



It came into existence on March 1 and is under the direct supervision of Dr. Edmund T. Nesbit, director of the Hering laboratory of the college. Dr. Nesbit called for volunteers from among the students. He said he wanted men who were willing to do something for the benefit of humanity at large, even though it might be to their own discomfiture. Twenty-five students volunteered. Of these fourteen of the most perfect physically were chosen, eleven as regular members of the squad and three as alternates. For thirty days the members of the squad were given doses of caffeine while Dr. Nesbit and his assistants made personal observations, taking the pulses and temperature of the members of the squad and making notes on their general physical condition. It was not until within the last few days that one member of the squad weakened under the experiment to such an extent that it was neces-sary to send him to the hospital. Dr. Nesbit refuses to reveal the name of the student who collapsed, but declares that through proper treatment immediately he soon recovered. * * * The caffeine was administered in a solution and was mixed with the water the squad drank.
