What causes have chiefly contributed to this prosperity? At the very outset Mr. Cashin has omitted mention of the first explanation of the larger figures he presents, the enormous inflation of money. This has been so great, the purchasing power of money has so much declined, that the same figures as for, say, 1913, would represent an appreciably smaller volume of trade. Next, a wrong impression is created by the virtual addition of the export and import increases, as though they were separable instead of really explaining one another. The state-ment says that the prosperity of the country is reflected by the growth in value of the imports. To "prosperity" add "extravagance" and some-thing more truthful will be said. 

What the British are doing on the Western Front and what the Americans aim at doing are here shown in contrast with the strange devilry of the German air raid on London.

What Our Men Did. "It is pleasant to contrast with the ignoble achievement of the enemy's air service the magnificent and soldierly work accomplished by our airmen in the Battle of Messines," says the Scotsman, "Press correspondents at the front have described their glorious deeds. During the entire course of the action the enemy's air-

nen were reduced to complete impo-"Not content with searching them out in the air, our flying squadrons at early dawn attacked the enemy's aerc dromes behind the fighting line. They rained down bombs upon them; they flew low and attacked them with machine gun fire; they circled the aerodromes and picked off the enemy as they were getting their machines out; they middle the hangars with bullets. While some continued to keep guard over the aerodromes, others went away on equally daring quests. They picked up troop trains, bombed them, and fired into them. If the trains stopped, and the troops descended, our men came lower, circling over the heads of the enemy and doing great execution with their

machine guns. "They treated moving columns of the enemy's infantry in the same way, scattering large bodies with the precision of their close-range fire; they hunted ammunition convoys and transport cars-everything, in fact, that moved on the ground or above it within the enemy's lines. They did not even hesitate to attack the enemy's anti-aircraft guns and his machine guns. Many of these they put out of action by diving boldly at them and picking off the gunners as they sped past.

"Finally-though this enumeration of their daring exploits is not complete-they flew along the trenches, driving the enemy into their dugouts nd shelters, and leaving in their tracks long lines of slain and wounded. In this day of victory-glorious for all branches of British arms-our airmen established a reign of terror behind the enemy's lines no less by their brilliant scouting for the artillery than by the daring hunting they did on their own account. . It is no wonder that the enemy want to lure them away from the scene where they

ride triumphant in the air." America's Great Air Armada. The United States is to send a Great

Air Armada to Europe. "Six hundred million dollars (£120,000,000) for aeroplanes will be asked of Congress in an Appropriation Bill to be introduced shortly at the request of the Council of National Defence," says the Times Washington correspondent. "This is in addition to 64 million dollars (£12,800,000) already appropriated for aircraft in the War Budget measure just enacted by Congress. "This great appropriation is design-

ed to put into effect plans to give the Allies overwhelming air supremacy. "The Washington correspondent of the Evening Post telegraphs that the Council of National Defence (consisting of expert military advisers to the Government) has decided in favor of an immediate construction of 100,000 aeroplanes, sufficient to supply 25,000 airmen at all times. Such an air fighting force, he says, would be second to none."

To Blind the German Armies. "Congress is now considering a Bill to create a Department of Aeronautics, with its chief in the President's Cabinet," says the Times. "An 'Air Navy' which will dominate every square mile of the Western Front was advocated before the Senate Committee by Mr. Howard Coffin, of the Council of National Defence.

"He urged that a fleet of aeroplanes so numerous and formidable as to preclude the possibility of German airmen even leaving their aerodromes . for the shortest flight observations would so blind the eyes of the German Armies as to throw the balance of power completely and permanently into the hands of America and the Allies.

"With such an end in view, he advocated the mobilisation of every industry in the United States capable of participating in the work of building America an air fleet that shall hold complete dominion over Western

"A violent and sustained offensive against the large towns in Germany proper (not in Belgium or Alsace) would at once diminish the German air force on Haig's front, protect this country, and set free all these thousands of valuable men," says the Daily




