIGHT**, burns at an elevation of 92 feet above high water, exhibited every night from sunset to sunrise, and in favourable weather will be seen from E. N. E. seaward, to S. W. 12 miles. Vessels bound Northward by keeping the Light open with the North-head of Catalina, until Bonavista Light opens with Cape Jean, will give the Flowers Rocks an ample berth—or when coming from the Northward and bound for Catalina, by giving the N. Head a moderate berth, you will clear the Brandies Rocks by steering for Green Island Light. Green Island is situated in 43. 30. N. long. 53.03 West.

# THE CONCEPTION-BAY MAN.

(From Willmer & Smiths European Times)

The Post of yesterday announces that down to the 14th July Delhi had not fallen; but that "the mutiny was spreading." Two hundred and forty women and children had been massacred at Cawnpore. We fear we have seen but the beginning of an outbreak which will spread through the whole of the native troops of India. How truthfully and prophetically the "Iron Duke" spoke of the native troops in whose fidelity he had little, if any, confidence!

Since preparing the above, last evening, an extra from the Post confirmed the intelligence respecting the position of Delhi and the deplorable butchery of women and children, together with—awful to relate!—the troops of the garrison at Cawnpore who were compelled, through famine, to surrender to the insurgents who, in their thirst for blood and hellish revenge, violated the most solemn promises!—The Steamer for here from Halifax, left port at 3 o'clock yesterday morning; and in our next issue our readers may expect the fullest particulars of the most important events.—Parliament had been prorogued on the 28th August, and the utmost support (naturally enough) would be given by the government to restore tranquility to India.—[The Antelope, it is understood, would take the place of the Circassian, and leave Liverpool for here on the 5th instant.]—Times.

In 1853 the Bengal native army numbered in all 83,946 men. Of these 70,079 were infantry. Of the composition of the cavalry the returns are silent, but the infantry was thus classified—Brahmins, 26,893; Rajpoots, 27,335; Hindoos of inferior caste, 15,761; Mahomedans, 21,699; Christians, 1118; Sikhs, 50.

**A CONTINENTAL RUMOUR.**—Steps have been taken, we learn, by the English Government, to engage French officers on half-pay to enter the British service in India. Engagements will not be contracted for less than two years, and not for more than five. The pay will be: Captains, £800 per annum; lieutenants, £600; second lieutenants, £400; all the travelling expenses, out and home, to be defrayed by the East India Company. *Emanicipation of Brussels.*

**THE FRENCH EMPEROR AT HAVRE.**—Their majesties arrived off Havre at midnight on Monday, and were greeted with the cheers of thousands who had congregated on the quays in spite of the late hour. Next morning their Majesties left the Reine Hortense, after having distributed crosses amongst its officers, and landed amidst the immense enthusiasm of the inhabitants. At half-past nine they arrived at the railway station, which, like the other public buildings and the principal thoroughfares, was decorated with steamers and garlands. A deputation here met the Emperor who warmly thanked its members for the reception given him by the town of Havre. "You possess," said the Emperor, "all the elements of a great town; it shall be my task to develop them." Their Majesties remained some time at Rouen, when they visited the cathedral and other public buildings; they then left for St. Cloud. The Emperor has commanded that a painting shall be executed representing his arrival at Osborne on board the Reine Hortense. It is believed that M. Gudin, the eminent marine painter, will be employed on the occasion.

**IRELAND.**  
The *Carlton Post* says—It is generally rumoured that the agent of one of the most extensive landed proprietors in this country has absconded with the sum of £11,000. We withhold the name for the present, as we speak only from public rumour.

The Dublin election committee has decided that Messrs. Gorgan and Vane, the sitting members, were duly elected; but it specifies several acts of bribery, treating, and promising which took place without the authority or knowledge of the sitting members.

The Drogheda election committee has decided that Mr. McCann was duly elected for that borough, but reports that riotous proceedings happened on the nomination and polling days, and that it did not appear that proper precautions had been taken by the authorities to secure good order.

A whole village at Dartford, near Loughrea was levelled to the ground last week by a body of men called the "Crowbar Brigade." The tenants had been ejected in the process of the law, but still held their cottages. The work of demolition was carried on under the inspection of the sub-sheriff.

On 8th, two officers of the 17th Lancers, Mr. John T. Walker, Mr. W. W. King, their seconds, Mr. Thomas and Sir C. Hutchinson, were taken into custody, on a retired ground, near Howth, where they were about to fight a duel. The cause was a lady. The parties were held to bail in £1000 each, and two sureties of £250 each.

## LATEST NEWS.

### INDIA.

The Bombay arrived at Suez yesterday morning, bringing dates from Bombay to the 30th

July. The latest date from Delhi is July 14, at which time the city was still held by the rebels. Though we have parts of five regiments before Delhi, only 2,000 Europeans can be mustered for any effective attack, in consequence of detachments to protect other places.

Sir Henry Barnard died of cholera on the 5th of July, and was succeeded by General Reid. The Bombay and Madras Presidencies were perfectly tranquil, and their armies continued loyal.

General Sir H. Lawrence died on the 4th of July. The garrison of Lucknow is holding out. General Havelock, at the head of 2000 Europeans, has defeated the rebels in three engagements, recapturing Cawnpore and capturing 26 guns. These actions were very brilliant, and with very little loss on our side.

The garrison of Agra fought the Neemuch mutineers on the 5th of July. Our loss was 49 killed and 92 wounded, out of the total force of 500. Several massacres have taken place in the northwest provinces.

The following despatch from Trieste, confirming and completing the above Government despatch, has been subsequently received:—

ALEXANDRIA, Aug. 21.  
The Indian and Australian mails leave to day with dates from Calcutta to the 28th; Bombay, 30th; Hong Kong, 10th July.

On the 14th Delhi still held out. The enemy had made three sorties, in all which they were totally defeated, and suffered heavy loss.

Sir Hugh Wheeler has been killed at Cawnpore. The garrison, pressed by famine, surrendered the place to Nana Sahib, by whom, in violation of his solemn promises, all were massacred. Nana Sahib was subsequently twice attacked, and utterly defeated with great loss, by General Havelock, who has re-occupied Cawnpore.

Lucknow is confidently expected to hold out until relieved by Havelock. The remaining regiments in the Punjab have been disarmed.

At Sealcote the 9th Light Cavalry and 46th Native Infantry mutinied, but were subsequently attacked by Brigadier Nicholson, and utterly routed.

At Saugor the 31st Regiment, under their native officers, alone drove the revolted 42nd out of the station.

Holkar remains staunch. There has been some disturbance at Hyderabad, in the Deccan, but it has been suppressed. The Bombay and Madras Presidencies continue tranquil.

FROM THE NEWFOUNTLANDER

We observe by late Colonial papers that a certain Mr. Perley has been charged by our parental rulers of Downing Street with a mission to Newfoundland and Labrador, in connection with the question of our Fishery Rights, and that H.M. Cutter *Nalley* had been provided by the Admiral to convey this important personage to our shores.

So then the suspicions and apprehensions intimated by the "Anglo Saxon," and more recently urged by some of our contemporaries in St. Johns, were not quite so ridiculous and groundless as the *Newfoundlander* some time since represented them to be, and that consistent Journal would now wipe off the remembrance of his contumacy, and factions Participation in the Darling ministerial concession, by "stating with regret, but with little apprehension as to results, that such conduct should meet criticism, and that all should know by what light to read assurances of good faith from a minister of the British Crown."

To us of the outports, who are accustomed to view things in a plain and ordinary way, there is nothing very unaccountable or surprising in the mission of Mr. Perley to Newfoundland; Mr. Labouchere, like every other able minister is disposed to profit by experience and to avail himself of an unfortunate concatenation of political circumstances (which had no previous existence in this country,) to settle satisfactorily, at least to the French, the much vexed and long pending question of the rights of the latter to our shores and fisheries.

When Governor Darling by and with the advice of his ministry, or at least with their full sanction, so far misinterpreted the Anglo-French Treaties upon mutual rights, as virtually to decide that they should no longer be held to be mutual upon those parts of our coast where the French had usurped and forcibly maintained an exclusive right for years. We repeat when this was done by our own government, French usurpation was sanctioned, and a sufficient ground established, upon which to found other demands scarcely less reasonable, and to urge other sacrifices to English diplomacy or French cupidity.

The influence at present exercised by the Emperor of the French on the English Court; would even under more favourable circumstances, be sufficient to justify considerable alarm on the part of the inhabitants of this country; but as

the authority cited is not of a character to warrant more immediate apprehensions, we shall reserve further remark, until the precise nature of Mr. Perley's Mission is defined and generally understood.

HOLLAND.

The Pays has published a letter from the Hague, dated the 8th instant, which states that the governor of the Dutch possessions in India had protested against the occupation by the English of the group of Islands called the Oua-Horn, situated on the confines of the Dutch possessions in the Indian seas...

PORTUGAL.

The Spanish Government has addressed a note to the Portuguese government asking for the extradition of Spanish refugees known to be on the Portuguese territory. It is believed that the Portuguese will not consent to this.

A great fire has taken place at St. Ubes; it was supposed to be the work of an incendiary. Councillor Oliverio, who was at the head of a department at the Portuguese treasury is dead; he was formerly at the head of the Portuguese agency in London.

THE CHINESE WAR.—The Times' Paris correspondent says:—"It is stated that it was decided at Osborne that, in the event of Lord Elgin and Baron Gros not attaining the object of their mission to China, a more decided action is common should be adopted."

The Queen has accepted the invitation of the Emperor of the French to accompany the Duke of Cambridge, during the autumn, to the French camp at Chalons. An early visit to Compiegne is even announced.

A comparison between the years 1857 and 1856 of the number of paupers relieved in England and Wales in each week exhibits a decrease in favour of this year in every instance, varying from 2.4 to 3.1 per cent. The decrease is equally applicable to in and out-door relief.

If possible, the legislative session is to be brought to a close on Saturday, the 22nd inst. so as to enable the Queen to prorogue Parliament in person. Her Majesty will return to Buckingham Palace on the 18th, and, according to present arrangements, leave London for the North on the 24th.

THE ASHTON COLLIERY EXPLOSION.—The inquest on the 39 men killed by this terrible explosion was concluded on Saturday, the 8th. As every soul in the workings has been killed there could be no evidence to throw a satisfactory light on the cause, and the jury found a verdict to that effect.

The published returns of trade of the port of Bristol for the year ending April 30, 1857, exhibit a large increase as compared with the preceding year. The gross tonnage is 183,342 against 138,464.

Sir Norman Leslie, Bart., who has perished in India, was head of a Ross-shire family, and a cadet of the noble house of Rothes. He was only in his thirty fifth year. He is succeeded by his Brother, now Sir John Loyd Leslie.

Mr. Lafragua, the Mexican envoy, has made known to the Mexican consul that the Spanish Government has suspended all negotiations with him, and that, consequently, he has placed the Mexican subjects in Spain under the protection of France.

GOVERNMENT NOTICE.

THE GOVERNOR is desirous that publicity be given to a letter addressed by him, to Chief Justice BRADY, of which the following is a copy, on the subject of the Oaths to be administered to future Governors of Colonies when they assumed their Offices.

By His Excellency's Command, J. KENT, Col. Secretary, Secretary's Office, 8th September, 1857.

GOVERNMENT HOUSE, St. John's, Newfoundland, 4th Sept., 1857.

Sir, I have the honor to acquaint you that having called the attention of the Secretary of State for the Colonial Department to the Oaths which you administered to me on my assuming the Government of Newfoundland, on the 10th of June last, I am informed by the Colonial Minister that there cannot be a doubt that the course adopted on the occasion alluded to was in accordance with the Royal Instructions, and the correct one."

At the same time I am informed that shortly before the receipt of my letter, dated the 1st. July, "Her Majesty's Government had taken the same subject into consideration, and were prepared on the next occasion of Instructions being issued to the Governor of a Colony about to assume his office, to advise substitution of the single Oath of Allegiance for those now administered to him, and that I might therefore consider that the present Oaths are substantially abrogated as far as regards Governors of Colonies."

I have considered it necessary to furnish you with this information for your future guidance.
