





## YESTERDAY'S PEACE NEWS PREMATURE.

### Armistice Not Yet Signed.

Revolts and Riots in Germany --- Sailors at Kiel Murder Naval Officers --- French Make Another Important Advance---The Canadians Enter Valenciennes.

REPORT ARMISTICE SIGNED.  
WASHINGTON, Nov. 7. Many reports to-day that an official message came through the armistice terms announced by Marshal Foch. No authority was given for the statement while it added to the air of excitement everywhere, officials said they expect an official despatch to be received.

NEGOTIATION NOT CROSSED THE FRENCH LINE.  
LONDON, Nov. 7. The British Foreign Office this evening stated, according to the Exchange Telegraph Co. that the rumor that an armistice with Germany had been proposed was unfounded. Up to 6.30 p.m. no news had been received in London that the German delegation had crossed the French

FOREIGN OFFICE NO NEWS.  
NEW YORK, Nov. 7. The New York News Bureau which is in contact with the Central News Bureau sent a despatch on its financial news which reads as follows: "At 5 o'clock this afternoon, the Foreign Office announced that it had no information of the report that Germany had accepted the armistice conditions."

FOCH'S NOTIFICATION.  
LONDON, Nov. 7. Marshal Foch, the Allied command-in-chief, has notified the German delegation that the armistice negotiations were still in progress. He stated that he was to see the German delegation to discuss the armistice terms. The official note from Marshal Foch reads as follows: "To the German plenipotentiaries at the armistice, they are to be advanced to the French outposts along the Chimay, Fournies and Guise roads."

NOT SIGNED.  
WASHINGTON, Nov. 7. The State Department at 2:15 o'clock this afternoon stated that the armistice negotiations were still in progress. The official statement authorized the statement that the German armistice delegation had not been received by Marshal

FOCH UNTIL FIVE O'CLOCK THIS AFTERNOON.  
PROBABLY ARRIVED LAST NIGHT.  
(By the A.P.)—Four German officers bearing white flags, it is officially announced, probably will arrive at the headquarters of Marshal Foch tonight.  
German Grand Headquarters requested the Allied Grand Headquarters by wireless to permit the passage of the German delegation for armistice negotiations through the lines. The order was given to cease firing on this front at 3 o'clock in the afternoon until further orders. The German wireless message asking for an appointment to meet Marshal Foch says: "The German Government would congratulate itself in the interests of humanity if the arrival of the German delegation on the Allies' front might bring about a provisional suspension of hostilities. The message announced that the German plenipotentiaries would arrive at the French outposts on the Chimay-Oise road on Thursday, between 8 and 10 o'clock in the evening. The mission is headed by Matthias Erzberger, Secretary of State, and includes General H. K. Von Winter, former Military Attaché at Paris; Count Alfred Von Oendorff, former Minister at Sofia; General Von Gruenell."

AMERICANS IN SEDAN.  
WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY ON THE SEDAN FRONT, Nov. 7. (By the A.P.)—American troops have entered the city of Sedan which lies on the west bank of the Meuse. The bridge over the Meuse at Sedan, over which the retreating enemy fled, was destroyed and the river valley flooded. The principal German lateral lines of communication between the fortress of Metz and Northern France and Belgium are now either cut or unavailable to the enemy's use.

REVOLUTIONISTS CONTROL KIEL.  
LONDON, Nov. 7. The entire German navy and a great part of Schleswig is in the hands of the revolutionists, according to reports received in Copenhagen from Kiel and transmitted by the Exchange Telegraph Company. Strikes at the Imperial wharves at Cuxhaven and Wilhelmshaven are expected to occur to-day. The authorities have ordered the preventive arrest of sailors under suspicion. Kiel is governed by the Marines, Soldiers and Workers Committee. All the workshops have been occupied by Red Troops. The street car lines and railways are under the control of the Workmen's Council. There have been no disturbances.

MILITARY GOVERNOR MAKES CONCESSIONS.  
LONDON, Nov. 7. The military governor of Kiel, according to an Exchange Telegraph

despatch from Copenhagen, has accepted the following demands of the workers' and soldiers' council: The release of all military and political prisoners, complete freedom of speech and writing. Released prisoners must not be punished, officers who acknowledge and comply with the measures of the Council shall be permitted to remain or to leave the service.

OFFICIAL BUREAU ADMITS OUTRAGES.  
LONDON, Nov. 7. The Wolf Bureau of Berlin announces that work was stopped at Hamburg, owing to a strike, and that undisciplined acts and outrages have taken place. The News Agency reports similar occurrences from Laebek.

SOCIALISTS START RIOT.  
WASHINGTON, Nov. 7. An official despatch received here to-day quotes the Frankfort Zeitung as saying that rioting in Kiel began last Sunday, after a meeting at which Socialists spoke. Subsequently sailors from the fleet and workmen from the Kiel arsenal joined in an effort to deliver by force the sailors of the third German squadron who had been imprisoned for refusing to obey orders. There were several encounters with the police, in which three persons were killed and 29 wounded.


WILL SUPPRESS REVOLUTION.  
AMSTERDAM, Nov. 7. The Kiel Zeitung, in its issue of Wednesday, says that the streets of the naval base were being guarded by soldiers, sailors and striking workmen. No disorders had occurred. Officers were being disarmed and arrested, while warrant and petty officers who joined the movement were being disarmed. A train, across the river from Hamburg and Flensburg to the northeast, are reported within the power of the revolutionary soldiers. The airfield at Aparedo, in north Schleswig, has been occupied, and the airmen there placed under arrest. The German authorities have decided to suppress the revolution at Kiel, according to a despatch to the Exchange Telegraph Co. Several thousand sailors from Fehmarn Island have been ordered to Kiel.

REVOLT BROKEN OUT IN HAMBURG.  
COPENHAGEN, Nov. 7. A revolt has broken out in Hamburg, according to a despatch from Vambrup. Violent artillery firing was in progress in the streets of the city when the information was spread.

STRIKE AT HAMBURG.  
LONDON, Nov. 7. A strike of dock workers at Hamburg involving ten thousand men is reported.

MAXIMILIAN'S APPEAL.  
AMSTERDAM, Nov. 7. Chancellor Maximilian, says an official despatch from Berlin, has issued an appeal to the German people asking that in order to make an end of bloodshed, a deputation be left for the front and that the negotiations be seriously endangered by disturbances and lack of discipline.

URSUIT GOES ON.  
PARIS, Nov. 7. Along the entire French front the pursuit of the retreating Germans was taken up again this morning, according to to-day's War Office announcements. The French have thrown cavalry into the action on their right where the mounted troops are pushing in the direction of the Meuse. The

I beg to thank the Industrial Workers, and Citizens generally for the great interest that has been manifested in one of the greatest problems that has confronted Great Britain, United States, Dominion of Canada, and the Dominion of Newfoundland. We are only interested in what concerns ourselves at the present time.  
When the Health Authorities raise the ban from holding public gatherings, and all danger is passed, and the "Flu" stamped out, we hope to call a meeting of the public including men and women, and submit for their consideration a scheme for building one thousand houses. Due notice will be given at an early date. Our objective should not be less than one thousand houses. We can do it by co-operation, thrift and common sense, and take many a family from houses not fit for hogs to homes of health and comfort.



### Allied Fleets WELCOME To-morrow Masters of the

ALL QUIET.

(Via London)—The War Office communication issued this evening says that the western front the day was quiet.

**MUTINOUS SAILORS IN CHARGE.**  
LONDON, Nov. 8. Virtually all the German fleet have revolted, according to a despatch received from the Hague. The men are complete masters at Kiel, Wilhelmshaven, Heligoland and Cuxhaven. At Kiel the workers have joined the navy men, and declared a general strike, says the despatch.

**SUBMARINES NOT NOTIFIED.**  
THE HAGUE, Nov. 7. Seant food, bad treatment by their officers, and exasperation, caused by the collapse of Austria, culminated in a movement of revolt in the German navy. The revolt broke out at Kiel on Nov. 3. Sailors ashore, aided by workmen, seized the fort and arsenal. The movement spread rapidly to the crews of warships in the armament. On the 4th, the labor unions proclaimed a general strike, and on the 5th the revolt reached Wilhelmshaven. Heligoland, Borkum and Cuxhaven. Almost all the sailors have joined the revolt. The officers are communicating with other officers and are powerless. A few units remain loyal. The submarines cordoned off, this news having been hidden from them.

NAVAL PAGEANT.

(Reuter's Ottawa Agency)—Reuter learns that the Allied fleets will anchor off St. Sophia, Constantinople, Saturday next.

**ANSWER TO GERMAN LIES.**  
BRITISH HEADQUARTERS, Nov. 7. (Via Ottawa Agency)—Figures illustrating the respective and relative losses in this year's campaign and Overseas, have been issued. From March 21 to October 24th the percentage of casualties to strength of infantry was as follows:—Divisions of the United Kingdom, officers 118, other ranks 121; Canadian divisions, officers 97, other ranks 84; Australian divisions, officers 83, other ranks 85; New Zealand divisions, officers 85, other ranks 86. The Canadian divisions were withdrawn for a considerable period which began on August 1. Of the United Kingdom divisions, the percentage of the total casualties to field gunners. These figures are given, not by way of making any comparison in the most serious competition of valor, but as a means of showing to often repeated German allegations, that we have more overseas troops very much more than United Kingdom troops. The above figures suggest that we have more than twice the number of troops than the Germans at the present time.

## Tin Plate in Rolls

Tin plate in the shape of continuous rolls, like tar paper, instead of in the shape of flat sheets as at present, is now possible. A power-driven soldering press has recently been designed for joining and soldering the sheets into a continuous strip for roofing purposes. One man can operate the machine, hooking the sections of tin plate together and operating the solder and flux on the seam. The capacity is four seams a minute or twenty boxes of tin plate a day. It is claimed by use of this machine a better and more durable seam can be made than by hand, and one that will be solid and uniform on both sides, the solder penetrating and welding all parts of the seam. The economy and convenience to the roofer from the tin plate roll thus produced need not be pointed out. The process of roofing with it becomes identical with that of roofing with tar paper rolls.

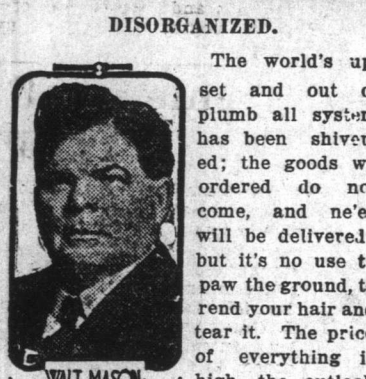
FAITH.

**What Are We Doing**  
For Our Returned Soldiers and Sailors.

That is the important question to-day. Let each one of us answer the question for himself. These men went to the call of the King to defend our homes and preserve us from danger. There was a great stir when their names were put up in a conspicuous place, the man that did not answer the call was looked on as a shirker, parties went round recruiting and much more besides. At last these methods of persuasion were dropped and men were conscripted, compelled to go to the defence whether they liked it or not. The men went; many, alas! will not return. Some, however, have been rescued from the jaws of death as they are back with us. WHAT DO WE PROPOSE TO DO FOR THEM?

Surely we must endeavor to restore them to civil life just as earnestly and vigorously as we made soldiers of them. But this is not such an easy matter. Some have lost arms, others legs; some are injured in the back, others elsewhere; some have lost their hearing, others their sight. Many have internal injuries and pretty well all have suffered in the nervous system—that system which so intimately controls our whole make up. They have lived amid the romance of glamour and arms amid perils and dangers, amid shrieks and sights unholly. He may look all right but he isn't. He has been physically disturbed, and he feels it hard to get back into civil life again. ARE WE GOING TO HELP THEM?

The Civil Re-Establishment Committee has been appointed to endeavor to get the injured to live again useful lives in our midst. The man that has lost an arm may not be able to fish again, but he can be re-trained to some other kind of work, and so with other disabilities. But this is great and humane work will be done the avail unless the public is behind it and unless employers will go out of their way to give them jobs. All employers from the Government down to the returned men a duty in this way.

It has been said that the men have passed through strange experiences; many have suffered much; they are upset. Therefore, employers must be sympathetic and patient with them for a while and encourage them to persevere in their new effort. Foremen and masters should take a particular delight in endeavoring to make a civilian out of a sailor or soldier.

And our brave veterans have a duty to perform likewise. They have met the dragon and fought him. They have now other dragons to overcome. The civilian life does not take their fancy now. They must fight the inclination to idle, the temptation to ease and pleasure, and resolve to be again among the best of our civilians. To employers they must be considerate and respond to the efforts they may make to help them along. Certain employers have made a real effort to employ as many of the returned men as possible but have not been treated very well by the men, some of whom have left without provocation or notice, leaving their employers in the lurch, and it seems should take a particular delight in endeavoring to make a civilian out of a sailor or soldier.

Here is the problem! We must all work together and just as during the past four years we have been working hard to make soldiers of men, so now we must work just as hard to make men of soldiers. THE REAL TEST OF OUR PATRIOTISM IS AT HAND!

## PROCLAMATION!

By His Excellency, Sir William H. Horwood, Knight, Chief Justice, Administrator and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Dominion of Newfoundland.

WHEREAS, by an Act passed in the sixth year of the reign of His present Majesty, entitled "The Prohibition Plebeiotic Act, 1915," and Acts in amendment thereto, it is provided that the term "Intoxicating Liquors" shall be construed to signify all ales, wines, malt, brewed or spirituous liquors containing two per cent. or upwards of alcohol in volume, and such medicinal, toilet and other preparations containing two per cent. or upwards of alcohol in volume, as may from time to time be directed by the Governor in Council by Proclamation, but not wines for sacramental purposes.

And whereas, in accordance with the above recited Acts, certain medicinal, toilet and other preparations were, by Proclamation dated the 8th day of October last, declared to be Intoxicating Liquors.

And whereas, I deem it expedient by and with the advice of my Council, to add to the list of preparations therein mentioned.

I do therefore, by this my Proclamation, order and direct that on and after the Thirtieth day of November, instant, the following preparation shall be declared to be an Intoxicating Liquor, namely:—  
Of which all persons concerned are hereby required to take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.  
Given under my Hand and Seal at the Government House, St. John's, this 5th day of November, A.D. 1918.

### Foreign News Briefs.

#### KING GEORGE AND GENERALS.

London, Nov. 1.—King George has sent congratulatory messages to General E. N. H. Allenby, commanding the British troops in Palestine, and General Sir W. R. Marshall, commanding the troops in Mesopotamia. General Allenby has been created a K.C.B.

#### CLAIMS THE THRONE.

London, Nov. 2.—The Bavarian Premier has notified Berlin that the Bavarian Royal Family claims the imperial throne in the event of Emperor William's abdication, according to the Socialist Leipzig Volks Zeitung, which is quoted in a Hague despatch to the Daily Mail.

#### FROM WESTERN FRONT.

Copenhagen, Nov. 2.—Austro-Hungarian troops are being withdrawn from the Western front and the Germans, fearing the Allies will march through Austria, are digging trenches and erecting fortifications along the Bavarian frontier, according to a Vienna despatch to the Politiken.

#### ANARCHY IN TURKEY.

Amsterdam, Nov. 2.—A state of anarchy prevails throughout Turkey, according to information received by the Armenian correspondents bureau here. Hundreds of thousands of deserters are subsisting by means of

### robbery of the mass of the population. Constantinople is declared to be literally famished and impatiently awaiting the arrival of the Allied forces.

#### NO REFUGEES.

Amsterdam, Nov. 2.—German authorities have been notified by the Dutch Government that after to-day no refugees will be permitted to cross the Belgian-Netherlands frontier.

#### SERBIANS OCCUPY BELGRADE.

Pajis, Nov. 2.—The Serbian army has occupied Belgrade, the Serbian capital, the War Office announces tonight.

#### THE ALLIES CAPTURE.

Paris, Nov. 3. (Havas Agency).—Since the great offensive began on the Western front, on July 15th last the Allied armies have captured 362,335 prisoners, including 7,999 officers, as well as 6,217 cannons; 38,622 machine guns and 3,907 mine throwers. The Allies during the month of October captured 108,843 prisoners including 2,472 officers as well as 2,064 cannons; 13,639 machine guns and 1,193 mine throwers.

GROCERY DEPT.

### At the City Hall.

The Municipal Council held its regular weekly session last evening. The Mayor presided, and Councillors Morris, Brownrigg, Vinicombe and Mullaly were present.

The Secy. Public Works Dept., asked permission to connect the addition to the Fever Hospital with the sewer.

This matter had been attended to during the week. The Inspector General wrote with reference to the suggestion of Dr. Fraser on the subject of the "Safety First Campaign." He said the sidewalk in many localities were such that he would not be justified in issuing a general order compelling pedestrians to keep off the streets.

The procuring and posting of notices with "Safety First—Keep to the Sidewalks," he agreed was a matter of importance, but one for which his Department had not funds to carry out.

Squires & Winter wrote they would fence property belonging to Strippling's estate on Water Street and asked to be given street line.

The City Engineer reported on a building being erected by the Brehm Mfg. Co. on their property, Forest Road. He said the building was being erected on piles and will mean the destruction of the old sewer there.



### Getting Prohibition.

The Guinness stout brewery earned millions more last year than ever before the war because of the British Government regulation requiring "the use of vastly increased volume of water." The drinkers of Guinness are no less fortunate than the stockholders. Let the volume of water per barrel increase progressively and Britons will be cured of malt beverage drinking as once were all the male inhabitants in a young mining camp on the top of the Sierra Nevada cured of whisky drinking. The Engineer reported in regard to Messrs. Nicholls & Inkpen's building which was satisfactory.

He also reported on laying sewer to old military hospital; erection of a building near Brehm Mfg. Co.; safe water pipes, Southside, etc., etc. The level of water Windsor Lake rose six inches during the month of October and George's Pond was up to high water mark.

The Plumbing Inspector's and Health Officer's weekly reports were read.

After disposing of some routine business and passing pay rolls and bills, the meeting adjourned.

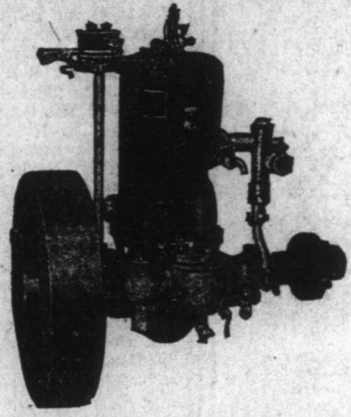

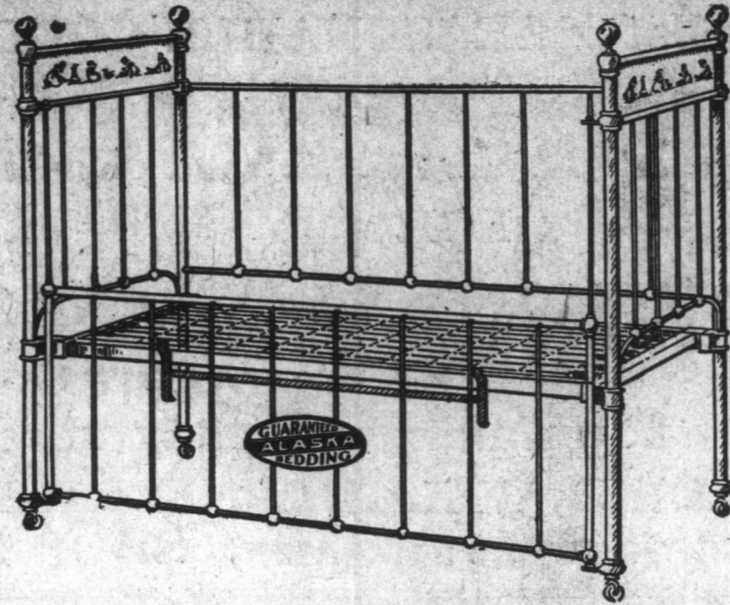

## Leave of Absence to Men in Class 1, Under Military Service Act, 1918.

On the recommendation of the Military Service Board and the Public Health Officer, leave of absence without pay until Sunday, 15th day of December next, has been granted to all men in Class 1, who have been ordered by the Registrar under the Military Service Act, 1918, to report at the Armoury for duty on September 15th and who were granted leave of absence until November 15th. This extension of leave is granted owing to prevalence of the epidemic of Influenza.
