Had Rough Voyage. The schr. Dorothy Baird, Capt. Keeping, arrived to Jas. Baird, Ltd., to-day from Pernambuco after a run of 29 days. The first part of the voyage fairly fine weather was experienced until the 10th inst., when, as the ship was 200 miles north of Bermuda, gales blowing from all points of the compass and lasting for days were met and a cross sea made much trouble for the vessel. Sir Robert Bond explained to the House the evils attached to the present forms of the Cold Storage Bill. How succinctly he put, laid before, and requested the Premier to accept his amendment, which amendment was in effect that the lessees of the Cold Storage Contract should not sell any bait fishes to any fisherman except those being bona fide residents and domiciled in the Colony, and that no bait fishes should be exported except to be used as food. The Americans or any other fishermen can procure bait from these cold storage people, come on our shores, fish with the bait so procured and laugh at our Newfoundland fishermen, who can do nothing but "blow their fingers" and look at the strangers overhauling and unloading the fish from the trawls sailed only a few hours previously from the bait caught by possibly one of the same fishermen then looking in, sold to the cold storage people or a foreigner to take the cod and other fishes from the water under the very eyes of our Newfoundland fishermen. The Premier should have slowly before jeopardizing the very means of living now held by our fishermen. The Right Hon. Sir Robert Bond has offered to the Government of the day good, sound, practical advice, which if refused will in my opinion bring discredit on those now in power and but add another spoke to the wheel now slowly but surely turning towards the defeat of those who vulgarly but vainly attempt to belittle one of the best friends the country ever had, viz., the Right Hon. Out of the Chest.

Yesterday afternoon the Minister of Finance tabled the Estimates for the year 1911-12, together with a statement showing the changes as compared with those of 1910-11. He also made an explanatory statement. The Estimates show that the Government want to take \$3,272,545.20 out of the Public Chest as against \$3,055,055.22 last year. This is \$217,000 more than last year. Half of this increase is due to the new Railway Loan, which increases the interest chargeable to the Colony by \$109,064.63. As however this money will earn interest until it has to be paid over to the Reid Nfld. Co. there is a set-off against this interest charge, which is estimated at \$50,000 for the year 1911-12.

The other half of the increase has been brought about in various ways; the Census eating up \$20,000; the Old Age Pensions, \$12,000; Agriculture, \$25,000; Fire Patrol, \$4,000; Light-houses, \$4,000; Postal and Telegraphs, \$18,000; Civil Government, \$2,000, and Pensions, \$2,186.

The whole country owes a deep debt of gratitude to Sir Robert Bond for his high spirited and patriotic attitude in opposing that pernicious piece of legislation, the Cold Storage Agreement, which ere two years pass will be universally execrated. If any further proof were wanting as to the base and cowardly tactics of the Government and their henchlings—than our publication of what actually took place in the House of Assembly on Wednesday last, that proof is furnished by the Daily News this morning, for under the heading "Bond's Visitation" in large black type it publishes an extract from the Boston Post repeating a gross libel first circulated in the Evening Chronicle, namely, that Sir Robert Bond in his speech on The Hague Award declared that the American Counsel Miller had in his argument before The Hague Tribunal "threatened war if Newfoundland assumed an obdurate attitude in regard to the fisheries 'concessions'."

It will be remembered that when this was attributed to Sir Robert Bond by the Evening Chronicle, or the very day of its appearance Sir Robert Bond wrote Mr. P. T. McGrath, the editor of that paper, denying the statement and requesting him to make a correction. Instead of making the promised honorable Mr. McGrath, who is Clerk of the House, as well as Editor of the Chronicle, contented himself by publishing Sir Robert Bond's request. Two days after this, on the 10th February, the malicious statement was apparently telegraphed to the Halifax Chronicle, for in its issue of the 11th inst. it publishes the statement as having been received from a St. John's correspondent the day previous. It was evidently telegraphed to the United States press as well, and probably to the English newspapers. Hon. J. A. Robinson, of the Daily News, repeats the libel this morning and thereby aggravates the offence. Anything more scandalous it is difficult to conceive. Mr. Currie, Supervisor of Debates in the House of Assembly, and Mr. Mort, Assistant Clerk, are both connected with the House when Sir Robert Bond made his speech, the manuscript or official report was in the hands of the Daily News and the Editor of that paper was therefore fully cognizant of the fact that he was publishing a gross libel on Sir Robert Bond in his issue of this morning, a libel for which he may be made to suffer through the Supreme Court. We have only to add that both the Daily News and Evening Chronicle are official organs of the Assembly to publish the debates, in order to indicate further the gravity of the offence.

The Premier's Attack.

Editor Evening Telegram. Sir—The Premier's attack upon me present in the Galleries at the Assembly, Wednesday afternoon, was as disquieted at the sneers of Sir Edward Morris, the Premier, directed against Mr. John Dwyer, the popular representative for St. John's East. Sir Edward poses as the patron of fair play, freedom of speech, and of courtesy in debate and has always prided himself on his efforts to stimulate agriculture, professing at the same time great respect for the husbandman and admiration for workers generally. In acquitting himself as he did on Wednesday he took a strange means for displaying these sentiments. Mr. Dwyer's avocation in life may be humble, but it is humble and honest. Such an innuendo in such a place and coming from one possessing a position associated with which is so much of honour and dignity, disgraces the best traditions of our Parliament. Premier Morris cannot frown on John Dwyer, for though even he is a farmer, he is nothing below this man Morris either socially or otherwise. If John Dwyer has eaten the frugal bread of the workman so has the Premier, and Dwyer's antecedents can compare favourably with those of Sir Edward. John Dwyer is the son of a hard working agriculturist and Morris is the son of an industrious cooper. In what way therefore can he sneer at Dwyer? Sir Edward's "break" of Wednesday exhibited neither wit nor wisdom. He should be an exemplar of propriety and decorum in the House. It would seem that he sadly needs a lesson in both. Many have already taken his measure and he had better treat gentlemen as gentlemen in future.

Question and Answers in House of Assembly Yesterday.

NOTICE OF QUESTION.

Mr. Hon. Sir R. Bond.—To ask the Hon. the Premier if it is correct, as stated by the Newfoundland correspondent of the "Standard of Empire" in the issue of that paper of date the 3rd of February, that "a very big pulp and timber deal has been concluded with British capitalists, embracing nine thousand seven hundred square miles of timber country in Hamilton Inlet, Labrador," and that "the lessees have paid the Government a rental of \$28,400 for the same, and have now sold it to an English syndicate at a big profit."

ANSWER.

In relation to the first portion of the question, I may say that I have no information as to whether a "very big pulp and timber deal" has been concluded with British capitalists embracing 9,700 square miles of timber country in Hamilton Inlet, Labrador. As to the other part of the question, whether the lessees have paid the Government a rental of \$28,400 for the same, no amount corresponding to such a rental has been paid. The only transaction resembling the subject matter of the question was an application for a license to cut timber at Hamilton Inlet, Labrador, containing an area of 9,700 square miles, which was approved on the 5th January, 1910, to Messrs. W. C. Job, R. F. Goodridge, Jordan, Mill, and M. A. Duffey. The fees in respect to this would amount to \$38,800. No fees, however, were paid on account of this property, and the applicants' rights, under the approval, lapsed on the 5th February instant. With regard to the last part of the question, as to whether lessees of property at Hamilton Inlet, Labrador, have sold out to British capitalists, I am unable to say if this is the case or not.

Mr. Hon. Sir R. Bond.—To ask the Hon. the Premier if the statements made by the Newfoundland correspondent of the "Standard of Empire" and which appeared in that paper under date the 3rd of February are correct, viz., that \$40,000 damages have been claimed by the United States "on account of light dues and fines and penalties imposed upon them for breaches of our law"; that "The Hague Tribunal reduced the claim by one-half"; and that the Government has "decided to settle the remaining claim of \$20,000 by direct negotiations with the United States Government."

ANSWER.

The schedule to the Pecuniary Claims Convention, transmitted to the Newfoundland Government in 1908 by the United States Government amounted to \$37,533.16. The proceedings at the Hague did not specifically deal with these claims, except in so far as their findings on the question submitted to them will affect the decision of the Court to which these Pecuniary Claims are to be submitted. The Government has not decided to settle any claim by direct negotiations or

otherwise. The Government has no knowledge of the source whence the statement referred to emanated.

ALSO.—To ask the Hon. the Premier to lay upon the table of the subject and of all Minutes of Council made by the late Government in respect to such a claim; of all correspondence between the late Premier and Sir William MacGregor on the subject; and of all Minutes of Council and correspondence that have emanated from the present Government in relation to the matter.

ANSWER.

The subject of the Pecuniary Claims and the schedules of the claims are at present under discussion by the United States Government and His Majesty's Government, as well as the Government of Newfoundland, and it would not be in the interests of the Colony to at present make public any Minute of Council or correspondence in relation to the same. I hope, however, that during the course of the session the matter shall have reached a point when I shall be in a position to table the whole of the correspondence and the Minutes of Council asked for.

ALSO.—To ask the Hon. the Premier if the said claim is still being pressed by the United States, and, if so, whether it is the intention of the Government to admit a liability, or to leave the United States to prove the justice of their claim through the Supreme Court.

ANSWER.

The said claim is not being pressed by the United States Government as it has been provided that the matter shall be decided by a competent Tribunal. It is not the intention of the Government to admit any liability, but to leave it to the United States Government to prove their claims before the Tribunal which may be ultimately adopted by the parties.

Mr. Hon. Sir R. Bond.—To ask the Hon. Colonial Secretary if, within the past three months, he has signed any licenses under the Bell Act permitting the export, purchase or sale of herrings in the District of Fortune Bay; and if such were signed by him to lay upon the table of the House a copy of the authority of the Governor in Council for the issue of said licenses.

ANSWER.

The Colonial Secretary said he had signed no licenses.

Mr. Cliff.—To ask the Hon. Colonial Secretary to state who is the Quarantine Officer at Port aux Basques, and what is paid to him for his services.

ANSWER.

Dr. Grant. Salary, \$200 a year.

Mr. Cliff.—To ask the Minister of Marine and Fisheries who is the Observer at the Meteorological Signal Station at Port aux Basques, and what salary does he receive.

ANSWER.

Mr. Smart. Salary, \$300 a year.

CHAPTER XI.—We Meet a Noble Woman and Devoted Wife—In a Word, We Meet a Heroine.

There is no more sacred influence outside of religion itself than that of a good woman. This is so in whatever capacity she may be found, but especially is it the case when it relates to that of a wife. No tie should be dearer than that which exists between man and wife; hence is it that any element that creates friction between them must be, in the very nature of things, a hindrance to the ideal home.

The home is the corner stone of the State; and its story is at its best when woman, as mother and wife, reigns supreme. The home is truly woman's sphere, and when that sphere is invaded and destroyed, then the most injured of all the circle is the wife and mother. All suffer, truly, but her anguish is the keenest of any. The nobler her ambition, and the finer her tastes, the greater are her sufferings and the deeper her heart yearnings.

And so was it in the case of the lady of whom we now write. She had suffered, and excelling in merit and true womanly worth, she felt her wrong all the more keenly. Her's was a happy childhood, and in her parental home she was well trained for the important duties of the future. Like most young women, she met the young man of her choice, and in mutual love and confidence they joined hands at the altar. The marriage was a happy one, and bright children added to the joy of the home. For a while all went well, but in the background there lurked an enemy, which, in the course of a few years, usurped the rule of the home and dethroned the husband and made him a wanderer. The enemy was his desire for strong drink. With home gone, and the father and husband a wanderer, the mother had to hustle for herself and do for the children. It was in this relation that we met her on one of our public holidays. With her were the children, and some of their companions, all bound off for the country, to enjoy its freedom and inhale its health-giving properties.

On approaching the lady we halted and exchanged the greeting of friends, why only now and then meet. On asking of her husband's welfare and whereabouts, she said he was a wreck, and that he was living in another country, she hardly knew where at times; but she herself had faith in him yet, and she was doing her best to save him and restore him to home and his influences.

Her expression of faith in her husband being so ardent, and her concern for him being so sincere, we were emboldened to question her more freely than we otherwise should have done. We said to her that we had known her husband for a long

time and had a knowledge of him when he made his first mistake, and finally had to seek for bread in a strange land. I then said to her that I had always considered her husband a fine manly sort of fellow, had he not been overcome by his besetting sin. She at once answered and said: "Yes, he is a fine man, and as good a husband as ever provided bread for a family," and that he was worth saving, and that she was bound to try and save him as far as confidence in him and love for him would go. The manner in which this was spoken was a true reflection of the character of the speaker, and revealed her as a noble woman. She had been greatly wronged and had suffered bitterly. Her husband, who should have been her stay and her companion, had failed to support her, and she had to bear the burden of "the fight for bread." And yet amid it all she was full of hope and full of devotion to her weak partner. She was determined to stick to him and save him by the power of love. She had every hope of winning the victory, and thus restore her husband to her rightful place as head of the home and breadwinner of his family.

With this she bowed us adieu and hastened on to overtake the children who had continued their tour along the road towards the country. We came on towards the city, and as we did so we felt the better of having met the little picnic party. They were not many in number. There was the mother and also the little ones, and a companion or two, all united in the bonds of love and friendship, and all guided by the gentle hand of the woman who had told us the story of the burden of her heart. In passing from our view there was but one impression left upon us, and that one opinion held by us, and that was that in our ramble that morning we had met a heroine, whose loyalty and devotion to her fallen husband marked her as a noble woman. We met a woman who for her children, her home, her country, her duty, and her good name was paying a steep penalty. Had she passed on unheeded, we should not have had this chapter for our notes, nor should we have suspected that, among the little party whom we met there was one who had met such a burden. THE AMERICAN FISHERY AGREEMENT.

What Will the Legislative Council Do With It?

The debate on the American Fishery Agreement, or as it has been erroneously termed, 'Cold Storage Bill,' has closed in the House of Assembly, and in a day or two the Bill confirming the Agreement will go up to the Legislative Council for its consideration. What will the Legislative Council do with it?—is the question that is now uppermost in people's minds.

Sir Robert Bond's criticism of the measure has fully opened people's eyes to the reckless manner in which that Agreement was entered into, and how completely public interests were sacrificed to American cunning and greed. The Opposition have succeeded in having the Colony's guarantee changed from an unlimited to a limited one; they have forced the Government to a promise that the articles to be admitted free of duty for the benefit of this American Company, under the Agreement, shall also be placed on the Free List of the Customs Tariff, so that the whole trade of the Colony may share in the advantage. But there is still a most vital provision that Sir Robert Bond most strenuously worked to obtain, but which the Government in the House of Assembly on Wednesday night voted down.

That provision is to safeguard the fishery interests of the country by preventing the American Company from evading the Bait Act and selling their bait fishes to foreign fishermen. As we said in our issue last night, the only conclusion that can reasonably be drawn from the rejection of the amendment in respect to bait supplies, proposed by Sir Robert Bond, is that the American Company are to be permitted to trade in bait fishes with foreigners. We cannot too strongly emphasize the fact that the Agreement entered into with Messrs. Trevelyan and Lord is a virtual permission to them to purchase caplin, herring and squid unrestricted as to its destination and unrestricted as to the purpose for which they may sell that fish. And as Sir Robert Bond pointed out during Wednesday night's debate, if this Agreement is ratified by the Legislature without a clause such as he suggested having been inserted, there is a possibility of an action for damages if the Government were to refuse permission to the Company to export bait fishes. We hope, and so far as we can learn the public hope, that this

Agreement will not be permitted to pass the Legislative Council without the clause being inserted that the Company shall not during the continuance of the contract sell herring or other bait fishes to any fishermen except those bona fide resident and domiciled in the Colony, and that the Agreement shall be subject to the provisions of the Bait Act. If the Government are honest in their profession, and the Company do not contemplate engaging in the bait traffic, then, as Sir Robert Bond said, this clause can do no harm. On the other hand, if the Company contemplate engaging in the bait traffic and the Government propose to connive at their doing so, then the clause is absolutely necessary to protect the fishery interests of the Colony.

A circumstance was brought to light yesterday by a question asked in the House of Assembly by Sir Robert Bond, which should open people's eyes as to how this bait question is at present being handled by the Government. The Minister of Customs declared a few days ago in the House that a license to export bait fishes had been granted by the Government to Capt. Tibbo, of the schooner "Orion." Yesterday Sir Robert Bond asked the Colonial Secretary if he, in accordance with the Bait Act, had signed the license, and to produce the authority of the Governor in Council for so doing. The Colonial Secretary replied that he had not signed a license, and that there was no Minute of the Governor in Council directing him to do so. Sir Robert Bond thus forced the truth, that no proper license had been issued, and that the American captain—Corkum—had been permitted by the Customs Department to export herring in Tibbo's vessel without the sanction of the Governor in Council, as provided by the Bait Act. The Governor, who should have been consulted before any license could issue, has ignored by his Minute the Bait Act was thus violated, and the policy of the Ministry in respect to bait supplies to foreigners was made clear.

Smallpox on Bruce.

When the Bruce arrived at Port aux Basques yesterday at noon one of the second class passengers was found to be suffering from smallpox. The disease is of the mild type which prevails around some of the Provinces. Dr. Grant examined the patient who was put in hospital there. The Bruce was quarantined, thoroughly disinfected and fumigated and left for Sydney at 1:30 a.m. today.

The merchants will be asked to purchase five men in the smaller steamers which formerly carried five firemen. Under the old system the firemen had to stand a six hour watch. If the number is increased as suggested, the men will have a four hour watch. Hon. M. P. Gibbs who was present at the meeting addressed the men and advised them to move cautiously, and not to do anything without mature consideration. At the conclusion he was accorded a hearty vote of thanks. After the regular routine business was concluded the meeting adjourned.

went to the barracks and addressed the people from the roof. The crowd fired upon him, the Minister felt riddled with bullets, and a monarchist uprising ensued. Much indiscriminate firing took place, men, women and children were killed, but quiet was afterwards restored. The situation is critical and it is feared by many that a grave royalist upheaval is at hand.

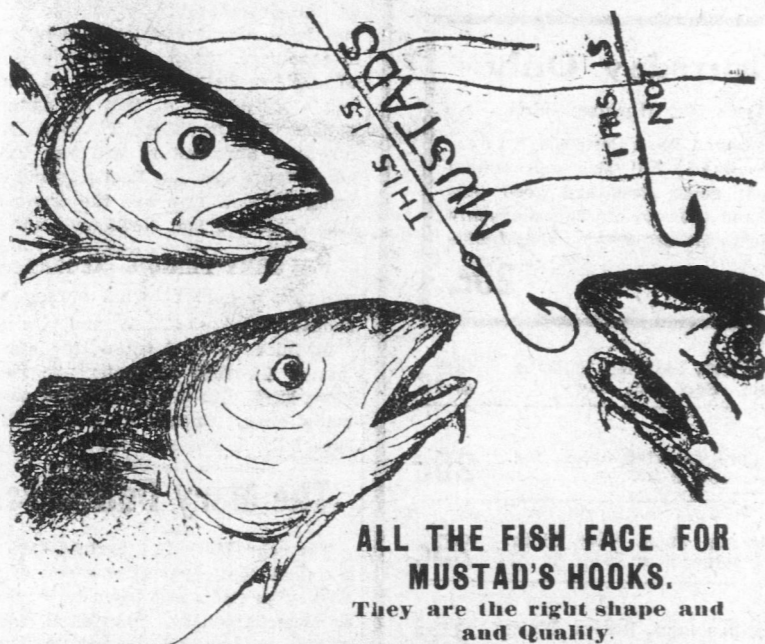

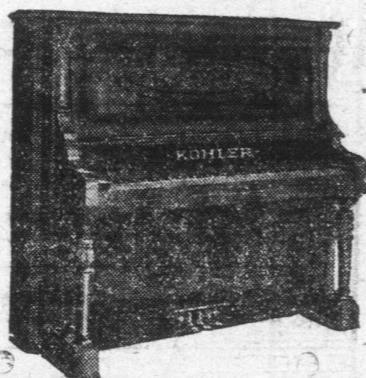

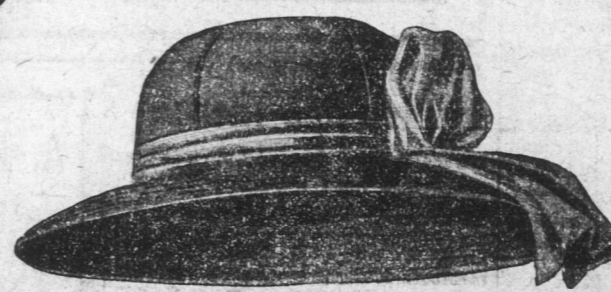
