Newspaper Laws.

We call the special attention of post masters and subscribers to the following synopsis of the newspaper laws :

1. A postmaster is required to give Medici-notice by letter (returning a paper does has he not answer the law) when a subscriber does not take his paper out of the office, and state the reasons for its not being taken. Any neglect to do so makes the postmaster responsible to the publishers for payment.

2. If any person orders his paper discontinued, he must pay all arrearages, or the publisher may continue to send it until payment is made, and collect the whole amount, whether it be taken from the office or not. There can be no legal discontinuance until the payment is made.

3. Any person who takes a paper from a country already well provided with only in a portion of our issue of last the post-office, whether directed to his railroad facilities. 
