#### News Summary.

(British Wireless Service.) HORSEA, Nov. 3 .- In the majorty of coalfields voting continues today, upon the peace terms arranged executive. 



The Government View.

The Government have every reason to welcome Mr. Asquith's announcement, which will do far more to strengthen the Coalition than even the most cogen; arguments of the Premier and his supporters.

The Government's position, as stated by Mr. Lloyd George at Cardiff a week ago, is-with one exceptionclear and unassailable. We must, he said, restore order with a firm hand, and proceed at the same time with measures for the self-government of Ireland. But he protested against the view that we should go further and give more simply because crime has been more successful.

"Give it," he said, "because it is right. Give it because it is just. Give it because it is good for Ireland, and good for the United Kingdom. Give it because it brings peace and goodwill. But don't give it because you are bullied by assassins."

That position is unanswerable. So, we think, is the Premier's objection to an independent Ireland. Though little has seen said about it, Ifeland was the Covernment's worry during the war. Indeed, our escape from the results of Trish treachery was miracul-

Every applicant for admission to the Hospital must bring with him or forward to the Superintendent of the Hospital certificate signed by a duly registered physician that such applicant is a proper subject for Hospital treatment.



The attention of all persons who may have any claim against, or debt due by any German National, is directed to the following sections of "The Treaty of Peace (Germany) Order, 1920", of date the 6th August, 1920, published in the ROYAL GAZETTE of the 10th August, 1920:

7. (1) Every creditor in Newfoundland, unless he has already recorded his claim with the Custodian, shall within six months from the date of this Order notify the Clearing Office of his claim, and thereafter from time to time shall within one month of demand by the Clearing Office furnish to the Clearing Office such further information and documents in his possession or power, in such form and verified in such manner as the Clearing Office may require.

(2) The claim of any person who fails to comply with any provision of sub-section (1) shall, if the Custodian so orders, be forever barred and extinguished, and such person shall on summary conviction be liable to a penalty not exceeding fifty dollars (\$50.00) for each day of

#### AN ITALIAN ROOF GARDEN.

Since the war the managements of everal theatres have talked of building roof gardens on American lines. A big scheme was evolved for the early construction of such a garden above the Empire. Leicester Square, but it has not yet materialised. Meanwhile an elaborate Italian roof garden has been built on the top of the Criterion theatre and restaurant in Piccadilly Circus. This will be open to the public in a fortnight. The scene represents Lake Como capped by a realistic blue sky, and the design is apparently founded on the description of the Villa Desti in the work "Famous Villas in Italy." Horseshoe-shaped pergolas surround the dancing floor, each being named after some town in Italy. In the decorative scheme realistic artificial grapes figure largely. There is a small electric light in each grape and the effect is very pretty. The decorations cost \$28,000 to complete.

#### PUKKA POO.

In East End of London omnibuses strangers are sometimes surprised to see a fellow-passenger studying a curious looking little square of paper with hieroglyphics in green and red spots all over the paper. "Bolshevik banknotes" is the usual guess of the stranger, but the 'bus conductor will set him right. They are the coupons of the most popular Chinese gambling game in the East End. known ae "Pukka poo," whose chief clients consists of dockers and their wives and young people of both sexes in all sorts of trades. In the last three or four months this game has spread rapidly and is not now confined to the East End. The system of the competition is a slip of paper with printed Chinese characters representing numbers, and the task of the gambler is to cross out certain of the figures, and if these tally with the coupon held by the Chinaman who is getting up the competition the successful competitor secures the first prize of \$200. There are other prizes for the nearest solutions. Drawings at the pukka poo shop take place every hour, like races over a limited period. Every district in the East End has its rumors of a resident winning the \$200 prize, but these lucky people are never run to earth. Meantime the police, long quite supine in the matter, have been very active in stopping the gamble. A large Chinese laundry was recently raided and has been compelled to close its doors. This caused an alarm among the chinese and coupons have become more difficult to obtain, but they are still a fairly common sight in the East

An unusual and interesting personality has passed out of London life by the sudden death of William Heinemann. Many people owe their introduction to the modern foreign masters to this publisher, and everyone who cares what he reads owes something. Personally I remember with gratitude the yellow volumes of Constance Garnett's translation of Turgenieff. He issued many books on art and artists. finely produced, and it was he who published the "Beggarstaff Brothers' Calendar," which was so notable an event in the art movement of the nineties. The little windmill design that was the symbol of the firm was the work of William Nicholson, one of the "Beggarstaffs." He published several of Max Beerbohm's books at a time when their publication required faith as well as enterprise. Courage, indeed, was characteristic of his whole publishing career. He had a flair for new authors of a fresh turn of mind, and he thought that the public could stand a fair amount of good art and literature. He published also a number o advanced political works which would probably have astonished his fellow members of the Conservative Club if they had ever heard of them. He wrote several plays himself, but none of them has lived into success.

#### DANCING "BLACKINGS."

The dancing season opens in earnest this week at most of the hig hotels. A Charing Cross Road agent tells me that practically every room which is hig enough to accommodate over twenty couples has been booked for dances, and generally by those who are giving lessons there during the day. Several instructors are complaining that their competitors are running "blackleg dances," namely, dances which are not run on a paying basis. In one case a well-known dancer is making no charge for her room, a "jazz" drummer is giving his services free, and another dancer is organizing the dances without payment. In this way they can run dances which act as advertisements for their lessons at a price which the promoter, paying for a room and drummer, cannot hope to equal. There is, however, no dancing instructors' trade union.

#### Pecksniff Running for President.

It is the fate of Senator Harding, the Republican candidate for the Presidency of the United States, to suggest to the outside onlooker certain characters in literature. Until quite lately his tendency toward platitute, and his seeming desire to agree with everyone, irresistibly suggested Polonius. Lately, since the rupture between the divergent forces of his party compelled him to say something that sounded definite on the Peace Treaty and the League of Nations, the analogy between himself and a literary personage whose characteristics gave a proverbial phrase to the world, bemes apparent. We allude to Mr. Pecksniff. Long before Mr. Peckaniff was immortalized in the pages of "Martin Chuzzlewit" he had been a amiliar figure in all walks of life. Since then he has made politics his articular field and can be found in arious transformations in almost very land.

Certainly the clear and unctuous ice of Pecksniff rings through the following passage from a statement on the League of Nations, recently issued by Senator Harding at Marion, Indiana:

"I carnestly believe that the conscience the ready sympathies, the sense of justice and the plain common sense of the United States can be depended upon by the rest of the world, and that it would be stupid as well as unlawful to attempt to chain sympathies, our sense of justice


